ROSS JANSSEN ON OUR AMAZING KANSAS WEATHER



hannel 12's chief meteorologist, Ross Janssen, has been fascinated with the weather since he was a youngster growing up on the family farm in Geneseo, KS, where he says he had "a lot of time to look at the clouds."

All of that cloud watching has served him well. After studying atmospheric science at KU and began his broadcast career at Channel 6 in Lawrence. He moved to Wichita in 2004 and earned the National Weather Association Seal of Approval.

Ross's enthusiasm and knowledge of Kansas weather made for a lively, interactive presentation chock-full of information we bet you didn't already know.

Such as: How many tornadoes touch down in Kansas each year? On average about 80. This year we're running below normal.

Why are we below normal this year? The development of tornadoes is dependent on regional temperatures. This year, temperatures have been cooler than normal in Oklahoma and Texas, and warmer than normal in the northern Plains, resulting in fewer tornadoes.

Have we moved out of Tornado Alley? NO! Our location —east of the Rockies and north of the Gulf of Mexico—ensures that Kansans will experience tornadoes annually.

When was the last EF-5 Kansas tornado? In Greensburg in 2007. EF-5 tornadoes are extremely rare, making up fewer than 2% of all tornadoes.

Do tornadoes have an eye, like a hurricane? No. Tornadoes are much smaller in size than hurricanes, which can be 80—100 miles wide.

Does a green sky indicate that a tornado is near? No. It can mean a lot of things.

What are the hottest and coldest recorded temperatures in Kansas? The coldest is 40 degrees below zero in Lebanon, KS in 1905. The hottest temperature is 121 degrees in Alton, KS in 1936.

What is the greatest snowfall recorded in Kansas? In March 2009 Pratt recorded 30" of snow. The most snow in one season was the winter of 1979 -1980 in Goodland, Kansas.

What is the largest hailstone in Kansas? In September 2010 a hailstone weighing 7.75 pounds was found in Wichita.

How many radar units are there in the United States? The U.S. government operates 160 radar units.

What causes temperature swings from month-to-month? Believe it or not, temperatures in the Indian Ocean.

Weather Predictions:

The weather phenomenon known as La Nina means colder than normal water near the Equator and Pacific Ocean. In this pattern, the Plains will be dry, and drought is not out of the ordinary. Because of La Nina, here are Ross's predictions for the coming months:

September—An average month—not too hot, no early frost.

October—It will skew cooler, slightly cooler than normal.

November—Warm.

December—Colder, with an early start to winter.

January—Warmer.

February—We may see the deep cold that we experienced last year.

Remember, being a meteorologist is one of the few jobs where you can be wrong and still get paid!
