arly in the calendar year our club is treated to a visit from Rotarians who are here as part of RITE— Rotary Inter-country Teacher Exchange program. And every time they visit, it's as though they're bringing a little piece of their home countries to share with us.

This year's visitors are from Argentina and Panama. During a break in their school year they're in Wichita to learn more about the profession of teaching as well as sample American culture. Ingrid Villamonte, from Panama, noted that she had never seen snow until arriving here and was actually enjoying the cold weather. Panama, she told us, is either rainy or hot, but never cold.

We also learned that teachers, both public and private, are mandated to teach English in Argentine schools. [This could explain why their English is excellent!]

Florencia Zappia and Gimena Rios, both Argentine teachers, explained that Argentina is a country of six regions. They are both from Buenos Aires, a city of 15.6 million that is the nation's capital. The tango is their country's national dance. While both of them are very busy serving as teachers, they manage to have fun with their families and doing volunteer work. Florencia volunteers at a local animal shelter and grows her long dark hair to donate it to an organization that makes wigs for people who have lost their hair. Gimena also volunteers in her community, cleaning rivers and collecting Christmas gifts for underprivileged children.

## RITE VISITORS (CONT'D FROM P. 1)

Located in Central America, Panama spans the southern tip of North America, extending into the northern part of South America. Our Panamanian visitors explained that they had to travel for eight hours by bus to get to the airport for their trip to the United States. As part of their service to their Rotary Club, David, which was chartered on February 3, 1932, they provide water filters to indigenous people in rural communities who do not have access to potable water.

The long days of teaching school and the sacrifices needed to get there—Ingrid explained that she used to have to take a bus on a five-hour one-way trip to get to her school before moving—do not seem to dampen the spirits of these dedicated teachers. Ingrid is the only English teacher at her school, which serves 247 students from kindergarten through sixth grade. Ivan works on an Indian reservation and is provided with no classroom supplies. Florencia teaches three shifts of school for a total of 12 hours per day and Gimena teaches two shifts for 10 hours daily.

Dalia Hale, a retired teacher and member of the West Wichita Rotary Club, accompanied the RITE visitors. She helps coordinate the exchange program, which includes sending teachers from Wichita to Panama for two weeks during the summer. A visitor to Panama herself, she said that the capital, Panama City, is nicknamed "Panhattan" for its resemblance to the Big Apple. It is a very beautiful city and inexpensive to visit—an Uber ride from one end of the city to the other is just \$4. As a result of U.S. involvement in the construction of the Panama Canal, which was constructed from 1904—1914, there continues to be much American cultural influence in Panama.

We are grateful as a club to experience a bit of international culture and friendship with our visitors. And we thank our club members and their spouses who serve as hosts, which are the heart of this program: Eric and Robin McGonigle, Fred and Joyce Heismeyer, and Tom and Peggy Church. We wish our new friends safe travels home and great memories of their Wichita visit.
