Summary—Guadeloupe Conference

« Why we are in Rotary? To do good during our lifetime and to leave a legacy of good after our death »

With the following question posed to all attendees the 7030 PETS and District Conference set the tone for this year's PETS and District Conference.

This year's conference was held in the picturesque archipelago of Guadeloupe, home to DG Dominique Vénéré, and hosted each of the countries making up district 7030 including the countries of Aruba, Curaçao and Bonaire which recently joined.

PETS was held on the Wednesday and Thursday and was an inspiration to all who attended as it was a lesson in leadership and team playing; a lesson in knowing the tools which Rotary International offers to all Rotarians in the My Rotary portal.

Of note this year Olayinka "Yinka" Hakeem Babalola, Representative of President Rassin, attended and without doubt was a source of inspiration to all.

In speaking on leadership he used the analogy that leadership is akin to driving a car knowing the destination and having the support of the passengers in assisting all in reaching their destination safely.

The District Conference followed thereafter - and that too was a journey in cultural exchange and mind opening thought.

From the icebreaker and youthful interventions of the Rotaractors to the stimulating sessions we were engaged from beginning to end. The topics were wide and varied varying from Sargassum seaweed and its uses to the use of digital technology for medical assistance to the query as to whether given the current technology we are in a «Darwinian digital world whereby digital Darwinism is the evolution of consumer behavior when society and technology evolve faster than the ability to adapt»

And from there ideas embracing the need for Rotary to adapt to the changing world and continue to make a positive impact were discussed. These included the analysis and report by PDG Tony Watkins on the legislative changes by RI which include a new approach to make ups and to calculation of contributions to RI.

The magic of Guadeloupe combined with the magic of Rotary was ever present throughout the conference and especially at the opening and closing ceremonies and at the Home Hospitality at Karukéra Land.



Council on Legislation: Elevate Rotaract

The 2019 Council on Legislation passed enactment 19-72 to acknowledge Rotaract clubs in the RI Constitution and Bylaws and elevate them as an important member of the Rotary family. Rotaract clubs will continue to have their own standard constitution but will have greater support from RI. Our organization will benefit from this change because it broadens the definition of membership in RI to include Rotaract clubs. We will be able to learn more about Rotaractors and improve the support and resources we offer to help Rotaract grow. As Rotaractors become our partners in service, we'll also be able to better track their impact as well as amplify our reach in communities around the world.

OBJECT OF ROTARY

The Object of Rotary is to encourage and foster the ideal of service as a basis of worthy enterprise and in particular to encourage and foster:

FIRST: The development of acquaintance as an opportunity of service; **SECOND:** High ethical standards in business and professions, the recognition and the worthiness of all useful occupations, and the dignifying of each Rotarian's occupation as an opportunity to serve society;

THIRD: The application of the ideal of service in each Rotarian's personal, business and community life; and

FOURTH: The advancement of the international understanding, goodwill and peace through a world of fellowship of business and professional persons united in the ideal of service.
