ew people know that the United States disbanded its navy after winning the Revolutionary War because, after defeating the British, we "didn't need it."

It wasn't long before our nation's leaders realized the U.S. needed protection from other threats. In 1794 Congress authorized the construction of six frigates. The U.S.S. Constitution was one of them. These frigates were the genesis of the Navy we know today.

The Navy is important for preserving free trade around the world. Why? While 70% of the earth is covered by water, 90% of global commerce is conducted by sea. And 95% of world phone and internet traffic is transmitted by undersea cables. The increasing

global economy has led to our country's greater dependence on its navy.

Currently 400,000 active and reserve members make up the Navy, with 70,000 deployed around the world. The Navy has 280 ships; 95 are overseas. There are six major commands across the world with a wide variety of missions, including: Middle East strike operations, Gulf of Aden maritime security, and rapid response humanitarian missions that conduct search and rescue efforts along with delivering humanitarian relief.

Areas of concern for our nation's security include the South China Sea, the Black Sea, Syria/Iraq, Afghanistan, Libya, Iran, China, and North Korea. But beyond that, another challenge is that the number of navy

ships has been cut in half over the last 30 years, yet deployments are the same.

Recruitment is another challenge of the Navy, which is pulling out all the stops to recruit and to reshape training.

The Navy the nation needs includes more ships. The Zumwalt-class destroyer is an example of the next generation of combat ships that, according to Rear Admiral Fritzemeier, "should make our enemies very concerned." One reason is its unique hull structure, making it hard to detect by radar.

During the Q and A following his presentation, the Admiral was asked if the U.S. Navy can take down the internet in a certain area of the world. He paused to consider the question, and then responded firmly, "Does the U.S. have cyber capability? Yes."
