WICHITA POLICE CHIEF CANDID ABOUT CHALLENGES, OPPORTUNITIES



Gordon Ramsay was sworn in as the Wichita Police Chief in January 2016. He's a first generation American, as both of his parents emigrated to the U.S. from Scotland. Chief Ramsay loves police work and goes on calls about once a month.

ith law enforcement officers seemingly under attack in some communities Chief Gordon Ramsay feels grateful that Wichita has been so welcoming to him and his family.

After taking over the department just over a year ago, Ramsay says there's a lot to be proud of. The department is able to solve about 92% of homicides, well above the national average of 50%.

He's also pleased that positive community relations have led to citizens reporting what they've seen or know, helping the department solve violent crimes.

But with 650 officers, the department is down 20 from 2009. Working on a recent Friday evening, Ramsay had 30 calls waiting when he began his shift. The high volume of calls means that police have less time to build relationships in the community.

With the goal of making all areas of the city safe, Ramsay is using technology to observe and record not only behavior in areas such as Old Town, but also his officers. As of last July, 100% of Wichita police officers wear body cameras. They are very effective tools in ensuring that officers and the people they encounter are accountable for their behavior.

The challenge is that these cameras generate a lot of video. 50,000 new videos each month, to be exact. And they're worthless if they can't be accessed when needed. That's why Ramsay needs a storage system that can catalog and save these videos. It costs \$380,000.

the nationwide heroin epidemic, Ramsay said that it is partly due to over-prescribing opiates, the result of "America's desire to be pain-free." Property crimes are on the rise because addicts are desperate for cash to purchase drugs, cash they can obtain by selling stolen property.

The biggest issue the police chief deals with? Traffic. While sitting at a red light he observes the behavior of the driver next to him. More often than not, that person is texting or reading on his phone. The department is bringing back motorcycle officers to deal with the increase in traffic accidents.

Gordon Ramsay is a leader who is committed to serve his officers, and the community. He's a good fit for Wichita, and we're glad he's here.
