

Like all Action Groups, it is an autonomous association of likeminded Rotarians, partners of Rotarians, and Rotaractors working in partnership with Clubs and Districts on literacy projects of mutual concern.

BELRAG's Mission and Goals

- Increasing general awareness of the severity of illiteracy throughout the world; its effect on the quality of the lives of individuals, families, communities and nations from generation to generation.
- Increasing awareness among Rotarians, Rotary Clubs and Rotary Districts of ways they can implement basic education and literacy projects that strengthen the capacity of communities to provide education and literacy to all.
- Assisting Rotarians, Rotary Clubs, and Rotary Districts to increase the scale and effectiveness of their participation in the alleviation of illiteracy and its consequences supporting the pursuit of the Object of Rotary by providing programs for both children and adults and reducing gender disparity in education.
- Actively collaborate with Rotarians to establish partnerships for projects involving the other areas of focus.

10 Ways You Can Support Literacy in Your Community

- 1. Volunteer to be a tutor for a child or adult.
- 2.Read to children at schools, libraries, and other community locations.
- 3. Read to seniors who maybe alone or have vision loss.
- 4. Read to your children. Ask them to read to you.
- 5. Dedicate one-hour (or ½ hour) every day to reading.
- 6. Create incentives for older siblings to read to younger siblings.
- 7. Donate to a literacy program.
- 8. Build and stock a Little Free Library in a local neighborhood. Restock a Little Free Library near you.
- 9. Donate new or like-new books for children in low-income communities.
- 10.Get involved with BELRAG and learn more ways to support basic education and literacy in your community!

One of our long-standing Rotarians often says that to a Rotarian, you should have been a Rotarian. On that basis, I was a Rotarian long before I officially became a member on September 1, 1995. That is because of by involvement in one other service club prior to Rotary in addition to serving as the accountant of the St. Lucia School for the Deaf for a couple of years.

Over the years, I have participated in most of our fundraising and service programmes. The following are those that I had a particular affinity for:

1. Easter Anti-Drug Camp - used to be an annual affair over the Easter Weekend at the Castriec Comprehensive Secondary School during which disadvantaged children we coached about the evils of a drug life and other anti-social behavior. I personally know a couple of people who used this programme as a spring board for a better life.

2. Wheel Chair Distribution – I participated in the first wheelchair distribution undertaken by the club and the appreciation shown by many of recipients gave me the true meaning of "Service Above Self."

3. I always enjoyed the Tree planting exercises, if only because it left me with the feeling that I was helping to save the planet, but also for the fellowship, an integral part of Rotary, that always followed.

4. And I cannot speak about fellowship without the happy memories of Rotarian Peter Kouly and his wine cellar in those days when committee meetings were held at the homes of Rotarians.

5. Career guidance talks and mentoring were two other projects I had a personal interest in as they were both associated with preparing the youth of the day for the future, and the annual Xmas party for disadvantaged youth was always a joy.

There are several other projects including Doctors in action that are worthy of mention, but space does not allow for it.

As noted, I became a Rotarian on September 1, 1995 and worked principally with the Vocations Committee. I was Treasurer for the years 2016/17 and 2017/18 and President in 2005/06. I am also a PHF (+1).

I plan to attend the next Rotary International Convention, virtual or in-person.

I enjoy watching all sports at the international level but in my more active days my passions were table tennis and karate.

MY SOUL HAS A HAT

I counted my years and realized that I have less time to live by, than I have lived so far. I feel like a child who won a pack of candies: at first, he ate them with pleasure but when he realized that there was little left, he began to taste them intensely.

I have no time for endless meetings where the statutes, rules, procedures and internal regulations are discussed, knowing that nothing will be done.

SAFETY DURING THE OUTBREAK

Can you mix and match the vaccines?

For people who received either Pfizer-BioNTech or Moderna's COVID-19 vaccine series, a third dose of the same mRNA vaccine should be used. A person should not receive more than three mRNA vaccine doses. If the mRNA vaccine product given for the first two doses is not available or is unknown, either mRNA COVID-19 vaccine product may be administered.

Who Needs an Additional COVID-19 Vaccine?

Currently, CDC is recommending that moderately to severely immunocompromised people receive an additional dose. This includes people who have:

Been receiving active cancer treatment for tumors or cancers of the blood

Received an organ transplant and are taking medicine to suppress the immune system

Received a stem cell transplant within the last 2 years or are taking medicine to suppress the immune system

Moderate or severe primary immunodeficiency (such as DiGeorge syndrome, Wiskott-Aldrich syndrome) Advanced or untreated HIV infection

Active treatment with high-dose corticosteroids or other drugs that may suppress your immune response People should talk to their healthcare provider about their medical condition, and whether getting an additional dose is appropriate for them.


