BBBS:HELPING KIDS SUCCEED THROUGH MENTORING

Shelly Chinberg is the Regional Area Director of South Central Kansas in Kansas Big Brothers Big Sisters. She has spent her entire career in development and advancement on behalf of notfor-profit organizations, and is passionate about their role in our community.



f you want to know how to change a life, just talk with Shelly Chinberg.
She'll tell you how being a "Big" (a big brother or big sister) to a youth who is facing adversity can make all the difference in that child's perspective.

The mission of Big Brothers Big Sisters is simple: to create and support one-to-one mentoring relationships that ignite the power and promise of youth. Adult mentors initiate and lead the development of friendship with a child or young adult from age 5 to 25. The relationship is not about parenting or authority.

"Littles," or the youth who are matched with an adult, most often live in households that are either at or below the poverty level. The majority come from a single-parent home. More than half live in homes where there is either alcohol or drug addiction.

With these challenges in their lives, having an adult "Big" who can offer regular one-on-one attention gives these youth an opportunity to connect in a positive way. Activities they share together don't have to be costly or over-the-top entertainment. Something as simple as going for a walk together in a park or sharing a meal can be the highlight of a young person's week. Chinberg reminded us that things we may thing are everyday can be amazing new experiences for a little. "Let your ordinary be their extraordinary," she advised.

There are two ways an adult can mentor a child through BBBS. The first is community-based, where an individual, a couple, or a family is matched with a child. Prior to being matched, the applications of Bigs and Littles are reviewed by inhouse Match Support Specialists, who look for shared interests and hobbies. The goal is to establish a meaningful relationship.

The second avenue for mentoring is a site-based match where the Big typically meets the Little at his/her school during the Little's lunch time. In this setting, the Big meets with the Little 3—4 times per month for 30—45 minutes for a minimum of two semesters.

If you're worried about being a "perfect" match for a Little, Chinberg says not to worry—you don't have to be perfect. Don't worry about your age, either. You'll be matched with a child who's delighted to have you in his life. Not much disposable income? No worries there. Many free and low-cost entertainment options abound in Wichita.
