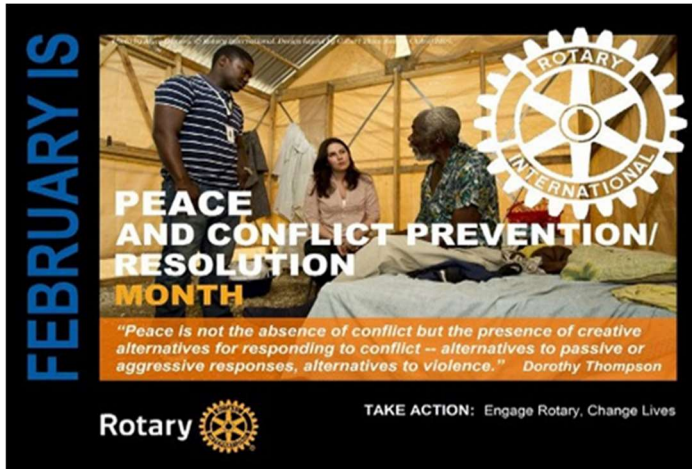

Summary of the RCOB Meeting Held on January 26th, 2023



The 24th regular meeting of the Rotary Year, a Fellowship Meeting, was called to order and welcomed by President Tracey. She indicated that we would be having a guest Speaker Station Sergeant Veronica Shepherd-Whitney of the Barbados Police Service who would speak on Human Trafficking.

The National Anthem was sung, there was the Toast to the President of Barbados, our Patron, and the Rotary Grace was said.

Acting Sergeant-at-Arms PP David introduced the Guests and Visiting Rotarians.

Following lunch PP Jedder, introduced the esteemed Guest Speaker, Station Sergeant Veronica Shepherd-Whitney of the Barbados Police Service who would speak on Human Trafficking. At present she is the officer in charge of the Sex Crimes and (Human) Trafficking Unit which is a department of the Criminal Investigations Division.

Today, Thursday February 2nd, 2023, is a Fellowship Meeting, which commences at 12:30 p.m, at the Hilton Hotel.

Our scheduled greeters will be Rtn. Kim Tudor and Rtn. Gregory Wood.

Summary of Presentation

Station Sergeant Shepherd-Whitney began by thanking PP Jedder for his introduction. She informed that “Robbie” was her first supervisor on joining the service. Following the worldwide comment and discussion on Human Trafficking and the scourge of Drugs, which included President Obama, the RBPF, since 2011; would have had an interest in this area of crime.

The Department was set up in 2013.

Legislation was updated in 2016 - Trafficking in Persons Prevention Act, 2016, which replaced 2012 legislation - Transnational Organized Crime (Prevention and Control) Act

DEFINITIONS

Human Trafficking is a high-profit low-risk, constantly evolving, globalised form of crime, that is being increasingly controlled by organised criminal groups.

INTERNATIONAL LEGAL STANDARDS

ARTICLE 3 OF PALERMO PROTOCOL

International Definition:

Trafficking in Persons

The recruitment, transportation, transfer, harboring or receipt of persons, by the threat or use of force, deception, abuse of power or vulnerability, the giving or receiving of money to gain consent of another, for the purpose of exploitation. Exploitation shall include the exploitation of the prostitution of others or other forms of sexual exploitation, forced labor or services, slavery or practices similar to slavery or the removal of organs.

Trafficking in children. (A child is under 18 years of age)

The recruitment, transportation, transfer, harbouring or receipt of a child for the purposes of exploitation shall be considered “trafficking in CHILDREN”. Exploitation is the key element when dealing with children.

BARBADOS TRANSIT & DESTINATION POINT

Barbados is used to receive and process persons through the Caribbean. These countries would include Jamaica, Antigua & Barbuda, Trinidad & Tobago and Guyana.


