DISCOVERING THE ICE AGE AND MORE AT EXPLORATION PLACE

xploration Place is one of the premier science centers in the Midwest. And, as President Jan Luth explained, it keeps growing and serving Kansas in new, exciting ways.

For example, in 2016 Exploration Place attracted 230,000 visitors, a total that includes 55,000 children participating in the Directed Education program. A new program that is being piloted, the Educator-in-Residence program, takes a science educator to Kansas communities, bringing along portable exhibits.

Giving children hands-on experiences in the STEM (science, technology, engineering, math) fields is a way to make those topics come alive. Their day at

E.P. may just be the spark that lights their curiosity about science, leading to a future career in STEM work. Introducing elementary school students to the sciences is a critical part of workforce development in our community.

As Rotarians wound their way through the exhibits, tour guide Laurie Gregory explained that a few hundred children from schools as far away as Emporia were visiting today. They shrieked excitedly as they tried on medieval-looking costumes in the castle area and played with seven-foot tall "Big Mouth," an oversized replica of the human mouth that includes a tooth with a cavity and braces. Many of us wished we'd had a museum and science center like

Exploration Place when we were growing up.

"Discovering the Ice Age" and "Voyage to Vietnam" are two traveling exhibits that opened late last month. In April, the "Explore Kansas" exhibit will open on Earth Day. "Design Build Fly," a new exhibit about the aviation industry, will open next December.

A long-time favorite exhibit is "Kansas in Miniature," an animated display of Kansas in the 1950s that includes a model train, 200 period vehicles, 125 buildings, and 51 animations. It features replicas of historic Kansas buildings and geographic attractions such as Chimney Rock.

We enjoyed today's fireside and look forward to the next one!
