CHECKING OUT THE NEW ADVANCED LEARNING LIBRARY

Cynthia Berner explains that in the first month since opening on June 16 the Advanced Learning Library has loaned out 66,000 items—more than half the average at the former Central Library on south Main Street. Planning for the library was like a “blank canvas,” she said, where the community came together to plan and collaborate.



Wichita’s Advanced Learning Library (ALL) is the newest addition to our city’s greater downtown area. Although it took only two years to build, the project was about ten years in the making. It began with an idea—merge technology with the traditional concept of a library—to create a place that is welcoming, educational, and, dare we say, fun.

Let’s start with the design of the ALL. It has 105,000 square feet, compared with the former Central Library, which had 79,000 square feet. Almost everywhere natural light pours in through large ceiling-to-floor windows. Three conference rooms can become one, accommodating up to 300 people for a meeting. Just inside the west entrance you’ll find a coffee

and pastry shop operated by Reverie Roasters.

An outdoor terrace on the east side of the building’s second floor provides a beautiful view of the city skyline along with a quiet spot for reading. The terrace can also be rented for after-hours social events.

A big change for young families is the location of the Children’s Pavilion on the first floor, making it much more convenient and accessible than the former Central Library’s Children’s Corner. This attractive space with its cheerful, brightly-colored furniture and kid-friendly play areas makes you want to sit down and play with the magnetile tables—if only you could fit on the tiny chairs!

Teens also have their own area that includes both individual and group study space, along with multiple

computers that can be used for studying and even gaming.

Collaboration rooms on the first floor make working in teams easier, with the ability to connect with remote team members. A “green” room that is part of the suite serves as an audiovisual studio complete with editing equipment and software.

For guests who lack internet access at home, the ALL is teeming with connectivity, including charging ports for smartphones and tablets.

The library cost \$38 million to build, with the City of Wichita contributing \$30 million and private donors providing the remainder. If you haven’t seen it yet, you should. But plan for a visit of several hours. One hour for touring, and the rest for reading. Because technology and fun are just today’s means to help you discover new worlds—and that’s still what libraries are all about.
