Last Thursday was a Business Meeting, where our Board of Directors gave an update on the State of the Club. Past Director Berkley Blades reported on his January Community Challenge.

Community Service - Dir. Annie Bertrand

The Anti-Cyber Bullying project has been receiving very good reviews. The ad has been shown at the cinemas, and a presentation made on CBC was a huge success. It was noted that it has been a source of interest by two University professors who indicated their desire to carry out some research around the project. Other efforts are being made to have it promoted further.

On the Reintegration Program, a group of children from the Homes were recently taken for an interview at A1 Supermarket. The Agricultural program is still in process of being developed, with efforts to commence working on 10 - 12 garden beds. Plans for a mentoring program is also in progress and a talk on mentoring will be given to the Club shortly by a Mr. Alvin Arthur to explain what is involved.

Club Service - Dir. Paul Ashby

Guest Speakers arranged to date represented some interesting speakers including H.E. Hon. Robert (Bobby) Morris who spoke on the topic 'Barbados Past, Present and Future'.

Attendance for February was 64% which was below the projected 70%, affected by a low attendance recorded at the Club Forum. It was noted however that attendance at the Club Forum was better than in previous times.

The Anti-Cyber Bullying project has generated good PR. Plans are in process for the Club's next Treasure Hunt.

HIGHLIGHTS OF THE BUSINESS MEETING WHICH INCLUDED BOARD REPORTS & THE JANUARY COMMUNITY CHALLENGE REPORT - MARCH 10, 2016

COMMUNITY CHALLENGE - # 7 JANUARY-UNDERTAKEN AT THE ST. MICHAEL DISTRICT HOSPITAL - WARD 3A

The subject institution was first commissioned as a health care institution in 1884. As such, it is the oldest continually used health institution on the Island. It has gone through a number of changes in terms of name and usages of the institution. Originally it was called the 'Alms House', sometimes the 'District Hospital' but more recently, the 'Geriatric Hospital'.

The hospital cares for two hundred and eighty six (286) or so full time patients. Another forty (40) are added during the day as 'day care patients' only.

The Rotary Project at the institution centres on Ward 3A. Rotary had previously been involved with the Ward having painted the walls during the latter part of 2015. The project this time centered on the bathroom facilities which are intended for use by the approximately twenty two (22) patients for their twice daily baths. This bathroom has been out of use for approximately five (5) years. Consequently, the patients had to be accommodated in an adjoining bathroom which already caters for another twenty (20) or so patients. Most of these patients in either ward do not walk freely and need to be assisted to the bathroom.

The photos provided show the condition of the bathroom previous to the Rotary Project. The plumbing was out of use. The wall tiling or covering was broken in several places. There were no tiles on the floor, neither the bathroom or toilet section.

The second set of photos show the refurbished bathroom with all plumbing fixtures and fittings replaced and fully functional. The complete floor area is now covered with attractive non-skid tiles. All wall surfaces are now adequately tiled or otherwise covered.

Both the nursing administration and the patients are now extremely pleased and delightfully use their refurbished facilities.

Appreciation should be expressed to the Rotary President, Mr. Jeddler Robinson who was very supportive in having the project completed. Also, other Rotarians who assisted in identifying suitable projects include Past President, Mr. Erskine Thompson and Director Elect & Chair, Diana Douglin. The Management of the Institution should also be complimented on their supporting and appreciative attitude throughout the project which lasted for approximately one (1) month on a part time basis.

The cost has not been fully determined but is expected to fall within or close to the budgetary figure for these projects. In any event, it is expected that the cost per capita justifies any additional spending on the project.

MUN 2016 ENDS- THE FINAL WEEK

The Model United Nations (MUN) is an annual event organized by The Rotary Clubs in Barbados in collaboration with United Nations Development. This year, the finale was held at Lloyd Erskine Sandiford Centre on Saturday, March 05, 2016

The finale commenced with presentation of flags by the Barbados Cadet Corp. This was a spectacular sight as usual, with the flags of most of the delegations on display.

We again welcomed Senator the Honorable Maxine Mclean, Minister of Foreign Affairs and Foreign Trade, who gave the featured address after a presentation by the UN Resident Co-coordinator, Mr Stephen O'Malley.

Twenty-nine delegates, coming from 15 secondary schools in Barbados competed this year. Using the training of the last 5 weeks, each delegate presented their country's position on Migration and Human Rights.

After lunch, the session continued with robust debate of the resolution on Migration using Rules of Procedure similar to those used in the actual United Nations.

The delegates were in for a surprise, when the Chairman announced a crisis in Africa. All rules of procedure were suspended as the United Nations entered an emergency situation.

The delegates had to use knowledge of their appointed country's foreign policies. After much discussion a compromised was brokered and all nations were able to provide a united front to the crisis and resolutions were passed, effecting immediate relief measures to the African nation.

As this was a competition, the judges had the challenging task of choosing a winner based on the students' performance on the day. Eventually two students were chosen, as it was too narrow to call.

Jared Spencer of Harrison College representing Nigeria and Melissa Hunte of Foundation School representing Burkina Faso

These 2 students were outstanding in both the delivery of their country's position and in their robust contribution to the debate on the resolution.

The prize this year, to the delight of the winners, is a trip to United Nations Headquarters in New York City in November to experience Rotary Day at the United Nations.

As we bring down the curtain on another MUN, the organizing committee would like to thank all Rotarians who contributed either their time or presence to make this a success.
