Following is a Summary on the presentation by Mrs. Angela Simpson

PROSTATE CANCER (PC)MYTHS AND FACTS!

Only men can get P.C, but if a woman's father has had it she is at

risk for breast cancer..Fact
Myth. P.C. Is common, but few men die of

Fact. It is the leading cause of cancer deaths in men in Barbados.

Myth. Found only in elderly males.

Fact. More often found in older men, but men are now being diagnosed in their forties and fifties.

Myth. If you have no symptoms then you have no cancer.

Fact. Because of the PSA testing Prostate Specific Antigen....is what it stands for. They

are being diagnosed before they have any symptoms. Urinary symptoms are: hesitancy, dribbling, frequency. These are very important symptoms that should raise a red flag, but they are often a sign of infection. However they must be checked by a doctor. Not having these symptoms does not rule out P.C.

Myth. A high PSA means you have P.C.

Fact. A high PSA can mean many things, PC being one of them, but It is not the most common cause of an elevated PSA. PROSTATITIS, which is an inflammation of the prostate accounts for about 80% of high PSAs. IN BREAST CANCER 80% of lumps found are benign, but they must be checked.

Myth. If you have a low PSA you do not have P.C.

Fact. It does not rule out P.C. Every year men with normal or low PSA are diagnosed with P.C. PSA testing is not 100% perfect, but it is the best screening test. A prostate biopsy is the only way to definitively diagnose P.C.

Myth. If your PSA is low you do not have to have the exam that men seem to dread the DRE. DIGITAL Rectal Exam! It is the only way for your doctor to feel an abnormality like a nodule in the prostate. It is the first step to catching P.C. in the early stages.

Fact. No evidence has been found to support this claim. Myth. Treatment for P.C. causes impotence and incontinence. A big worry for men.

Fact. Erectile dysfunction and urinary incontinence are possibilities for some men following surgery and radiation therapy. However, it is not true that all men experience these complications. Medication for E.D. and incontinence are easily treated with drugs and pills such as Viagra, Cialis and many others. An often asked question is can I pass my cancer onto my wife or partner. The answer is No, it is a non-communicable disease.

All men are recommended to be screened by age fifty unless you are in the high risk bracket because your father, grandfather, uncle had it or if you are a Black citizen man. Black men are at a much higher risk for this disease than any other race. We have not yet been able to find the reason. High risk should start screening by age 40. Survival rates are getting better all the time because of early detection and treatment. In the five year survival rate if your cancer was confined to the prostate and nearby tissue there is a 100% survival rate. The percentage for survival drops as it has spread to other parts of the body.

Once you are diagnosed find someone who has been through this already and talk to them. Hearing their experience and seeing them hail and hearty will give you the courage to go forward and fight this. Talk about it. A BURDEN SHARED IS A BURDEN LIGHT-ENED. A cancer diagnoses does not mean the end, it might be a new beginning.

Remember that the most important thing is detecting it early. EARLY DETECTION IS YOUR BEST PROTECTION.

I told them how I lost my brother 13 years my junior at age 53. I want to make sure that every man is screened and is given the chance to live a long and full life.



Summary of the Presentation by Assistant Governor, Peter Downes

Administration:

- 1. He spoke of the need to enhance attendance in the second quarter as generally speaking attendance was particularly poor in all three clubs for the first quarter. This is understandable due to travel and vacation.
- 2. A reminder to update the status of goals on Rotary Club Central Projects.
- 3. Reminded the Club of the District Governor's desire to have a project focused on

Dyslexia.

4. Announced that the sum of EC\$20,000.00 was donated on behalf of the three Clubs to the Dominica Relief Project. In addition, moving forward, there would be a focus on a long term project and the outfitting of 17 schools with water storage facilities was identified. The cost would be in the vicinity of US\$10,000.00 per school for a total of US\$170,000.00. It is hoped that a global grant can be received for 50% of the amount and the balance raised from the zone. It is expected that the District would indeed contribute in excess of what would be considered the average for the districts in the zone.

Finally he requested a copy of the Club Bulletin each week in order to be kept keep up to date with what is happening in our Club.

The reality, however, is that there are many notoriously famous people both in the past and the world today who have overcome this disability in order to accomplish great things in their lives. From Hans Christian Andersen to Anderson Cooper, the list is endless. Just take a look at a few of these famous dyslexics and what they have accomplished.

Tommy Hilfiger is an iconic fashion designer. Tommy Hilfiger created an all American brand of clothing that remains popular among men and women of all ages since its debut in the 1980s.

Billy Bob Thornton is an American actor, screenwriter, director and musician. He has struggles with ADD and dyslexia.

Keira Knightley The film star was diagnosed with dyslexia when she was just six years old. Though some may see dyslexia as being detrimental for an aspiring actress. Knightley used it as a springboard for her career.

Vince Vaughn had trouble both reading and paying attention. The school insisted that he be given on medication for Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder, but Vince's father refused to even consider it as an option. Not only was Vince suffering from ADHD, but he also had dyslexia and found it difficult to keep up. He was put into special classes for kids with learning disabilities.

Steven Spielberg When people think of successful filmmakers in Hollywood, Steven Spielberg is typically at the top of the list. Most people, even his loyal fans, would never guess that the famous director has struggled with dyslexia throughout his entire life. What is even more amazing is the fact that his learning disorder went undiagnosed for years.

Jay Leno With Jay Leno." His face is universally recognized, and his controversial private life is constantly appearing in supermarket tabloids and on entertainment news. Yet unbeknownst by most, Leno has struggled with the learning disorder, dyslexia, since childhood.

Whoopi Goldberg is an American actress, comedienne, political activist, singer, song writer, and talk show host. Her first film role was as Celie in "The Color Purple" in 1985, and her career has only blossomed since. She has been nominated and won several awards and has done numerous films in her career. She can currently be seen as a co-host on the popular television show, "The View". Henry Winkler is best known as an actor for his role as Arthur Fonzerelli in the television show "Happy Days". He has had his hand in everything from acting, writing, producing, and has even become the spokesman for the Dyslexia Foundation. He has shown his support of the Dyslexia Foundation through the writing and reading/book tours of his children's book series about Hank Zipzer, the fourth grade dyslexic boy who became "the worlds greatest underachiever". As you can see, there are a variety of famous dyslexics who have become famous in a variety of genres. There are so many more that could not be listed, however the list is almost endless. None of these famous names let their disability hold them back. Instead, they rose above their insecurities and became some of the most notable names in literary, musical, and film history.
