THE PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE




CONGRATULATIONS PP LEEVIE!!

The United Nations sees the COVID-19 pandemic as more than just a health crisis — it's affecting communities and economies at their core. While the impact varies from country to country, the pandemic will likely increase poverty and inequalities on a global scale. That's why the UN is encouraging socioeconomic responses to try to mitigate the harm to lives and livelihoods for years to come.

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT DURING A PANDEMIC CONT'D

The UN has issued a framework for a response to COVID-19 to support countries' social and economic recovery. During October, Community Economic Development Month, consider how you can take action to support your community. The framework consists of five key areas:

- Protecting health systems to ensure that essential services remain available.
- Helping people cope using programs that can provide access to basic services and reduce poverty.
- Protecting jobs and supporting small and medium-sized enterprises and informal sector workers through economic response and recovery programs.
- Advocating for policies to help the most vulnerable and strengthening regional responses.
- Investing in community-led response systems and promoting social cohesion.

The UN also advocates for environmental sustainability and gender equality to "build back better" and work toward achieving the Sustainable Development Goals

Look at Rotary's Economic and Community Development Project Strategies guide to help you ask relevant questions, identify needs, and make the greatest impact with the time and resources you have.

Work with experts from a Rotary Action Group or a service partner

Several action groups focus on aspects of community economic development and can help you start a local project or support an international one:

- Rotary Action Group for Community Economic Development works to alleviate poverty through sustainable microfinance and community development.
- Disaster Network of Assistance Rotary Action Group focuses on disaster preparedness, communication, and recovery worldwide.
- Rotary Action Group for Endangered Species brings attention to endangered species and supports action to preserve and protect them.
- Environmental Sustainability Rotary Action Group helps clubs and districts plan, implement, and evaluate projects related to environmental sustainability and climate change.
- Food Plant Solutions Rotary Action Group works to alleviate hunger by teaching people, particularly in developing countries, how to grow the local foods that best fill their nutritional needs.
- Rotary Action Group Against Slavery raises awareness that slavery still exists in some places and supports programs, campaigns, and projects to end it.

Your district's international service committee can connect you to local experts, many of whom are also part of a Rotary Action Group, to help you with community economic development projects. You can always contact your district leaders for assistance.

And remember Rotary's service partners for your next community economic development project:

- Ashoka helps find creative solutions to social problems.
- Habitat for Humanity International provides safe and affordable shelter to families in need.
- Peace Corps promotes peace and community development.
- ShelterBox provides disaster relief such as emergency shelter and aid to families.

The Club held various activities for the month and are as follows:


RCSL's Guest Speakers was Dr. James Fletcher Responding to Development Challenges facing St. Lucia as shown in the flyer below.



KNOW YOUR ROTARIAN-CHARLES SERIEUX

OCTOBER 14TH 2021



"When you are asked to give a summary of 'who you are essentially' after 60 years, it becomes a challenge, because it also makes you reflect on who you are and whether you have achieved your goals and more importantly, whether you are happy".

Charles Serieux is the only male child along with six girls born in Guyana to two St Lucians who travelled there to seek their fortunes. At that time Guyana was, and still is "El Dorado" to many persons from the smaller islands.

His mother was the country girl who taught them all the old fashioned morals and principles she had inherited. His father was the bread winner and he started his own mining operation as well as a retail store out in the depths of the jungle. He was one of the lucky ones, in that he found his "El Dorado".

Mr. Serieux was a boy scout and would take off on weekends to isolated jungle areas closer to the city, to camp for a day or two. During that time he would visit his father a few times in the Mazaruni, where transportation was either his father's power boat or using the Amerindian woodskins.

At the age of seventeen he left Guyana to join his family in St Lucia, due to the political and economic state of the country. Except for his father, they had all relocated.

"In St Lucia life was very exciting and eventful. I met my wife at college, I became a UK Certified Chartered Accountant, I have two sons, worked at many institutions as an Accountant or Financial Controller including Geest Industries. In 2004 an entrepreneurial opportunity in the form of Ti J's Ultra mart was birthed." "The challenges to start a new business are really a whole other story by itself. The Banks can be unreasonable, the Governmental bodies are ruthless, the customers smell fresh blood, the staff are unrelenting, the suppliers are distrusting and distrustful, the stores were all burgled in the first 4 months, and the commitment can be scary to you personally, both in terms of money and time. But I made it!"

'I am happy to say that among those challenges mentioned, there were always a few gems who made the difference to our success and today Ultramart is still thriving despite COVID, masked armed robbers and the stresses that brings."

Mr Serieux's Rotary experience began in the year 1997 and since then his Rotary life is everything he anticipated. The fellowship is unequalled, the projects are worthy and he felt that he had found the perfect avenue to help without celebrity. In the past Committee and Board meetings were held at the homes of Rotarians. It was like a small party monthly, but it allowed the members to know each other and participate much more. Mr. Serieux served in a many positions within Rotary:

Director on almost all committees, Sargeant at Arms, Vice President, President, Assistant Governor, Event planner, Fund Raising Planner and he is a double Paul Harris Fellow. "My wife and sons were critical to my success as a Rotarian"

There were two events that he is particularly proud of having played a major role:

- The Treasure Hunt fundraising
- Restructuring of wine and cheese fiesta fundraising

One of the derivatives of becoming a Rotarian was attending the regional and international conventions. He has toured a large part of the world with his wife, as a Rotarian, and believes that a Rotarian is not complete until they attend the international convention.

A second generation Rotarian, Past President & Past Assistant District Governor Dr Malcolm Charles, has served the Saint Lucian Community through The Rotary Club of Saint Lucia in a variety of capacities spanningsome forty (40) plus years.

Following his initial induction as a Rotarian in 1981, by 1983 became Club Secretary serving for two terms, Director-Youth Services Training Seminars/Presenter and later still, Vocational Service Director, Board Member, subsequently taking up office as Club President in 1987.

By 1990, he was appointed District Governors Representative involved with Gros Islet Club Development, and in 2004, created a Rotary Music Charity Group, serving as its Composer & Fundraiser.

He later served as District (D-7030) Membership Chair, and subsequently, Board Director and Vice Chair to the International Fellowship of Musicians(IFRM), which role he continues to this day.








ROTARY VS. POLIO: A TIMELINE

The eradication of polio is one of our longest standing and most significant efforts. Along with our partners, we have helped immunize more than 2.5 billion children against polio in 122 countries. We have reduced polio cases by 99.9 percent worldwide and we won't stop until we end the disease for good.



YOUNG FATHER'S SYMPOSIUM

The Rotary Club of Saint Lucia has been in existence for 55 years doing humanitarian projects all over the island of Saint Lucia and has extended its reach regionally and internationally. At the local level, the Club has undertaken many community projects such as installation of water tanks, refurbishing of schools and libraries, establishment of laundries to stop river washing and eliminate bilhazia, wheelchair distribution, feeding and clothing of the most vulnerable and marginalized individuals and the list goes on.

This new Rotary Year we saw the need to undertake a new community project. Based on Tracer studies conducted by institutions like the NSDC, Ministry of Education as well as information from the Ministry of Health, it was realized that much of today's social ills stems from families that are broken especially when the father figure is absent. We believe that Fathers play a pivotal role in the development of a child's life. Some fathers are young, and are un-prepared to deal with raising a child or children. They need guidance and support to lead their children aright and to know that they are not alone. One of my Favorite Authors Ellen G. White in the book Ministry of Healing Chapter 33 page 92. And I quote "The Father should do his part towards making home a happy place. A father should not discourage his children but show them affection with authority, kindness and sympathy with firm restraint". End quote

I want to conclude by saying that we have chosen a powerful theme- 'Fathers a key to societal change'. And the aim of this symposium is to ensure that all fathers in this room today, leave here energized, revitalized and empowered to go home to create a lasting change in the lives of their children. We want to see this change radiate not only at home, but extended to the communities and to the society at large. 




