ROTARY COMES TO BARBADOS

The development of the Tourist Industry and Manufacturing in Barbados during the early sixties can be considered as the main reason for the birth of a Rotary Club.

At that time, among the many visitors and business executives who visited, were Rotarians who were members of various clubs especially in the United States and they often queried whether there were any Rotary Clubs on the island at which they could attend in order to keep up their attendance and maintain their membership in their respective clubs.

It was in July 1961, that Paul Foster, the then manager of the Barbados Tourist Board (now the Barbados Tourism Authority) and Canadian, Tom McLaughlin, Manager of the Barbados Development Board, now Barbados Industrial Development Corporation (BIDC) both shared offices on the top floor of Cavan House on Lower Broad Street, The City.

It was an ordinary day in the lives of both men when McLaughlin walked into Foster's office and asked the question: "Why don't we start a Rotary Club in Barbados?"

This question was of significance to McLaughlin, because many visitors who came into his office to discuss industrial matters were Rotarians who felt that Barbados needed a Rotary Club.

Foster in turn related to his friend that visitors were also expressing the same need to him.

The idea was further discussed with Canadian Roy Wells, the new Manager of The Bank of Nova Scotia (1960-1964). The Bank had started operations in Barbados in 1956. Wells shared the same sentiments expressed by his two customers Foster and McLaughlin.

On September 22, 1961, an initial meeting was held and received with such enthusiasm that another meeting was called only six days later for further discussion aimed at finalizing action for the formation of a club and to appoint officers. Records show that by January 18, 1962, plans were being made for the first official meeting of the club and there was a total of 23 paid up members.

Having satisfied the requirements of Rotary International, a Charter was presented on March 7, 1962 and the Rotary Club of Barbados came into being with eminent Barrister-at-Law, J.E. Theodore Brancker, one of the founder members as the Charter President.

With the start of the Rotary year 1962-63 in July, the Charter President, who had only served three months, was re-elected for the full term along with Stanley Chapman as Vice President; Ranny Greaves, a dentist, as Secretary and Edward (Ted) Cassell, an experienced Rotarian, as Assistant Secretary.

From its inception, the Rotary Club of Barbados has always been able to conform to the long established principles of Rotary International in recruiting its members and filling classifications from the top executives in business, the professions and the services.

The regular meetings were held for lunch at the Marine Hotel every Thursday where Julius Zelinka, a charter member, was the resident manager. He also permitted the Club to hold its Board and Committee Meetings, as well as the frequent Club Assemblies, at the Hotel.

During the early years of the Club, many resident visitors who were experienced Rotarians, gave the benefit of their knowledge to the young club and assisted in steering it along the "Ways of Rotary".

The club achieved a significant milestone on January 13, 2005 with the induction of its first female members, Karen Smith and Brenda Pope.

On July 9, 2011 another significant milestone was achieved when the Club's first female President, Brenda Pope, was installed.

Marine Hotel, Hastings, Barbados



The Marine was a

200 room hotel built in 1887 in Hastings, Barbados about 2 miles from Bridgetown. The hotel featured some very elaborately detailed cast iron balustrades, large wrap-around patios and a magnificent ballroom. Today, on the sites of both the Marine and Pomroy Hotels is the PomMarine Hotel, a teaching Hotel attached to the Barbados Community College.

Lowry refers to the hotel in his novel *Ultramarine*; " ' Talking about cows, all round the West Indies I been, Barbados, Bridgetown, that's hot stuff...All the grape trees coming down to the water's edge, you want to stay at the Colonial in the Milk Market there - nigger orchestra. The Marine's no good - that is, if you got money. I had. That was during the war. I tried the Marine, and the Balmoral. And then I went to the Colonial.....' " (Pg. 174).

Sir Theodore Brancker, Q.C.* - PHF, Charter President. Astute lawyer and politician. Longest serving Speaker of the House of Assembly.



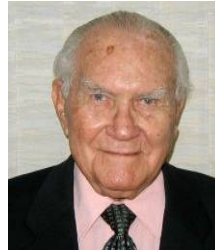
1963-64

John (Jet) Nelson* - MD of Pan Am. Set a high standard of fellowship and did much for our visitors

1967-68
Denis Bell* - Became President when Sir Winston Scott was elevated to the office of GG and could not hold both positions. Opened the Fiscus Club in St. Thomas for young men. The Senior Citizens Christmas Party commenced at Government House



1968-69
Neville Grosvenor* - PHF- Editor of the Barbados Advocate. Did much to promote relationships with the clubs of the District. Editor of 3 Decades of Rotary in Barbados—1961-1991

1969-70

John (Electric) Nelson* - Was Manager of B'dos Light and Power Co, and assisted with many of the clubs projects. One of these was the lighting up of the area around the "Hotpot" near the former Holiday Inn at Pebbles Beach



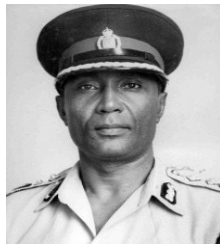
1970-71

A Medical Doctor who assisted with cases in need especially medical. A fully equipped emergency van was presented to the Queen Elizabeth Hospital

Pat Castagne*
Penned the words to "Let's join Hands" which was sung during the Barbados National Chain Link Day on Independence Day, November 30, 1979

Lester Whitehead* QC. Maintained the existing projects, especially the Challenor School. Donations were made to youth organizations including the Church Lads Brigade Regiment. At his hand over meeting he indicated that due to the oil crisis, water shortages and rising cost of materials, the main project at Trevor's Way could not be completed. The Club received the President's Award from the Boys' Scouts Association for its service to scouting in the island.

Was Manager of Esso SA Ltd and became District Secretary under DG Richard Joachim—1984-85 and Sir Stanley 1985-86



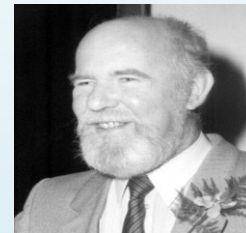

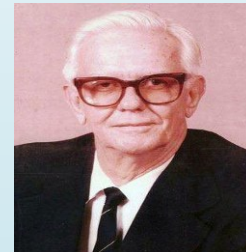
Peter L. Inniss* - PHF

Sailing programs for the Youth



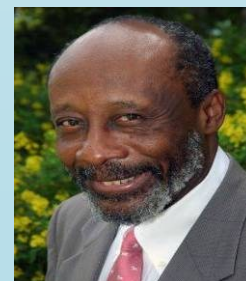
1981-82

The voice for the Blind. Reading tapes were collected and assembled for the blind. Tapes installed and used at the Oistin Branch of the Barbados Public Library.

The Barbados Computer Project was conceived. 64 Commodore Computers were provided to secondary schools across the island. The financing for the project was over \$49,000.00

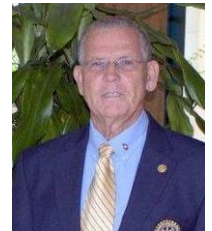
1990-91

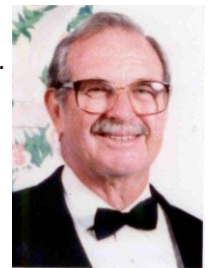
1991-92

This included a "Remedial Teaching Program." He has said that this project was the "fore-runner" of the Alma Parris Secondary School. Friendship Conference held.

Stanley P. P. MacDonald - PHF - Introduced Carols by Candlelight, the Schools Drive Carefully safety signs - Rotary Resource Room and the Learning Centre St. James. Build Boviev Home - Challenor School

W. Anthony Watkins - PHF - Proposed project derailed by Government's EDU TECH Program - donated two multi-media computers and printers to the Learning Centre and Challenor School - Became District Governor 2010-11.



1997-98

Norman Barrow - PHF - Initiated the refurbishment of a building at Verdun, St. John - Substance Abuse Foundation, to provide living quarters for five councilors. It is expected that this will incur a cost of \$75,000.00. Major fund raising project for HBI. Formation of Rotary Roosters. Founders Day Service moved from St. Joseph Parish Church & St Aidan's, held at the St. Lawrence Anglican Church



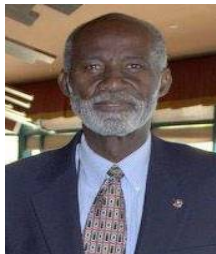
1998-99

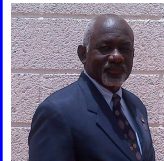


2014-15

 This project sought to provide appropriate bathroom facilities and Safe Room in the home in case of a disaster. Three homes were completed.

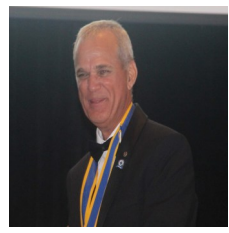


* Ms. Douglin is eighty (80) years old and lives alone in a small three-room wooden house. She is wheelchair bound.

2021—2022—Robin Ford - PHF - Education Project – Matching Grant – Water Tanks – 6 Northern Secondary Schools. School House – Alternate Energy – Photo Voltaic Panels

This project is entitled 'Sustainable Water and Hygiene Education Solutions for Rural Schools in Barbados – a RCoB project in memory of Chuck Howey'. Chuck was a Rotarian from District 6960 in Florida who maintained perfect attendance for 56 years, he died in December 2020. He left a monetary gift to Rotary for use of water and sanitation projects in Latin America and the Caribbean.



The Rotary Club of Barbados contributes to Barbados renewable energy and carbon neutral island- state transformational goals. On January 4th, 2022, the Club handed over the 5kW Photovoltaic System to the School House for Special Needs. The project valued at \$25,190.65 was donated and installed by Solar Watt Systems Inc as a gift to the school.

He also rolled out another new project - the Evening Lecture series. These lectures will be delivered online and will create an opportunity to raise funds for more community projects.

 Tracey Knight-Lloyd—PHF. Covid-19 has imperiled the financial stability of many women which is further compounded by lack of financial literacy and the financial dependency among this group. Furthermore, a 2020 IDB study in Barbados indicated that financial literacy levels of men were higher than those of women. With such statistics plaguing women, the President's project for 2022-23



will be a Financial Literacy Programme themed "Save, Spend and Thrive" – a programme which was developed to address and equip vulnerable women to protect their livelihoods and by extension their families, as many women now find themselves at the head of their households.

President Tracey Knight-Lloyd highlighted that "this project will be rolled out in three phases, the rehabilitation of the computer labs at Marina House, a residential treatment facility catering to women from all walks of life, who are recovering from varying forms of addiction. The phases also include a financial coaching seminar and finally a national social media campaign highlighting basic financial literacy tips in an easy-to-understand format."

The Club will continue its work with two initiatives launched in 2021, the Youth Elevation Scheme, Building the Brand Called You and continue to support activities within the Children's Homes which all serve as key interventionist approaches in minimizing deviance among young people

 Through our community projects, we engaged the ministry of health, corporate partners and third sector to help us expand our reach and create impact. The NCD early screening project reached over 1,500 people across 11 parishes, using a \$70K grant to generate an economic value of approximately \$1MM. Importantly, all supplies were purchased locally in Barbados. Rotarian Barbara a professional grant writer, played a pivotal role in securing the grant with support from PDG David and Director Antro. Fellow Rotarians, our efforts didn't stop there. In June, we handed over the remaining medical supplies to Sagicor, who will continue the project with support from Ross University and the NCD Commission. Nurse Rosanna has informed me that the supplies we donated will help up to 500 individuals learn their health status, through community screening which will begin in September. Hon. Rtn Dr. McIntyre, who supported our NCD project and played a crucial role in securing two grants for over \$12K to assist St. Matthews Primary with building out their play area and the Barbados Council for the Disabled with a new sea wheelchair. Rtn Karen and Past president Shawn will take these projects to completion. We established the first Rotary Club of Barbados Scholarship Fund with an initial \$5K, assisting two children in pursuing lifelong skills and creating a financial resource to help more children develop income earning abilities. We participated in the Barbados Friendship Exchange program, where five Rotaractors from our Barbados clubs had the opportunity to travel to Canada, forge friendships with fellow Rotarians, and gain exposure to work environments aligned with their career goals.
