#### ROTARY NOTARY





Mary Jones, CEO/President of the Mental Health America of South Central Kansas, gave our club an wonderful overview of the mental health landscape in our area. Mary began by highlighting some startling national statistics such as 5% of adults and 13% of youth report serious thoughts of suicide and 18% of adults in the US had a substance use disorder in the past year. Locally, she stated that there is an estimate of over 600 people who are homeless, although this estimate may be low and over 40 people died on the streets of Wichita due to issues around homeless conditions. She talked about the partnerships of many agencies who are working together to reduce homelessness and increase services for those with mental health issues, as well as the good that is happening with the Multi-Agency Center that just opened and the building of the South Central Regional Mental Health Hospital to meet the most serious cases of mental illness. In conclusion she emphasized the services needed for the homeless population; are those of housing, employment, mental health support, substance abuse programs, case management, hot meal sites, food bank access, and access to other service resources. Anyone of us who travel up/down Broadway are very aware of the homelessness in our community, but this situation is across our county and state. Thanks Mary for educating EW Rotarians.

#### Kansas Legislative Actions Supporting Mental Health

- •10 million in federal funding awarded in August 2023 to enhance the integration of primary and behavioral health care.
- •\$10 million in additional federal funding announced in December 2024 to further advance whole person care by fostering collaboration between behavioral health clinics and primary care providers.
- •\$1 million federal planning grant received in March 2023 to support the transition of Community Mental Health Centers to Certified Community Behavioral Health Clinics, aiming to expand access to integrated care.
- •\$9 million grant over five years announced in September 2022 to improve student behavioral health services in southeast Kansas through the KanAWARE initiative.
- \$13.5 million in Mental Health Intervention Team grants allocated in fiscal year 2024 to school districts for enhancing mental health services within educational settings.

#### Mental Health and Homelessness

- 691 persons are homeless in Wichita and Sedgwick County.
- 188 of the 691 individuals are unsheltered

   this is a 25% increase from last year.
- Wichita is higher than the national average of percentage of homeless people with a serious mental illness.
- 46 homeless people as of fall 2024 had died in Sedgwick County. This is an increase form all of 2023.
- Serious mental illness is a significant risk factor for losing housing.



- MAC brings together multiple providers to provide wrap-around services at the same location as additional year-round, low-barrier shelter beds for anyone experiencing homelessness or at-risk of being homeless to receive services designed to move people into housing.
- The homeless population in Wichita ranges from 700-1200 people at a time.
- Since November 2024, HumanKind Ministries, Inc. Has been providing emergency winter shelter at he shite of the future MAC, serving hundreds of people each day.
- The EWS is an emergency winter shelter that provides a space for people to get off the streets and provide them with means and shelter them overnight.
- Specifically, MHASCK has served over 140 individuals, linking them to services and other help.
- Starting April 1, 2025, MAC board will take over supervision of operations. The fully formed vision is to create a space here in our community where a person can come in off the streets.

#### Mental Health and Substance Abuse Coalition Wichita – Sedgwick County

In 2019, a group of leaders from law enforcement, health care, behavioral health programs, private businesses, education and local nonprofits formed the Mental Health and Substance Abuse Coalition. It was the natural evolution of a group that had been working at the intersection of mental health, substance abuse and homeless issues in Wichita and the surrounding areas for several years.

MHSAC's mission is to develop a sustainable, accessible and integrated system of care that serves people with mental health and substance abuse disorders who are in crisis, to efficiently and effectively deliver services that create positive outcomes.

#### My purpose, passion in Rotary – and pet portraits

This is how I feel about Rotary. I'll be 90 years old in June and joined Rotary at a relatively late age. I went on my first volunteer trip to Guatemala in 2006 to help install stoves for Mayan families. Those stoves changed their lives, and the experience changed mine.

As we installed stoves, I enjoyed talking with the families and asked them what other assistance would be helpful. Most often, someone would reply that clean drinking water would be the most significant improvement. I promised them I would help, and that became my purpose in Rotary.

When you reach my age, you realize that without a *purpose*, you are like a rudderless boat. Purpose with a capital "P" gives one the excitement to live. I learned how Rotary Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene (WASH) grants worked and began putting them together. I realized these grants could be extraordinarily impactful because they used both district funds and matching funds from The Rotary Foundation.

I approached other clubs in my district and elsewhere in the U.S. and Canada. Amazingly, the idea caught on. Soon, we were doing grants for clean water all over the world. As of 2023, these water projects have helped more than 2 million people in 34 countries. If that's not spectacular, I don't know what is! My Purpose has become a Passion. I think about it day and night.

Since it worked once, I'm trying it again. My new Passion is to help kids with cleft lip and palate deformities. When I retired in 2000 after a career as a stockbroker with Merrill Lynch, I took an adult education class in oil painting and got hooked. I use only one palette knife and no brushes. I now use the hobby to support cleft palate surgeries. I have painted almost 800 pet portraits to raise money for this cause. The funds go to support Rotary global grants. It breaks my heart to see kids in that condition, and thankfully, Rotary allows me to help change their lives. Before the surgeries, they are outcasts. They have a hard time eating and drinking. Surgeries fix all that, which brings me great joy and happiness.

It wouldn't have happened without a Purpose that became my Passion. My excitement keeps me going – even at 90.






