
Giving in times of scarcity – Part 1







55TH ANNIVERSARY CHARTER CELEBRATIONS PRESENTER



DR. ZENO L. CHARLES-MARCEL, MD

Dr. Zeno L. Charles-Marcel pursued studies in four universities namely; Doctor of Medicine at Howard University College of Medicine, Electrical Engineering (hon) and Physics & Physiology at McGill University, Postgraduate Studies in Internal Medicine, Specialty Training and Cheif Resident at Loma Linda University and studies in leadership, international relations and affairs/ Health.

He co-founded the first academic lifestyle medicine Fellowship in the United States and has served as a Medical Missionary to India, the Middle East and Latin America. He has learned alot from serving in leadership in the Unisteed States Government..and in the denominational system overseas, Mission Hospital, lifestyle centers and academic programs. He is a former Dean of Health Sciences at Montefiore University and holds adjunct faculty appointment at three universities

Dr. Charles-Marcel emphasized Rotary's Four-Way Test, which, if implemented globally, would be extremely beneficial to humanity. He spoke on the concept of integrity; he says it makes 'you trustworthy and recommend you as a leader in your community. It contributes to the design of God for this desire to give the contribute to produce to serve and to improve your service not just on the tennis court but on the court of life.' He also spok on the concept of hope and of embracing altruistic activity. To him, 'there is honor actually in giving and seek honor to doing good regardless of whether you get recognized for it. There is honor in giving another expecting anything in return. There is honor in serving from the heart.'

He discussed the effect of the pandemic on persons; they were questioning their existence, asking 'why'. There was "an emotional tug of war' between being glad to be alive and asking the question, 'why am I alive and the persons are care for are not?' Survivor guilt arises when one person survives but another, whether a friend or family member, does not, and as a result, the survivor feels guilty. But it's worth noting that there is something we can do to help. He delved into techniques to improve your service; using your existence to help others. He expounded on the word CELEBRATE:

- C- Choice: choose carefully
- E- Exercise: Improve your resilience and strenth
- L- To love is to act in the best interest of another; Love without boundaries
- E-Eat and drink for health and strength.
- B- Breathing: Take in the pure air of the ocean breeze.

R-Relaxation is vital to reduce stress and promote physical and mental health, as well as boost your mood. Set the tone; be the kind of person you wish everyone was; hope breeds optimism and tenacity in the face of adversity. Relaxation is necessary therefore decrease stress and physical and mental health. Rest: Sleeps improves our immune function

- A- Air has health benefits to improve your respiratory health
- T- Be thankful, accepting reality gracefully and grateful
- E- Contribute to your environment. Help set the tone when you walk into a room or when you get onto a zoom; you have the power to create a new environment. Be your best self be kind of person that you would wish everyone else around you would be.

To conclude, we must interact with life and enjoy it, as well as engage with others—it is not good or wholesome to be alone; we were created to be in community, and we must engage with enthusiasm, purpose, and accountability. We should live intentionally and give from our scarcity.

Mr. Chester A. S. Hinkson born in St. Lucia was educated at St. Mary's College before taking up his profession as a banker.

After a seven-month stint with the 1st National Bank former\$ St. Lucia Cooperative Bank, he says he earned a hefty and healthy salary of EC\$100.00 per month, \$45.00 of which was used from the first month's salary to purchase a pressure cooker for his mother. He is now a proud husband and father of three sons.

Before returning to St. Lucia as the first local General Manager & Country Head of one of the world's 10 leading International Banks, The Bank of Nova Scotia, he held numerous managerial positions in the Bahamas, Guyana, Grenada, Haiti and in Canada where he held the position of Director Special Projects, following a brief stint with Grameen Bank in Bangladesh, (founded by Nobel laureate professor Mohammed Yunus) where he learned the modus operandi of Micro Credit. He subsequently pioneered Scotia bank's first Micro lending programme in Guyana. He also had the opportunity to spend one week in Singapore where he got additional training in Micro Credit.

In his role as General Manager & Country Head for St. Lucia, he had responsibility for all branches on the island. Mr. Hinkson brings to the position over 40 years of experience in the financial services sector. A professionally qualified banker, he continually benefited from numerous bank-training courses, workshops, and seminars. He holds the banker's professional designation of an Associate of the Institute of Canadian Bankers (AICB), A Bachelor of Commerce Degree in Financial Services (BCOMM) from Nipissing University in North Bay, Ontario in Canada and also The Personal Financial Planner (PFP) designation from the Institute of Canadian Bankers. This designation is also referred to as -Financial Advisor.

He was once the Chairman of The Caribbean Association of Indigenous Banks, Board Member and Director of Finance Committee of NRDF and past President of Bankers Association of St. Lucia. He currently serves as a Director of The Eastern Caribbean Asset Management Corporation, Board Member of The Rotary Club of St. Lucia, Member of The Rotary Calabashers, Past member of Scotiabank Regional Advisory Board and Past President of The St. Lucia Chamber of Commerce, Industry and Agriculture.

He is extremely proud of the positions he previously held (particularly his role as a banker), as they all have afforded him the opportunity to serve his country and his people. Outside his professional life, Chester Hinkson loves music. He is also an avid reader of books that bring added value to his life viz: Biographies, Psychology and religion, business, motivation and leadership. His mentor is Nelson Mandela. 'Some might say there is a gender imbalance regarding annual international days of recognition, with International Women's Day 'probably' being the frontrunner each year. I think we all understand how that came about but the point is Gender equality - applies to everyone in society of course. So, when we in the HC were looking at our plans for the year we (an all-female team) were committed to being part of IMD and we will keep doing our part to make sure that men get their support, recognition and celebration.

International days these days have themes and objectives. Three of this International Day's objectives are all reasons why we are here today:

- (1) to celebrate the contribution that men make
- (2) to promote male role models;
- (3) to create a safer world for everyone.

Today is about responsible and caring fathers and fatherhood and we are going to hear about some brilliant local work being done on this area and hear from some men themselves. Being a father, or father figure is being a role model. It can be all too easy to forget, overlook or take for granted the contribution that fathers make to social cohesion and stability.

Societies work well when we are all involved and fulfilling our various roles as best we can. Children who are loved usually grow up to be loving and well-adjusted members of society, and usually means fewer issues with crime, delinquency, behavioural and other problems. Strong, caring and present fathers contribute to this immensely.

But good or consistent behaviours from adults, fathers, aren't always easy. Let's be honest: life throws us challenges every day: earning a living, providing a home, nutrition, health, school, relationships, stress, peer pressures, and, now a pandemic.



SAFETY DURING THE OUTBREAK

Emergence of Omicron

On November 24, 2021, a new variant of SARS-CoV-2, B.1.1.529, was reported to the World Health Organization (WHO). This new variant was first detected in specimens collected on November 11, 2021 in Botswana and on November 14, 2021 in South Africa.

On November 26, 2021, WHO named the B.1.1.529 Omicron and classified it as a Variant of Concern (VOC). On November 30, 2021, the United States designated Omicron as a Variant of Concern, and on December 1, 2021 the first confirmed U.S. case of Omicron was identified.

CDC has been collaborating with global public health and industry partners to learn about Omicron, as we continue to monitor its course. CDC has been using genomic surveillance throughout the course of the pandemic to track variants of SARS-CoV-2, the virus that causes COVID-19, and inform public health practice. We don't yet know how easily it spreads, the severity of illness it causes, or how well available vaccines and medications work against it.


