HANDWRITING DOESN'T LIE: NEURO GRAPHO THERAPEUTICS



As a licensed international forensic handwriting specialist, Kim Garcia identifies the emotions that impact our handwriting. By making changes in our handwriting we can rise to our highest potential.

hat does your handwriting say about you? Kim Garcia, today's speaker, says your handwriting can tell everything about you from your birth to the present moment, with the exception of identifying your age, gender, handedness, religion, or anything physically identifying.

Garcia was a therapist for 30 years when she met a writer for the crime drama television series "Criminal Minds." She was so intrigued by the idea of being able to identify criminal traits through handwriting analysis that she received the training. As a forensic handwriting analyst she not only identifies handwriting traits of criminal behavior. suicidal tendencies, and depression, but can identify the reasons for this behavior ... and help begin the process of change.

To Garcia, handwriting is

"mind" writing because it reflects what is going on in your mind. Our minds create our reality and we are limited only by how we see ourselves.

Every word that we write has an upper, middle, and lower zone. The upper zone reflects what is going on from the top of our heads to the top of our heart. The middle zone—the top of the heart to lower abdomen. And the lower zone reflects the lower abdomen to the bottom of the feet.

Garcia said, "Handwriting is expressive and silent gestures not seen until the writing tool begins to tell the inside story, exposing the visual history of your emotions, mentally and physically." She explained that people with violent behavior have identifiable weapon shapes in their writing and showed illustrations. The lower case "y", when written with a half circle at the bottom, or "felon's claw" is an expression of resentful and vengeful behavior.

Garcia then presented three samples of handwriting and asked which person we would hire, based on their handwriting. Most Rotarians chose either Writer A or C. "Congratulations," she told us. "Those of you who chose A just hired Dennis Rader, or BTK. And those who chose C just hired Lizzie Borden." But what about B? "That is the handwriting of Steve Jobs," she explained.

Training people to identify handwriting indicator traits of suicide and violence with the goal of getting help before the writer acts on those traits is Garcia's goal as a therapist. She is currently writing a book on seeing signs of suicide in handwriting—a message of help and hope for people who may not know they need it.
