THE OBJECT OF ROTARY

The Object of Rotary is a philosophical statement of Rotary's purpose and the responsibilities of Rotarians. It should, and in fact, serves to encourage and foster the ideal of service as a basis of worthy enterprise and, in particular, to encourage and foster:

- 1. The development of acquaintance as an opportunity for service;
- 2. High ethical standards in business and professions; the recognition of the worthiness of all useful occupations; and the dignifying of each Rotarian's occupation as an opportunity to serve society;
- 3. The application of the ideal of service in each Rotarian's personal, business, and community life;
- 4. The advancement of international understanding, goodwill, and peace through a world fellowship of business and professional persons united in the ideal of service.

The concept of vocational service is rooted in the second object, which calls on Rotarians to encourage and foster:

- ·High ethical standards in business and professions
- •The recognition of the worthiness of all useful occupations
- •The dignifying of each Rotarian's occupation as an opportunity to serve society

As a Rotarian, how can you put these ideals into action?

Consider these suggestions:

- •Talk about your profession in your club, and take time to learn about fellow members' occupations.
- •Use your skills and expertise to serve a community.
- •Practice your profession with integrity, and inspire others to behave ethically through your words and actions.
- •Help young people achieve their career goals.
- •Guide and encourage others in their professional development.

By undertaking these activities, you bring vocational service to life. Vocational service is the essence of Rotary and serves as the foundation from which we serve our communities around the world.

Examples of Career counselling and guidance

The Rotary Club of Birmingham, Alabama, USA, partners with their Rotaract club on a mentoring program. Rotaractors are paired with Rotarians to foster stronger vocational, civic, and personal relationships. Rotaractors learn from Rotarians, especially in areas related to their future careers and industry sectors, and Rotarians have the chance to share vocational expertise with youth.

The Rotaract Club of Cape Munyonyo in Uganda carries out a project in secondary schools every year to mentor Interactors in professional development, career guidance, and service.

Inspire the next generation

The Rotary E-Club of Tamar Hong Kong, Hong Kong, organized seminars for youth in its community aimed at teaching balance between everyday life and a career. Members of the club shared insights on different industries such as travel, jewelry, entertainment, and entrepreneurship. Youth also learned how to write a résumé and cover letter, and they received suggestions on how to interview successfully.

The Rotary Club of Madras Industrial City, Tamil Nadu, India conducted a career guidance workshop for its Interact club to help students discover their interests. The district vocational service chair arranged a half-day interactive session for students to form career goals and plan for their future vocations. A special workshop was conducted for girls, and more than 200 students benefited from the project.

VOCATIONAL TRAINING AND PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

Founded as a business networking organization, Rotary emphasizes the importance of bringing together business and professional leaders for the purposes of exchanging ideas, developing relationships, and improving communities. Rotary members are committed to professional development and advancing their skills. Rotarians can pursue this commitment through activities that increase their knowledge, and by guiding and training others to find gainful, fulfilling employment.

We have in the past conducted career guidance talks at various schools principally in the Castries area and we have also executed mentoring programs. St. Lucia needs our commitment to these more than ever now. The traditional role models for our youth appear to be falling woefully short of what is expected of them. It is therefore imperative that Rotary gives life to upcoming generations of young St. Lucians, the citizens and leaders of tomorrow.

ROTARY THEME FOR JANUARY 2022

VOCATIONAL SERVICE MONTH

Some of the responsibilities of the Club Vocational Service Committee include:

- Talk about our vocation in our club, and take time to learn about fellow members' vocations.
- Use our professional skills to serve our club and community.
- We practice our profession with integrity, and inspire others to behave ethically through our own words and actions.
- Help young people achieve his or her career aspirations.
- Guide and encourage others in their professional development.
- Network with associates to help serve others.
- Strengthen the emphasis on vocation and classification in new member recruitment and induction.
- Identify means of emphasizing vocation in club activities.
- Create a stronger emphasis on business networking with integrity in Rotary at the club and district level.
- Focus more attention on business networking with integrity as a means of attracting and mentoring the new generation.
- Emphasize the connection between the Four Way Test and the Rotary Code of Conduct (formerly called: Declaration of Rotarians in Business and Professions) and their importance to the values of Rotary.
- Devote the first meeting in October to examining the second Avenue of Service, including The FourWay Test and The Declaration of Rotarians in Business and Professions. After expanding members' awareness, solicit their input in planning projects for the remainder of the year.
- Introduce a "mini-classifications talk" series in which each member gives a five-minute talk on his or her vocation. Schedule one speaker for the beginning of each meeting until everyone has made a presentation. The purpose of these talks is to promote vocational awareness among Rotarians and help them recognize the worthiness of all useful occupations.
- Present a vocational award to someone in the community who has exemplified outstanding professional achievement while maintaining very high ethical standards. Promote the presentation within the community, and consider making it an annual October event.
- Invite experts to give a presentation on the vocational needs of the community and develop a project in response to those needs. Possible projects could focus on developing character, providing career information to youth, mentoring small businesses, or organizing workshops that provide employees with new skills.
- Encourage club members to put their vocational skills to work as a Rotary Volunteer. Volunteer opportunities are available on ProjectLINK, a valuable resource that lists many vocational projects that clubs and districts can also choose to support financially or with donated goods.
- Conduct any other activities associated with the effective operation of the club.

The Rotary Club of Saint Lucia hosted its weekly meetings via the zoom platform. Our monthly Board Meetings and Business Meetings happened as planned.

Our 'Rotary in a Minute' Rotarian was Crisy Laurent and our 'Know Your Rotarian' this month was VP PP Selma St. Prix, PHF.

Club activities for the month included Training in My Rotary by PE Gordon and Vocational Talks by PP Frank.

Additionally, our New Year's Feeding of the Poor and Homeless took place as scheduled. We always look forward to this initiative.






