MEET WICHITA'S INTERIM POLICE CHIEF, LEM MOORE



Lem Moore was born in St. Joseph, Missouri but when he came to Wichita at age 16 to visit his mother, he loved it so much he stayed. What did he love so much? "The melting pot aspect of Wichita. I saw so many diverse people here!" he said. Lem is the first in his family to graduate from high school, attending Southeast High and graduating from East.

hen you meet
Lem Moore for
the first time,
what stands
out are his transparency and
sincerity. Four years after
being promoted to Deputy
Chief, he was named Interim
Police Chief following the
departure of Chief Gordon
Ramsay, who moved back to
his hometown of Duluth, MN.

He admitted that he was on track to retire when he received the call earlier this year asking him to serve as Interim Police Chief. After consulting with his pastor, he accepted.

And then the media firestorm hit. Not because of his promotion, but because of incidents involving area law enforcement officers, including some from the Wichita Police Department (WPD).

The first incident was the death of foster teen Cedric Lofton, who was restrained with handcuffs and shackles and placed lying face down while at the Juvenile Intake and Assessment Center last September. He lost consciousness and never came to, dying two days later. The autopsy report released in late December, a month before Moore accepted the position of interim police chief, called the death a "homicide," resulting in harsh criticism and a call for action.

The second incident involved a group of law enforcement officers who sent inappropriate and racist text messages, resulting in an investigation. After less than two months on the job, Moore was asked to comment on incidents that took place before his appointment. "This [the interim police chief position] was supposed to be a six-month great experience for me!" he told us.

Realizing he had been chosen to lead a group of 700 commissioned officers, he is doing just that—leading. The FBI, which was brought in to investigate the racism case, did not find any criminal or civil rights violations from WPD officers. Moore also emphasized that the incidents in question involve a very small percentage of the total number of officers.

Moore believes strongly that Wichita police must change how they respond to mental health crises and interact with juveniles. He is advocating that SWAT team officers receive civil rights and mental health training. Also, he is meeting with representatives from the City Council, the city manager's office and legal department about what the police department can do better. "This is our time to shine," is what he's telling his officers. "What matters is how you treat people, your vision."
