As we celebrate this 4th year of our existence in this issue, let us reflect on how far we've come and be inspired by where we are about to go!


The **#LevelUp** journey continues. Let's finish strong!

Although tips for management applications weren't touched on as advertised, it was still a good refresher for those in attendance.

The second presenters were Rtr Tracey Knight-Lloyd and her mentee Janelle Edwards, whose backgrounds are both in marketing. They spoke on the topic "*The Ultimate Guide to Social Media Branding*", in which Tracey allowed Janelle to take the lead. Their presentation, as the name suggested, focused on how to build your social media brand for both personal and professional use and how the two are interrelated. It was engaging, very informative and interactive, even though it was interrupted by a parade for about five minutes.


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PP K. TREMAINE GILKES - CHARTER PRESIDENT [2015-2017]

PP K. TREMAINE GILKES - CHARTER PRESIDENT [2015-2017]



From Rotaractor to Cranberry

My Rotaract journey began in December 2015, as the Charter Club Service Director of the then newly founded **Rotaract Club of Barbados**. Rotaract on a whole was new and intriguing to me. I joined the club at a point in my life where I was searching for a way to meaningfully invest my spare time. The club was a small unit, with just enough members to formally have a Board but we were brimming with enthusiasm and brilliant ideas. I was specially invited by Charter President K. Tremaine and I was ecstatic about holding a position. They had no idea what they had done by electing me. I got to planning my activities for the year which focused on special meetings with Rotarians, recruiting new members and birthday celebrations.

Elections for the Board of 2017–2018 took place in December 2016. I was completely moved by the faith of the thirteen persons who voted for me to lead the club. I also remember being momentarily dismayed when I realised that I was going to be the President. While I had previous experience in leadership, Rotaract for me was different, this was huge. I knew that I had big shoes to fill and a whole lot to learn. I eventually got past my shock and made a decision to be fully committed to having a successful year and I had the best team to work with to accomplish my goal.

During my induction speech I outlined what seems liked a fairly simple plan. We were going to increase our membership by at least 5 members, strengthen the relationships with our sponsor Rotary club and other Rotaract clubs on island, meet our administrative obligations to Rotary and the District and finally encourage the personal development of our members. This became the blueprint for our club throughout the year and I was pleased to have the buy-in and full commitment of the Board as we began to put our ideas together.

Let me tell you about my Board. The members who made up the Board were phenomenal, and I dare say the best people to work with. Like I said, we were brimming with ideas. In most instances the Board was fully invested in our ingenious ideas. At the same time, we did not lack the fortitude to rein in wild thoughts before they got out of hand. There were some difficult lessons which we had humbly learned together, but those lessons gave us a solid backbone and the motivation we needed to plan and execute our projects well.

The then VP Mario Boyce came up with our apt theme of GUTS while engaging CLS Director Kareem and I in casual conversation on the steps of the Guardian General building in Collymore Rock. GUTS stood for **Growth**, **Unity**, **Transparency** and **Sustainability**, which fully represented our goals for the year. Our team was driven to succeed, so with the buy-in of the Board and the wrinkles set aside, it was time to show out. I aimed to have the most exciting and memorable year possible.

Together, we created an environment where everyone got excited about participating in our projects and other events. For the number of things we had planned, we needed to fully engage members and prospectives. One of my underlying goals was to have persons willingly give of their time and effort without feeling like it was a chore. It was my desire to have an even combination of hard-work, learning and fun activities on the Club's calendar so that . This was my vision for membership engagement which went a long way in attracting and maintaining members in the club. It fell in line with the bigger goals to increase and sustain our membership.

We found various ways to engage our members. We carried over our birthday socials, there were refreshments after meetings which encouraged loitering and casual conversation, brain-storming sessions, new member orientation (now called **Cranberry Crash Course** or **Triple C**) and even a culture night in appreciation of the diversity in the club. I could never forget Laser Tag, Bon Fire nor sports day picnic!

Aside from our social activities, we also engaged in outstanding projects like **Signature** and my own brain-child **Rota-Gift**. **Signature**, now in it's 3rd installment, focused on the personal and professional development of our members and the wider society. It provides an outlet for learning, information sharing and networking. **Rota-Gift** is a calendar highlight and our annual community service initiatives where we brighten the Christmas season for selected beneficiaries with donations received from the public. The first execution of this project provided hand bags and food amd personal hygenie donations to the Business & Professional Women's Shelter and has grown its impact each year since.

We also collaborated on projects such as Rotary's Model United Nations, Carols by Candlelight, World Rotaract Week and Rota-Lympics Sports Day. Rota-Lympics is where the phrase "**Cranberry and Proud**" originated. We dominated in the sports and chant competition that day and went home victorious!

My experience as President of the Rotaract Club of Barbados was profound and nothing short of life changing. It was an opportunity to step out of my comfort zone, to flex my leadership muscles and put my focus in something that went beyond being a benefit to myself. Rotaract provided me with a fresh perspective on my personal development and in many ways shaped my professional career today. My year as President was very special for me and I marvel at the times shared with amazing people who became like family and remain in my life to this day.

Conference 2020 - Extended Deadline


