#### International Service —Year in Review

This rotary year our club participated in numerous international projects including:

- Matching grant partnership with Monterrey Obispado rotary club to provide computer equipment for a virtual library in Monterrey, Mexico, and materials for energy-efficient improvements and a compost garden at Lanier High School in Austin (the "Lanier Green Initiative")

# One Woman's Mission: To Immunize Children Worldwide With the Polio Vaccine

Every day, there is pain. Ann Lee Hussey's right leg is an inch and a half shorter than her left, causing her to limp. Her feet are misshapen, and her joints and muscles ache so badly by the end of the day that it's tough to go to sleep.

And yet within the last decade this 58-year-old has made 20 trips to some of the most rugged and dangerous places in the world—Mali, Nigeria, Chad. Each time, she leads a team of one to two dozen volunteers with the same ambitious goal: to immunize as many children as possible, thereby ensuring that they will not contract polio, an infectious viral disease that can attack nerves and cause paralysis. It's the same ailment that has wreaked havoc on Ann Lee's life. "I get exhausted sometimes, but then I remember: I never want another child to endure what I've gone through," she says.

Her story and our stories: These stories come together when we make a contribution to PolioPlus. We join hands and make a different world than she experienced as a child, or the world we remember. Our legs and joints and feet aren't so misshapen that they prevent us from reaching into our pockets to contribute the money she and others need to win the battle against polio.

### What makes polio an emergency?

On the 25th of May, the World Health Assembly declared polio a programmatic emergency for global public health. The Global Poverty Project interviewed Bruce Aylward, assistant director-general at the World Health Organization (WHO). Why now?

Three things were driving the ministers of health of the world in declaring polio an emergency: first – on a positive note – polio eradication has reached a tipping point. India, the country that was responsible for almost half the world's cases just two years ago, has now passed an entire year without reporting a case, providing incontrovertible evidence that polio can be eradicated anywhere.

However, and this is the ministers' second point, polio cases unexpectedly – and alarmingly – surged late last year in the three remaining endemic countries, from where it would undoubtedly make a global comeback unless it is completely eradicated.

And third, the ministers saw further evidence that when polio spreads to polio-free places, it is increasingly deadly. In Tajikistan and Congo in 2010, and in China in 2011, polio paralyzed adults as well as children in these outbreaks with high fatality rates among the adults, reaching nearly 50 percent in some of these places. This is on top of other research that has recently shown that if we let this opportunity slip through our fingers, we will soon be seeing more than 200,000 children again being paralyzed by polio each year.

That's not just a number, that's children's lives changed forever. Many of them would die. If there was a tsunami coming, with 200,000 children in its path, we would do everything we could to get the children out of harm's way.

You can make a difference. It is everyone's responsibility to see polio eradicated. Once we do, we will have achieved something extraordinary for all the world's children, forever.
