A PROGRAM TO STOP REPEAT SEXUAL OFFENSES



BJ Mills is a licensed clinical social worker who works with sex offenders toward a goal of not repeating their offenses ever again. Most of his clients are court-ordered to participate and have to pay program costs themselves. In more than 20 years not a single offender who has completed the program has been charged with a sexual offense a second time.

hen you think about human trafficking one image that comes to mind is that of a group of men or women held in captivity to provide either labor or sexual services without their consent. You may think of teenage runaways who leave home and end up in the snares of people who prey on their youth and naiveté. Or you may picture a "dirty old man" who approaches children in public places. The people who perpetrate these crimes are usually unrepentant, hardened criminals who, if convicted, end up spending the rest of their lives in prison.

What you may not think of are people who have committed offenses still considered part of the big picture of human trafficking, but who, with help, can accept responsibility for their actions, feel remorse, and not repeat the offense again.

Bradley, or BJ, Mills designed a program to work with this type of offender. A minister, he later earned a master's degree in social work and found himself working with both juvenile delinquents and adult offenders. What he learned was that some adults make terrible mistakes that have a tremendous cost to them and their loved ones. Through this program, they can learn not to repeat the offense.

The program takes 1 1/2 to 2 years to complete. Clients who have accepted a term of probation are required to participate. The probation itself is very restrictive, requiring a curfew every night and barring participants from many different social and community activ-

ities that could trigger their inclination toward harmful behavior to innocent members of the public. For example, participants are not allowed to go into a bar for any reason whatsoever, even if they don't have a drink. Violating the terms of probation can lead to arrest, followed by prison.

What Mills tries to achieve with every offender is the realization that his actions hurt others deeply. Writing a letter of apology to those who have been hurt is part of the program.

Upon completion most offenders learn they have already lost much that they will never fully recover—their reputation, their relationships, and their former way of life. But they also learn never to harm another person by viewing them as property to be used for their own pleasure or gain.
