



Rotary Responds to Disaster in Japan

In response to the 9.0 earthquake & subsequent tsunami that struck Japan on March 11th, The Rotary Foundation has established the Rotary Japan & Pacific Islands disaster Fund, which will support long-term recovery projects in affected areas. Rotarians (and non-Rotarians) can donate online. Clubs & districts can contribute cash and District Designated Fund (DDF) allocations to the fund.

Millions of Japanese are without power, close to 20,000 have lost their lives and over half a million have lost their homes. RI President-nominee Sakuji Tanaka was in Lisbon, Portugal on Rotary business when the quake occurred. He was able to reach his wife in Kyoto to confirm her safety. He said, "The northern region of Japan is still in chaos. We are unsure when this chaos will end or when things will get better. However, I am most thankful to know that Rotarians around the world care for us."

Rotary clubs & districts around the world are also mobilizing efforts to bring urgently needed supplies to victims. The five-member Group Study Exchange from Illinois were in Tokyo on their last night in Japan. They were able to successfully leave the country.

- There will be a mobile restroom so we can avoid frequent stops.
- There will be a North and South pick up as well as other arrangements en route to New Orleans.
- You will not be molested on the way to an airplane. However, we can add that feature if we have numerous requests.

ShelterBoxes Heading to Japan's Worst Affected Areas

The first ShelterBoxes to arrive in Japan will be heading to the worst affected areas in Japan's north. The ShelterBox Response Team (SRT), which has been on the ground in Japan for five days, is working in cooperation with the British Embassy in Japan and the British military.

International Director, Lasse Petersen (AU), says ShelterBox will be doing everything they can to help. "As you head further north along the coast literally every single home has been destroyed," he said. "At this moment the focus of the relief effort is still on search and rescue. The authorities are still in the stage of establishing what they need, where they need it and where the best places to house large numbers of displaced people are. They're gearing up for the anticipated need that will become apparent when their focus shifts from search and rescue. It's extremely cold here and we are hearing reports of people having to sleep in their cars while evacuation centres remain full and overcrowded. We're committed to doing everything we can to help Japan's people at this extremely testing time." So far there are 468 ShelterBoxes in the country with another 400 en route. A further 5,000 are on stand by should they be required.
