LEARNING ABOUT ICT SOS



hen she launched ICT SOS ten years ago, Jen White wasn't a social worker, a law enforcement officer, or a parent whose child was a runaway. But when she read a statistic that the average age of children who are trafficked was 12 years old, the same age of her daughter at the time, she wanted to do something, anything, to end human trafficking for good.

First, let's define what human trafficking is. It is when a person is being taken advantage of for an exchange of value. In other words, buying and selling people. Delving more deeply into the issue, Jen realized that there were already many great things happening here in Wichita to support people who have been trafficked and ending trafficking, but these good things were happening in silos.

She focused on bringing people together in the foster care system, domestic violence shelters, and law enforcement to provide education of the issue. She and her staff have developed a curriculum they present to students attending area middle and high schools.

They also provide direct assistance in the form of "Fresh Start" bags—duffel bags containing about \$200 worth of new clothes, hygiene items, coupons for fast food, and journals and pens for adults, books and toys for children.

Imagine a teenager who has been trafficked being picked up by law enforcement at the motel where they've been held against their will. Giving them the Fresh Start bag helps convey the message that "You're not in trouble. Let's get you something to eat and a shower if you need it." It helps the adolescent or child become more comfortable in talking.

Realizing that law enforcement officers cannot serve as victims' case managers, ICT SOS recently hired an adult advocate to work with victims. Jen White is committed to end human trafficking in our community. She loves tacos, Mr. Rogers, and is Mom to two amazing kids. She didn't set out to start a local not-for-profit organization, she just wanted to end human trafficking. Ten years later, she's raising awareness as the Executive Director of ICT SOS.

Jen explained that when a victim is younger than 18 years of age, prosecutors don't have to prove that someone tricked or forced or threatened the youth into being trafficked. The exchange of value that is a crime could be something as simple as giving a youth an iPad, a place to stay, or just a meal in return for sex.

She also shared that almost all sex trafficking cases have an internet component. The internet is used to meet children and adolescents online in order to recruit and groom them

Locally the Exploited and Missing Children Unit of the Wichita Police Department reports there are 50—60 trafficking cases a week documented in Wichita. Nationally, the number of reported online crimes jumped from 380,000 to 1.2 million after schools shut down due to COVID.
