TODD RAMSEY INVITES US ALL TO HELP WICHITA DREAM BIG



Todd Ramsey is the founder and chief strategist of Apples & Arrows, a branding agency here in Wichita. He told us, "Brands live in the hearts and minds of people who experience them.

odd Ramsey remembers the huge inferiority complex our city had when he first moved here 14 years ago. Residents apologized for what they saw as Wichita's shortcomings, often wondering aloud why anyone would want to move here.

But during the last five years Wichitans' pride has swelled. A visible rallying point has been the resurgence of the Wichita flag, designed in 1937 by Cecil McAlister, who won \$40 for his efforts. More people are displaying the flag or related merchandise in their homes, places of business, and cars. For those of us who have spent most or all of our lives here, it's a good feeling to know that hometown pride exists here.

Ramsey loves the flag, too, but worries that our love for it is just a fad, one that will wear off in just a few years. How do we transform our growing pride into a vision for our city, one we can share with adult children who have moved away, with visitors, and with each other?

As Ramsey explained, the Wichita flag is a symbol, not the substance, of the many things we Wichitans love about our city. Knowing we can't be all things to all people, who are the people we want to attract? What is the message we want to share? For example, many of us trumpet the fact that our cost of living is low here, but does that also communicate that there are few amenities, resulting in "nothing to do" here?

We've called ourselves the "air capital of the world" for many years. But is that how

we want to continue to be known, especially as we try to diversify our economy so that it is not so aviationdependent?

Many entrepreneurs launched national corporations here. We're seeing a cluster of craft breweries start up here. And we have an amazing custom car culture here, the byproduct of talented aircraft builders who enjoy creating something beautiful outside of work. We're a city of makers, builders, doers.... how does that become part of our message?

These questions led Ramsey to ask another question, which was about the future of Century II Performing Arts and Convention Center. He believes that whatever happens on this site, whether Century II is remodeled or razed, the resulting facility will directly affect Wichita's ability to attract (cont'd on p. 2)

A Brief History of Thanksgiving

The tradition of the Pilgrims' first Thanksgiving is steeped in myth and legend. Few people realize that the Pilgrims did not celebrate Thanksgiving the next year, or any year thereafter, though some of their descendants later made a "Forefather's Day" that usually occurred on December 21 or 22. In 1827, Mrs. Sarah Josepha Hale began lobbying several Presidents for the creation of Thanksgiving as a national holiday, but her lobbying was unsuccessful until 1863, when Abraham Lincoln finally made it a national holiday.



Today, our Thanksgiving is the fourth Thursday of November. This was set by President Franklin D. Roosevelt in 1939 (approved by Congress in 1941), who changed it from Abraham Lincoln's designation as the *last* Thursday in November (which could occasionally end up being the fifth Thursday, and hence too close to Christmas for businesses). But the Pilgrims' first Thanksgiving began at some unknown date between September 21 and November 9, most likely in very early October.
