

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS AND RESPONSIBILITES AS AN EMPLOYEE

On the 10th of August 2021, the Professional Development Committee hosted the first session of their talk series **Employee ICE (Informative, Captivating** and Empowering). The objective of the session was to educate persons on mandatory vs discretionary leave, and termination and severance. These being the effects of the Coronavirus Pandemic and more recent the effects of Hurricane Elsa which left many employees without water and electricity.

The session was held in person at the Luther Thorne Memorial Primary School and via Zoom. The panellists consisted of *Attorney'sat-law Lesley Trotman-Edward and Alexandria Thomas* who are currently employed with the Barbados' Workers Union.

Both panellists came not only with a wealth of knowledge but were sure to have the legislations on hand for confirmation. As it was an open discussion, members and guests had so many questions that the panellists were unable to discuss Termination as other topics took foreground. The session began with a 2-minute skit done by Director Rachel Austin and Interact Liaison Officer Melanie Goodridge highlighting some of the current issues that are affecting employees.

Mandatory Leave

Vacation Leave: Holiday with Pay Act - 2017-3

- An employee who completes a year (12 months) of employment with the same employer is entitled to holiday leave for a minimum of 3 weeks. On a weekly, fortnightly or monthly basis, the year of employment shall be a minimum of 208 days. Employees who are paid any other way would only have to accumulate 150 days.
- An employee who has completed 5 or more years is entitled to a minimum of 4 weeks holiday leave.
- An employer can determine the date on which an employee can take holiday and shall give the employee no less a 14days notice.
- An employer cannot give notice of termination prior or during holiday.



·Maternity/Paternity Leave

- Female employees receive 12 weeks after 1 year of service.
- Maternity grant benefits are paid by the National Insurance Scheme (NIS).
- Female employees are only allowed 3 maternity benefits per employer.
- Paternity (working father) is 2 weeks.

·Other Mandatory Leaves

- Jury Duty
- National Service, for example, a Sports Club
- Polling Day

·Discretionary Leave

- This relates to any leave, not under legislation that the employer may give to an employee with or without pay.
- This includes sick leave and work injuries which are paid by the National Insurance Scheme (NIS).
- Bereavement leave is also not mandated, however, some employers will give 3 to 5 days as it relates to immediate family.
- Educational/Study leave is also at the discretion of the employer.

Termination

Although time did not permit an in-depth discussion on the topic of termination, a few points were raised during the session.

One such point noted related to an employer changing work hours and threatening to terminate the employee if they were noncompliant. Lesley clarified this was illegal once it was not stipulated in the contract.

The same was said with regards to pay cuts. An employer cannot force an employee to sign a document to reduce their salary. It is common for companies to engage in the legal act of placing employees on lay-off if such documents are not signed, which sometimes leads to termination.

Severance

A sum which an employer is liable to pay to an employee under subsection (1) of section 3. The start of the Coronavirus pandemic impacted the tourism sector heavily with numerous terminations and severances due to the loss of international business. Persons queried if an employer can cut their allowance. Panellist Lesley confirmed that would be illegal once your contract states otherwise.

Another query was to how long should it take for severance to be paid. According to section 3a.1, "severance payment that is required to be paid by the employer under section 3 shall be paid within 2 months of becoming due, or with such longer periods not exceeding 4 months as the Board allows" (1984-11) A question was asked if a person would be entitled to severance after layoff. Panellist Alexandria quoted legislation (1972-27, 1985-23) section 6.1. Where an employee is laid off or kept on short time for:

- a. 13 or more consecutive weeks or
- b. a series of 16 or more weeks (of which not more than 12 were consecutive) within a period of 26 weeks.
- then, if the employee, within 4 weeks after the relevant date, gives notice in writing to his employer indicating (in whatsoever terms) his intention to claim a severance payment in respect of the lay-off or short-time (in this section and section 7 referred to as "a notice of intention to claim") the employee is, subject to this section, entitled to a severance payment for being laid off or kept on short-time.

Key takeaways from the session include:

- Always read your employee's contract before signing
- Utilize the BWU website if you are unsure of any grievance
- A representative of the union can officiate on your behalf even if you are not a member.
- KNOW YOUR RIGHTS AS AN EMPLOYEE

The session ended with a \$2.00 Raffle for a Jar of candies. This was quite entertaining as throughout the night members took many chances to guess the number of candies in the jar.

MCC Kareem took the most chances and was the eventual winner where he graciously gave his winnings to Director Galen who gladly shared with those who wanted. A total of \$44.00 was collected, as a result, so a big thank you to all those who participated.

We were also able to enjoy a bit of fellowship with some light refreshments that were organised by the Professional Development.


A special shoutout goes to PM Cardon Duncan who volunteered every Saturday and arguably raised the most funds this year!


