MASTER STORYTELLER LARRY HATTEBERG MESMERIZES EWR

Larry Hatteberg retired from KAKE-TV in 2014 after working there for 51 years. He's best known for his long-running series "Hatteberg's People," which profiles Kansans who make our state an interesting place to live. Today he enjoys traveling to Europe to meet, and photograph, fascinating people there.



ortunately for us Kansans as well as other fans of Hatteberg's People all over the globe, Larry Hatteberg ignored the advice of a school counselor who told him he had no aptitude for either journalism or photojournalism. Viewers have been richly rewarded by his observations about ordinary people whose stories illuminate larger issues ever since he joined KAKE-TV in 1963 as a part-time film technician.

Hatteberg sees that our lives are changed every day by the people we meet. Everyone becomes a teacher in some way. Even a man who hadn't bathed in years, a man who lived in a hole in the ground for 30 years, yet who was one of the happiest and most content persons Hatteberg had ever met: Ernie Dittimore.

original story. But it was the opportunity to hear the back story from Hatteberg today showed how a man who was avoided and discounted in life can teach all of us some profound lessons.

Dittimore lived on 80 mostly wooded acres in Doniphan County, located in northeast Kansas. A journalist from the Topeka Capitol-Journal contacted Hatteberg about the eccentric old man, who had thrown the journalist off his land. Hatteberg might have better luck getting a story.

It was a rare case of being unable to learn much about his subject through research. Wary-eyed townspeople didn't offer much more than a funny look when Hatteberg asked them about Dittimore.

After reaching the property's borders Hatteberg called out to Dittimore, who responded, perhaps after determining that Hatteberg was an okay guy. And that began a captivating look into the world of a man who lived very primitively with little human contact, yet who was at peace because of the treasures he found all around him—treasures like watching the rain fall and drip from the leaves of his trees, observing a night sky blazing with stars, or watching a sunrise transform everything it touches.

Hatteberg produced the story during the summer of 1995. Ernie Dittimore passed away just six months later. Sadly, relatives who had shunned Dittimore during his lifetime came out of the woodwork to claim a share of his estate.

"We write people off,"
Hatteberg told us. "Ernie
Dittimore changed my life.
Whenever I look at a sunrise
or a sunset, I still see his face
beside it." Thanks to Larry
Hatteberg's storytelling,
Ernie Dittimore lives on and
changes us, too.

In 1957 nine African-American students attempted to enroll at Little Rock Central High School but were prohibited from doing so by the Arkansas governor, Orval Faubus. While watching the live news coverage, Hatteberg, then a seventh grader, knew he wanted to become a journalist.
