GUADALUPE CLINIC: SERVING THE UNINSURED SINCE 1985



here do you go for medical care if you've lost your job and your health insurance and can't pay for a visit to the doctor?

Some might respond, "The emergency room of the nearest hospital." But if you're not in an emergency situation, Guadalupe Clinic could be what you need.

Guadalupe Clinic has a mission to provide necessary health care for those in need. Named for the school that formerly occupied the clinic's main location at 940 S. St. Francis, Guadalupe Clinic opened on July 8, 1985. Six nurses used the site to open a "health station" that was open three days a week.

Gear described a "mission moment" he witnessed recently. A woman was standing in the hallway of the Clinic, crying. But they were tears of joy, she explained. Uninsured for two years, she needed a checkup and health care services before she could work again. "I've never had such care and compassion from a health care provider before," she told him.

Guadalupe Clinic serves adults because children without private insurance have Medicaid. Typically patients are those who work but don't receive health insurance from their employer, those who do not qualify for Medicaid, or those who live within 250% of the federal poverty level.

Patients can see physicians who specialize in areas such as podiatry, allergy and asthma, gastroenterology, pulmonology, and more. The only requirement, in addition to proof of income, isn't really a requirement. for your medical visit. If you can't, you won't be turned away.

This generosity to the medically underserved is a reflection of the many in this community who donate their time, treasure, and talent for the good of others. Each of the physicians and nurses you see at the Clinic is a volunteer.

The Clinic needs volunteers for its non-medical needs too. Related to Guadalupe Clinic but governed by a separate board of directors is the Guadalupe Health Foundation, which organizes the annual "Midwest Winefest" held in the spring. Volunteers can help pour wine during the Old Town Walkabout or the Grand Tasting and Auction.

Gear concluded today's presentation by telling East Wichita Rotarians, "Call me if you'd like to volunteer," Gear said. "I'll put you to work!"
