COMING UP: A SPECIAL EVENT FOR FIRST RESPONDERS



In addition to working as the General Manager of Reflection Ridge Golf Club, a position he has held since 2015, Burt Ussery is also the mayor of Clearwater, Kansas, population 2,481. Ussery is a retired Marine officer, serving for 21 years, as well as a business executive with more than 20 years' experience in planning, process improvement, operations, and business development.

urt Ussery's story today was about service above self. Not his own, but the service of dozens of volunteers in our community who have come together to hold a special day honoring first responders each year on 9/11. The date was chosen to show the utmost respect for what first responders do. Members of Reflection Ridge willingly give up the use of the course that day as their show of support.

The story began when Ussery started a golf tournament at Reflection Ridge in 2016 to honor veterans. It was a great success with both veterans and volunteers. Following an emergency at Reflection Ridge where firefighters saved the day, Ussery decided to start another tournament—this time, to honor the brave first responders who put their

lives on the line in their work as law enforcement officers, fire fighters, emergency medical technicians, and others.

What evolved was a special day where 20—22 teams of four first responders can play golf, relax, and enter into some good-natured competition between fire, police, and EMS. Participants must be fulltime employees at their agency. This is not a tournament where the winner takes all—each player receives a nice gift package with items donated by many of the tournament's 40—45 sponsors.

Although it may take some arm twisting to find volunteers for other area golf tournaments, this is one where being a volunteer is a coveted position. Each green has two volunteers who hold the flag and spot the ball. Other volunteers work at check-in and of course, the always popular beverage cart.

And while many events vie for media coverage, Ussery says this event isn't about publicity. The spotlight is on the people who go out of their way every day to serve others. Some participants, due to the private and undercover nature of their work, can't even appear in team photos.

In concluding his presentation, it was easy to see that in looking for a way to honor those who humbly serve, Burt Ussery lives the words of wisdom that he shared with us:

We live in a complicated time. Have a level head—trust yourself, trust your faith, and as you follow your passion, make sure it's based in truth.
