SUMMARY OF THE FELLOWSHIP MEETING HELD ON MAY 26TH, 2022

- The 44th meeting was called to order by President Robin at 12.30 pm.
 The president is the set of the
- The national anthem was played.
- President Robin announced that this is "Youth Service Month". He also informed the Club that our guest speaker today was Major David Clarke.
- Prayers were said by PP Tony Reece
- Sergeant-at-Arms Randy introduced our guests.
- All were welcomed.
- President Robin announced birthdays and anniversaries for today.
- PP Erskine read the Rotary Foundation Minute.
- Rtn. Adrian Skeete introduced the guest speaker.

• Guest speaker Major Clarke (*pictured right*) addressed the Club on the topic "Covid 19".



•Here are some excerpts from his speech.

- In January 2021 he was given very short notice by Prime Minister Mottley to roll out a Covid 19 vaccination program which was needed within 3 to 4 days. The request was made on a Friday and the roll out was in place by the following Wednesday.

- The program was built on the infrastructure already in place for the 9 polyclinics. This means that the architects for the program piggybacked on the structure of the polyclinics, hence, it contained 9 catchment areas.

- The polyclinic system in its current format was inadequate as it was not designed for a mass vaccination program. It was therefore converted to accommodate a mobile system.

- The overall system was a national medical record system which captured data for all Barbadians and also produced certificates. The system specifically dedicated to the vaccination program was called "SHAPE". In it was a testing component, vaccination component and a home quarantine component.

- Laptops, tablets were required and were obtained and dongles were acquired to load, process and assimilate the mass information of the vaccinated.

- In Major Clarke's words, "the entire process pushed the island's health care system miles ahead."

- Certain challenges were also encountered, for example, the health care workers were not accustomed working in a mobile environment. Additionally, some persons gave incorrect email addresses because they were apprehensive about volunteering personal information to the Government. It followed that such persons could not receive their certificates via email.

- To date, there are: 140,000 persons with vaccination certificates, 162,000 persons with first doses, 152,000 with 2nd doses, 152,000 with the first booster, 2,000 with the 2nd booster and currently approximately 10 to 20 persons taking the first shot daily.

- Initially it was difficult to obtain vaccines. The program was started with the donation of 100,000 doses of Astra-Zeneca from India and this donation was shared with CARICOM.

- Over time, other types of vaccines were received – 270,000 doses from Pfizer (a donation from the USA), 5,000 doses of Sinopharm and 600 doses of Johnson and Johnson. Pfizer was the most popular.

- 71% of the eligible population is vaccinated. This equates to 57% of the total population.

SUMMARY OF THE FELLOWSHIP MEETING HELD ON MAY 26TH, 2022 (Continued)

Major Clarke said that the herd immunity factor is underreported because there are a number of Barbadians who received their first and second doses overseas, whereas the boosters were obtained locally. Such first and second doses were not captured in the local system.

- Later this year, it is hoped that the vaccination program will be handed back to be operated under the polyclinic system. The only the facility which will be retained as a dedicated vaccination centre, is the one at the Harbour Road..

- At the height of the program, it was staffed with 345 volunteers, these included - data entry persons, public health sisters, nurses, doctors, persons who cleaned and sprayed chairs etc.

- Approximately 21,000 students ages 12-18 have already been vaccinated. There is currently a pause with this program because a number of students are sitting examinations. This program will resume after the exams.

- The paperwork is currently in process in an effort to obtain vaccines for children ages 5-11.

- The suggested time for boosters in some countries is 6 months, however, persons can obtain boosters after 4 months.

- The program has been refined and is now running smoothly.

The vote of thanks was moved by PP Ron Davis.

Other Business:

- Sergeant-at-arms Randy disciplined the Club by imposing a global fine.
- President Robin made the following announcements: he is looking forward to seeing those Rotarians who plan to attend the President's Party on Saturday night. He also said next week's meeting is a business meeting via zoom only
- After a toast to Rotary International, the meeting was adjourned at 1.20 pm.

ROTARY'S COMMITMENT TO YOUTH

Today's Rotary Foundation Minute focuses on Rotary's Commitment to Youth and encourages support by purposeful donations. David C. Forward in his book "A Century of Service", dedicates a chapter to this aspect of the work of Rotary International. He cites this quotation from Henry J. Taylor, R.I. President 1954-55, and originator of The Four-Way Test.

"It is essential to our future preservation that the youth of nations become men and women of high moral character...Every great world movement concentrates on youth as the necessary foundation for success. Let us in Rotary carry on a crusade among our youth for justice, for truth and for liberty. I hope The Four-Way Test plan can help us do the job".

Forward summarizes: "Rotary's work with youth cuts across all Avenues of Service. When a club organizes a Boy Scout troop or takes disabled children on an outing, that is Community Service. When it mentors teenagers with job skills or teaches physically youth how to work with hands, that is Vocational Service. When Rotarians in one country provide assistance to children in another or host a Youth Exchange Student, they are performing International Service".

Rotary's programs are developing the next generation of leaders, providing funding to make the world a better place, and making peace a priority. I have elected to focus on the programs of our own club as a frame of reference for extending our appreciation of funding the concerns of youth across the world and encouraging support of Rotary's programs worldwide.

The record of the Rotary Club of Barbados in this area of focus is outstanding. The work with RYLA, Interact, Rotaract, Youth Exchange, in the past speaks for itself. The Initiatives of PP Fiona, Director Arlene, Secretary Ermine et al, the RCOB Youth Elevate Scheme team of Rotarians, Roger, Davina and others working with the Police Service, that drew a Nation Newspaper headline "Elevating Youth for the world of work" must be especially gratifying for us Rotarians "Serving to Change Lives".

This Rotary Foundation minute celebrates and offers congratulations for their outstanding work and commitment and making us all proud to be Rotarians. It serves as a motivation to our members to extend our support for the Rotary Foundation beyond our local needs to funding support to other needy communities across the world.

The Foundation offers a few examples:

For 60 cents a child can be protected from polio. \$50.00 can provide clean water.

\$500 can fund providing healthy environments for children. All Rotarians are encouraged to support the Rotary Foundation by their donations.
