## EWR MEMBERS ARE BUILDING Community Every Day



EWR members Michael Moeder and Anthony Ndungu presented expanded business briefs about their professions and their passion for getting involved in the Wichita community.

ichael Moeder returned to Wichita after ten years of living abroad and in several different US cities. A growing, exciting vibe happening here convinced him to come back. Now he's the Director of Community and Business Advancement for KMUW, Wichita's NPR station (National Public Radio).

Moeder said that listeners come for the programming but stay for the community. KMUW sponsors 60 events annually, including an Old Town Concert Series, a book club, a bicycle club, a "Fill Your Mug" event, a running team, and a sold-out Science Friday at the Orpheum Theatre.

Trend News Brand of the Year for familiarity, quality, and consideration. Locally, KMUW is the Kansas Association of Broadcasters fourtime recipient of the Large Market Station of the Year. These awards and honors simply mean that KMUW and NPR deliver quality programming and events.

Anthony Ndungu came to this country in 2000 from Kenya. He is the president of Home Health and Hospice of Kansas, which provides both home health and end-of-life care for people with health issues who want to remain in their homes for as long as possible.

After an internship with Harry Hynes Hospice, Ndungu knew he wanted to continue to be involved with these patients, who typically experience frequent falls, frequent hospitalizations, difficulty in taking their medications as prescribed, and general weakness. His organization tries to accept almost every patient they see at the initial consult.

Home Care and Hospice services include pet therapy, which is very popular with patients. Physicians, nurse practitioners, and therapists are also part of the care team.

Ndungu also opened a college, Midwestern College, to provide career training and education in home health and hospice care. The typical student is a single parent, female, who has earned a GED.

Both men are examples of the visionary spirit that is making Wichita, and East Wichita Rotary, places of excitement and new ideas. Welcome to EWR, Michael and Anthony!

### MORE AT ROTARY TODAY



Joanne Rogers has volunteered to head up our club's involvement in the Rotary Foundation of Rotary International, which has contributed \$3 billion on life-changing, sustainable projects during the past 100 years. The six areas of focus are: promoting peace, providing clean water, saving mothers and children, supporting education, growing local economies, and fighting disease.
