## NUTURE by AS Maya Kellman

This article will challenge you. Side effects include: being accountable, deeply introspective and unapologetically nurturing a growth mindset.



#### "Four Golden Lessons Successful Leaders Employ to Nurture their Teams"

#### Introduction

'N' represents Nurture within our L.E.N.S theme.

Let's reflect on two of the analogies presented below to further contextualize the concept, of 'nurture':

- 1. There is an ineluctable truth that parenthood presents unparallel opportunities for growth to evolve and expand. Equally important, is the glaring reality that nurturing means more than simply giving a child food, shelter and clothing. Notwithstanding these basic necessities, nurturing requires a more involved process. It involves a balanced and emotionally healthy relationship between you and your child.
- 2. Similarly, to all my farmers, both novice and professional, once you have been blessed with an **abundant season of high yields**, it means you have certainly taken the time to nurture your crops. Needless to say, if farming was indeed a game, it is certainly arguable that high yielding farmers would win!

Now that we have set the scene, let's explore together in today's short article four non-exhaustive golden lessons that successful leaders employ and their importance to successful leadership development.

#### 'Definition

According to the American Psychological Association, 'nurture' means "the totality of environmental factors that influence the development and behaviour of a person, particularly sociocultural and ecological factors such as family attributes, parental child-rearing practices and economic status.'

Simply put, if you assemble a team of persons with different backgrounds all possessing different capabilities and talents, there is tremendous potential in each and every one...if only you take the time to nurture them! Successful leaders know that there is great potential in their team and will take the time to develop them in the following ways:

#### 1. Be a Connector of People and Dots!

When team members have a cooperative relationship with their leaders, they feel that their perspectives and inputs are heard, understood and considered. In his book, Drive: The Surprising Truth About What Motivates Us", author Daniel H. Pink articulates that they are three components of intrinsic motivation: autonomy, mastery purpose. Therefore, in order to discover what truly motivates team members, leaders must genuinely and continuously connect with them to know and support their abilities. Further, successful leaders assist team members in connecting the dots by explaining how each arm of service works and how their respective contributions positively further the mission and values of the organization.

#### 2. Be Compassionate

Successful leaders are also supportive leaders. Discerning the appropriate time to provide their team members with breathing space when they have made mistakes. To be quite frank, to err is human. A notable example would be to place yourself in the shoes of a team member who may be struggling on a project and carefully understand where you can assist in making the experience more meaningful. Always maintain neutrality, unless you are certain you have 'good' reason to act otherwise.

#### 3. Develop Effective Communication

Effective communication is far from barking tasks, and objectives or casually giving praises. Successful leaders aim for **healthy communication at all costs**. When there is a disconnect between you and your team, it can create "an us-versus-them" attitude and make you feel lonely. Learn the value of **active listening, not with the intent to reply but with the intent to understand.** 





#### 4. Embrace Growth

We all know that in order to improve at something, we must be challenged time and time again. Look at Google, where 20% of an employee's week is marked for pursuing personal goals. Even though this accomplishment may not be feasible for every team, it doesn't mean there isn't something else an organization cannot do. Instead, allocate specific time and resources to facilitate continuous growth which will nurture your team member's individual talents and skills.

#### Final Comments: Let's Make a Commitment Together!

Cranberry fam, now that you have assimilated the information above, let's make a commitment together to show up more authentically in nurturing our respective team members. Invest in your most valuable asset, your team, by understanding how they want to be supported, rewarded, spoken with and understood by leadership. At the end of the day, once you sow these nurturing seeds, sit back and observe through your L.E.N.S, a team that is thriving from the inside out!

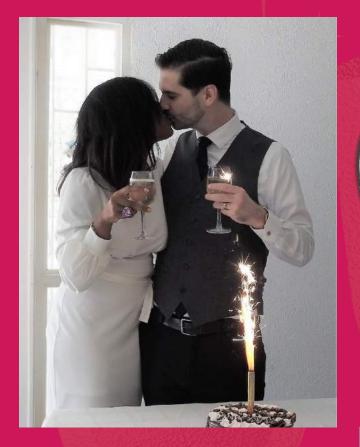

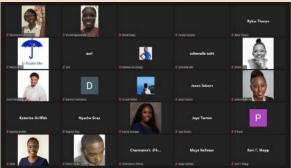
## VOCATIONAL SERVICE

# PEACE AND CONFLICT PREVENTION/ RESOLUTION

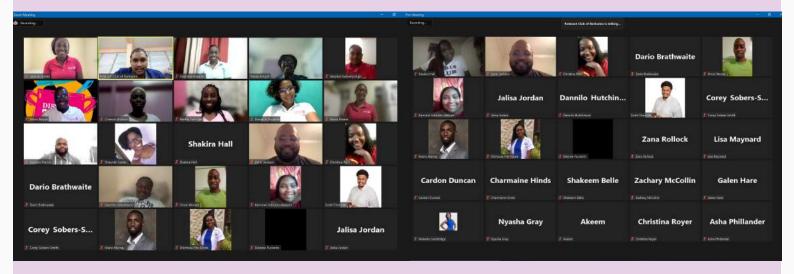
Millions of people worldwide are currently displaced by armed conflict or persecution. 90% of casualties in armed conflicts are civilians, half of which are children. Through service projects and Rotary programs, the Rotary family is committed to pursuing projects that address the structural causes of conflict, including poverty, inequality, ethnic tension, lack of access to education, and unequal distribution of resources.

#### LEADERSHIP 101 by CS Janelle Jordan



"A leader is anyone who takes responsibility for finding the potential in people and processes, and who has the courage to develop that potential."

On Tuesday, February 8th, the Professional Development Committee kicked off the February Club Meeting with the event Leadership 101. The Club was honoured to have the facilitators PE Tracey Knight-Lloyd and DRR Mario Boyce present to members and guests the basics of leadership in your profession, everyday life and especially in Rotary.

PE Tracey opened the session by defining leadership. She stressed that leadership is not about the title, the company car or the benefits or perks. It is about developing people and uncovering their potential and helping them to grow. A leader should have Emotional Intelligence (EI) – be self-aware and regulate yourself, have internal motivation (what is your "why"?), and have empathy and social skills. We must work on ourselves to be the best we can be.

#### LEADERSHIP 101 by CS Janelle Jordan

#### How to Position Yourself for Leadership?

What is your image?

PE Tracey posed the pertinent question to the attendees – "When someone looks at you, do you leave the impression that you can be a leader?" She noted it is important to own your work, manage your tasks, set reasonable deadlines, plan your work, be aware of what is required of you and make sure you shine.

How can you be seen?

According to PE Tracey, if you want to be a supervisor, tell someone who can help elevate your position. Although you may be excelling at your job, your organizational leaders are not mind readers and it would be beneficial for you to state your 5-year plan or your ambitions.

Feedback from your superiors and colleagues whom you respect will help. PE Tracey advised this is a form of continuous improvement and assists with your growth as a leader. Having a sponsor – someone to speak up when you're not in the room and a mentor – who will help guide your career path could be key to have as you progress. Utilize your sponsors and mentors in Rotary/Rotaract!

for Do not be afraid to brag and start your own brag book. Manage your social media profiles to project the best you; constantly update your ion LinkedIn, especially for your one achievements.

Congrats! You got the Leadership Role!

PE Tracey advised your first 100 days are important and set the tone for your continued progression. Continue developing yourself and others and make sure your role, expectations and KPIs are clear. Prioritize your team – listen, observe and learn. Have a Transition Plan to help manage and develop your team.

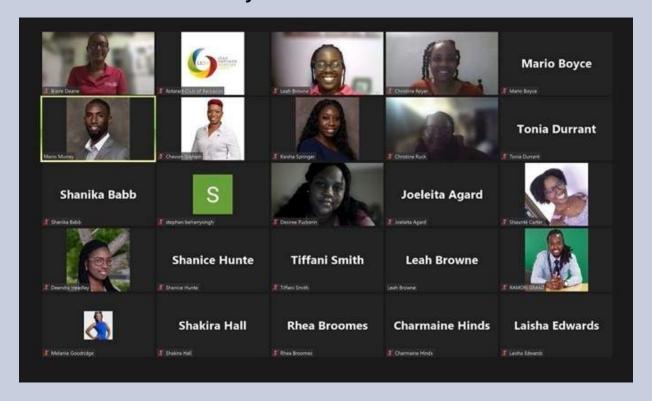

## WATER AND SANITATION

Over 750 million people worldwide lack access to safe water, and more than 2.5 billion people lack access to adequate sanitation facilities. At least 3,000 children die from diarrheal diseases caused by unsafe water each day. Rotary's projects give communities the ability to develop and maintain sustainable water and sanitation systems and support studies related to water and sanitation.

#### EMPLOYEEE ICE PART. 2 - NIS & BENEFITS by Rtr. Blaire Deane



On Tuesday, 1st March, the Professional Development Committee hosted their Employee Ice Pt. 2 Talk Series - NIS & Benefits. Though current conditions did not permit an in-person session, the Zoom session kept attendees engaged from the 6:00 p.m. start time until 8:00 p.m.

A very informative discussion was kicked off by Mr Stephen Strickland, former National Insurance Employee and now Consultant to National Insurance, to assist particularly with claims backlog. Having been with National Insurance for over thirty years, Mr Strickland was the most suitable panellist for this discussion.

Mr Strickland shared his wealth of knowledge on NIS areas relating to the composition of the NIS Board, funding of the scheme, contribution rates for both the employee and employer and various benefits relating to sickness, invalidity, injury, displacement, maternity and unemployment.

Mr Strickland also highlighted funeral grants, old age contributory pensions, treasury pensions, widows and children's contributions and medical boarding and stored pensions.

#### **CLUB MEETING**

#### EMPLOYEEE ICE PART. 2 - NIS & BENEFITS by Rtr. Blaire Deane

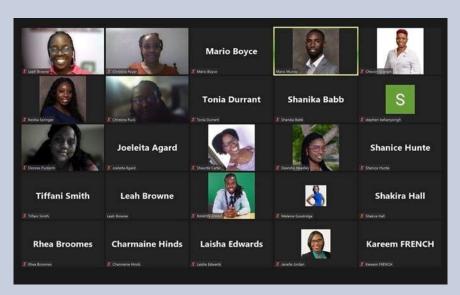
The very instructive and valuable session received an overwhelming response, and Mr Strickland maximized the time allotted to provide a most enlightening and interactive session.

#### A few important takeaways from this session included:

- NIS is not only funded through contributions from employees, employers and self-employed persons but through investments and real estate.
- It is important to determine the category to which you should be assigned and pay your contributions accordingly, as that is in preparation for retirement.
- Self-employed persons who work for \$21 a week or more can contribute to the NIS scheme and receive some benefits.
- The death benefit grant from the NIS Fund is \$2150.00. The average funeral cost in Barbados is \$15,000.00-\$20,000.00.
- Persons over the age of 65 can only receive injury benefits from the scheme.
- Due to the reducing birth rate and increase in persons of pensionable age, there's a probability of pensions being depleted in the next 20 to 30 years.

With the wealth of knowledge shared, attendees have left this session with a comprehensive understanding of Barbados' National Insurance Scheme and the benefits which can be accessed. We can conclude that having multiple sources of income for your financial well-being is pertinent. In addition, attendees can now effectively prepare for their future, as Mr Strickland suggested in investing stocks, share, insurance and other instruments.

As the session ended, we not only thanked Mr Strickland for his time educating us, but we showed our appreciation by presenting him with a Christian journal as he is a man of strong faith.

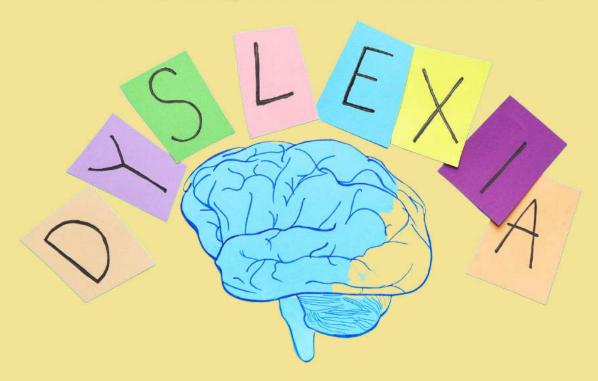








### **BETTER HEALTH, BETTER WEALTH: PHASE 2**



Better Health, Better Wealth was a community outreach project to be completed in two phases a free health fair to offer general health and wellness services primarily to school-aged children for free and the sponsoring of ten (10) primary school-aged students who have been identified as potentially having the learning difficulty, dyslexia to be tested and the training and certification of one teacher to identify, assess and teach students with dyslexia.

This project was funded via District Grant and through the generous contributions and assistance from the following partners in service:
Luther Thorne Memorial Primary School, Caribbean Dyslexia Centre, Republic Bank Barbados Limited and The Nation Publishing Company Ltd.

We wanted to empower those students with the tools to see that they are brilliant but learn differently from other children. We also tried to nurture them so that when they prepare to undertake their Secondary School Entrance Exams, they are fully equipped to excel for the balance of their educational journey.

Due to the nature of the project, strict privacy and confidentiality had to be adhered to throughout the assessment phase of this project, and therefore traditional public relations activities could not be undertaken. However, see below this message the Director of the CDC sent us:

#### **COMPLETION OF ADOPT A VILLAGE**



The "Adopt a Village: Musalaba Project" is an annual project by the Rotaract Club of Naguru, Uganda, started in April 2016 to address the and concerns of the community in the Amuru District through food security, sanitation and hygiene, financial literacy, basic education, disease prevention and climate change. The overall goal for this project was construct a pit latrine for the students and community at Stephen's Musalaba.

The construction of these latrines was impactful as they replaced the existing non-drainable facilities that posed health issues in the area.

The Project had the following phases:

#### Phase 1: Fundraising

February 2020, we hosted a fashion show, Signature, where proceeds directly funded project. The Rotaract Club also Naguru held multiple and solicited the fundraisers assistance of their sponsor Rotary Club to obtain a District grant.

After our wire transfer, our club hosted a virtual cheque presentation ceremony in November 2020, which IPDRR Anya Blankendal also attended.

#### Phase 2: Construction

Rotaractors in Uganda were also hands-on with the construction phase in the form of mixing cement and painting the structure. This phase ran from December 2020 to January 2022. The club solicited assistance from an external contractor, and progress reports were prepared quarterly.

### Phase 3: Finishing and Presentation

In celebration of World Rotaract Week 2022, a set of newly built drainable pit latrines were officially presented to our beneficiary and marked the end of a construction project that has been in the works for over a year. These latrines were branded with a Rotaract plaque that displayed the Clubs that contributed to this project.

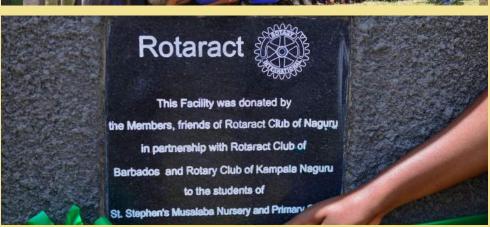


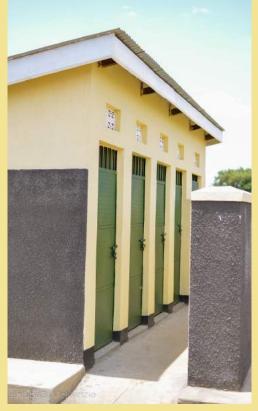












### **ROCK YOUR SOCKS 2022**

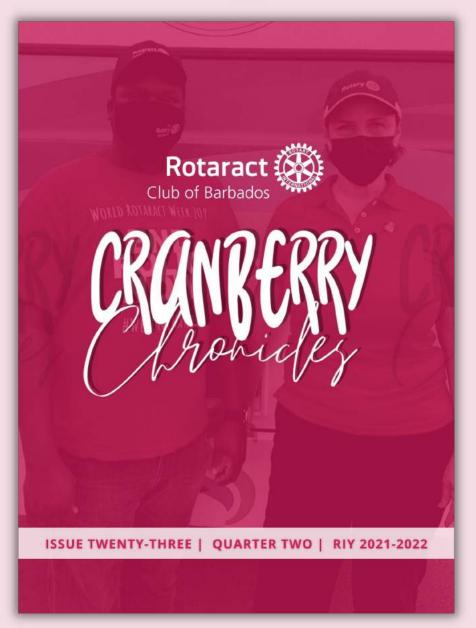
