BASIC EDUCATION & LITERACY MONTH



Fellow Rotarians,

September is on Basic Education and Literacy month. During the month we encourage our members to build their knowledge and literacy of Rotary by enrolling to My Rotary and take at least one course in Rotary Learning Center. This will help improve our overall Rotary experience and make us better Rotarians.

We were fortunate to have Dr. Keith Nurse speak to us about education is a powerful tool to advance our social, economic and technological development. The pandemic has brought to the fore the importance of digital literacy in everyday life. The world has forever been changed and we have to embrace these changes in order to survive.

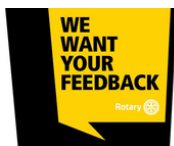
ROTARY INTERNATIONAL NEWS

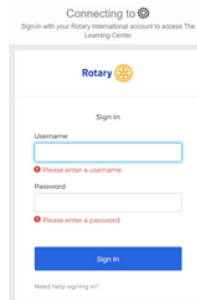

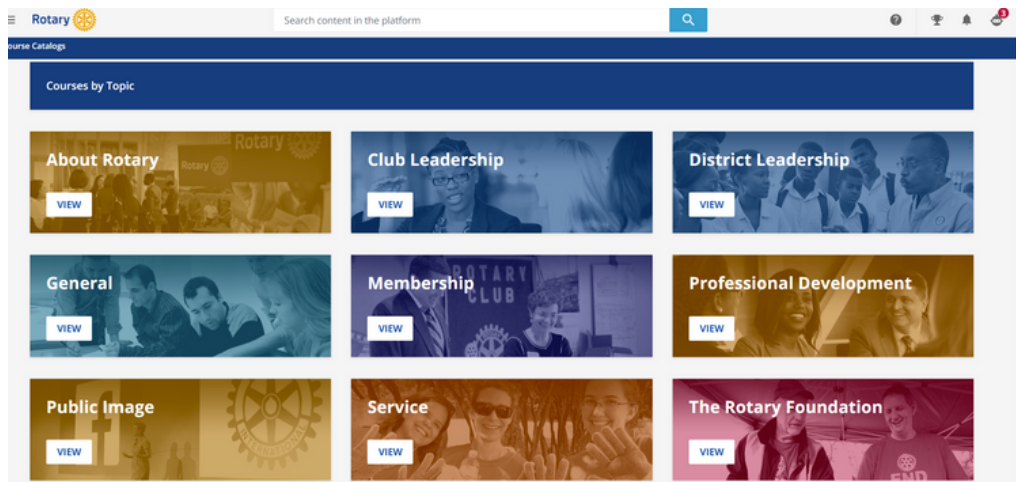
ROTARY LEARNING CENTRE

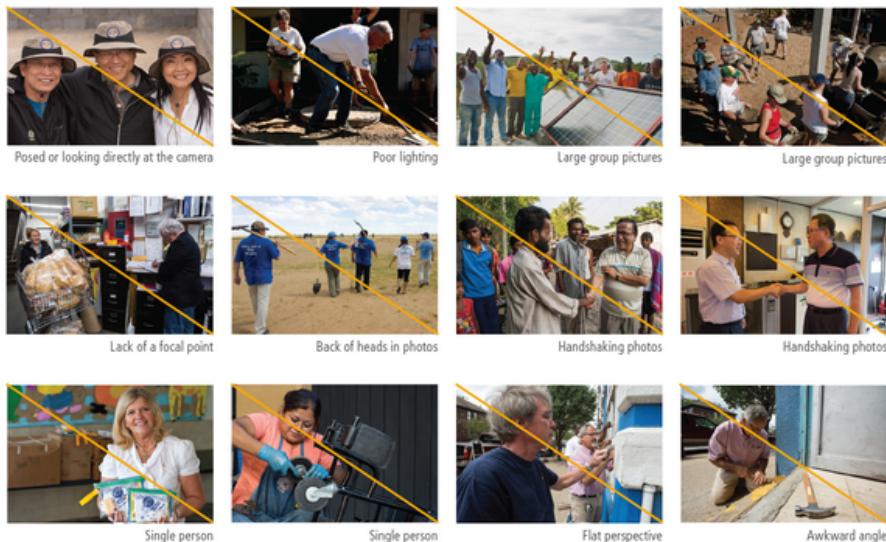
Choose images that show Rotary participants taking action by:

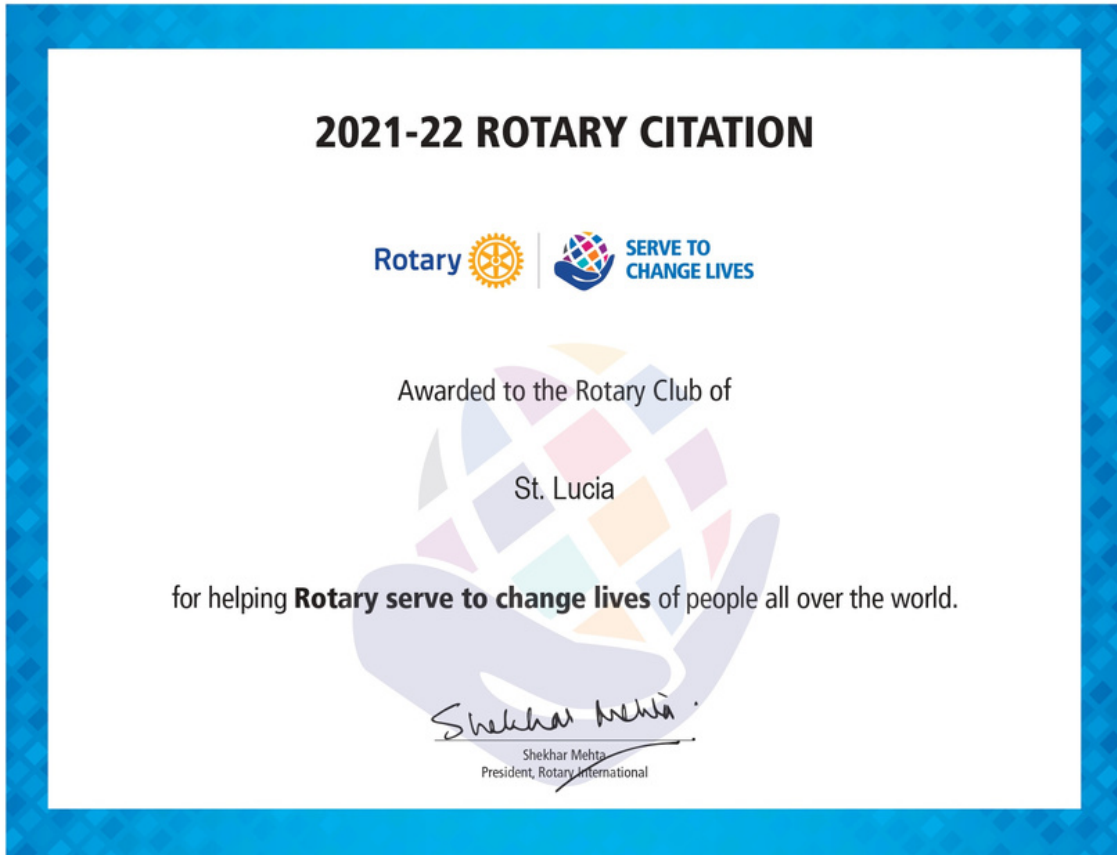

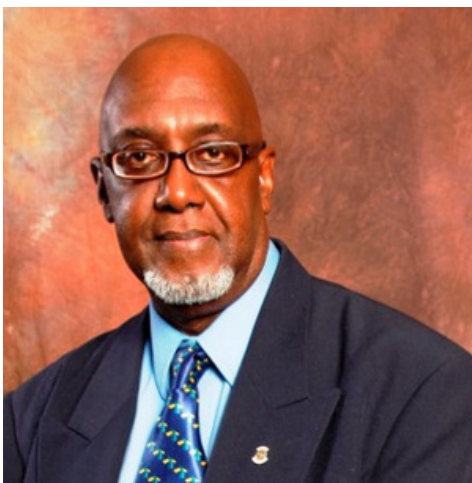

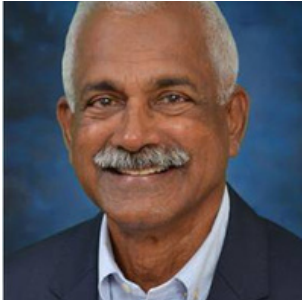

Dr Keith Nurse has been an education for the bulk of his professional career and become the Principal of the Sir Arthur Lewis Community College for the last 3 years.

Education as Social Policy

Mass education is now looking to educate the bulk of the population and the more educated society is, the more successful a country can be.

Education also helps with the health of a nation as they make better personal health choices.

Tertiary education is important to create a competent workforce. The higher level of tertiary education, the greater ability to absorb technology, innovation and change.

Education as Economic Policy

It can be a source of foreign exchange earnings.

Education as Innovation Policy

In developing countries, where tertiary education is not invested, the economy is not like to progress. They are not investing in the future.

"Eating your seed, rather than planting it"

Many questions were raised after an interesting talk.

PP Selma asked how the platform for virtual education during Covid was prepared. *In the early months, the team was expanded from 1 to 3. A crafted plan for online learning had already been in place and this was further developed and e-learning is now a successful area*

AG Leathon asked what metrics are used to measure the investment in education and how to level up the under sourced. *St Lucia has a low investment in education with 8% of Education budget, compared with 20% for Latin America and 38% for developed economies. Attracting foreign students and keeping them is another Return on Investment.*

PAG Dr Malcom gave a heart felt vote of thanks.

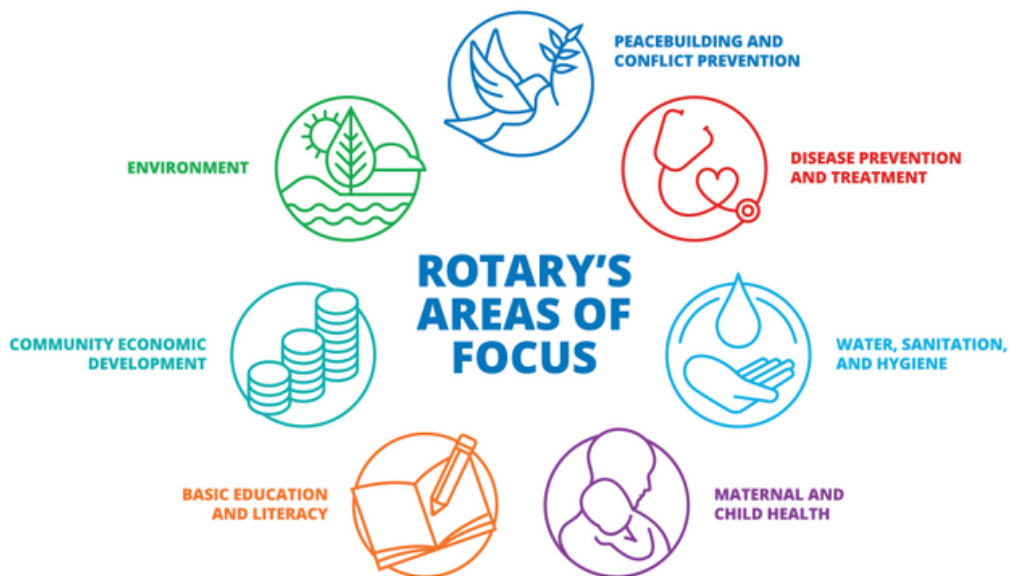
