HIGHLIGHTS OF THE FELLOWSHIP MEETING, APRIL 14, 2016

Last Thursday, we welcomed as our Guest Speaker, Dr Erica Wheeler, spouse of Rotarian Mark; from PAHO /WHO who addressed the Club on the topic "Challenges in Maternal and Child Health for the Caribbean Region: Where do we go from here?"

Dr Wheeler was introduced by Guest Speaker Chair, PP Erskine and the Vote of Thanks was delivered by Rotarian, Dr. Beverley Agard.

Following is a Summary of the Presentation

The Millennium Development Report 2015: Regional Backgrounder,



Latin America and the Caribbean reported that the maternal mortality ratio (MMR) in the Caribbean was averaging 190 maternal deaths per 100,000 live births. A PAHO report said the lifetime risk of a woman dying from a maternal cause in Latin America was 1 in 570 and, in the Caribbean, 1 in 220. Although these compared favourably with the average risk of 1 in 160 for all developing regions, the risk in the United States is dramatically different with figures of 1 in 1,800 and Canada 1 in 5,200. The main causes of maternal deaths are hypertension, haemorrhage, infections, unsafe abortions, and preexisting conditions such as diabetes.

There is some cause for optimism howev-

er, because United Nations data show that Barbados and Haiti are among 11 countries in Latin America and Caribbean that have made significant progress in reducing deaths from pregnancy-related causes since 1990.

A recent report, "Trends in Maternal Mortality Estimates 1990 to 2013, indicates that the maternal mortal ratio (MMR) of 11 countries in Latin America and the Caribbean, has been reduced by 40 percent or more since 1990. Among these countries are Haiti and Barbados where the maternal mortal ratio (MMR) has been reduced by 40 percent or more since 1990. However this is not cause for complacency since we continue to have problems with adolescent pregnancies. Recently published data by PHO/WHO shows that deaths related to pregnancy and childbirth are among the leading cause of death for 15-19 year olds in LAC region.

Latin America and the Caribbean has the second highest adolescent fertility rate in the world (exceeded only by sub-Saharan Africa) and adolescent pregnancy has a major impact on maternal and child health, and socioeconomic outcomes.

The 2014 World Health Statistics report gives the regional adolescent birth rate at 65 per 1,000 girls 15-19 years old, which compares unfavourably to the global indicator of 49 per 1000 girls 15-19. A comprehensive study on adolescent health in the Caribbean among nearly 16,000 adolescents of nine countries in the region concludes that 34.1% had sexual intercourse before the age of 19 and of those adolescents responding positively, 63.4% (40.3% male; 78% female) had their sexual debut before the age of 12. In many cases, first intercourse is forced.

In the area of child mortality, although Latin America and the Caribbean achieved MDG 4 targets, challenges remain in reducing neonatal mortality. The neonatal mortality ratio in the region is double for the poorest quintile than for the richest. Low birth weight newborns are especially vulnerable, with figures as high as 60-90% of newborn deaths.

PAHO and other agencies are working towards reducing maternal and child mortality in a number of ways that includes: through improving universal access to quality care; by working with ministries of health to prioritize programs that work towards reduction of maternal and neonatal mortality; encouraging and supporting countries to provide more 'skilled birth attendants' (usually midwives) through education and training; and improving the core competencies of nurses to care for children, especially in areas such as nutrition, vaccination health advice (including sexual and reproductive health) and mental health.

COMMUNITY CHALLENGE UPDATE

Rotarian, Dr Carol Belgrave provided dental care to the Children from Farrs, Stirling, Sayes Court and Nightengale Complex during the month of February. I understand that XRays were taken of the children's teeth and thos

I understand that XRays were taken of the children's teeth and those who needed additional attention will be brought back to the clinic at a later date for treatment. This initiative is an on going process as this service will be provided to the children as long as they remain in foster care. She is

scheduled to report to the Club on May 5th at our lunch meeting.

Rotarian Makonem Hurley is teaching ten Senior Citizens how to use the computer. The classes started on March 12th and are continuing until April 30th. We started at St. Leonards' Boys School as transpor-



tation was easier for the Senior Citizens, however we experienced some problems with access to the Internet and we have had to shift to Queen's College. The Senior Citizens are enjoying the classes. We have reached the stage where all of them have signed up for a gmail account and will be taught how to access their emails on Saturday 30th April. No classes are scheduled for Saturday 23rd as both Makonem and I will be attending the District Conference.

Rotarian Trevor Whitehall is responsible for the construction of a home for a needy lady who has four children ages three to eleven. Her partner was killed in an altercation some years ago and she was left to provide for the children. The family is currently occupying a seize fourteen by twelve dilapidated plywood house. She was given

notice to vacate the land by the landlord but the house cannot be moved as it will crumble. She approached Urban Development and was given some building material including galvanize, pine laths and siding boards. She solicited the services of a carpenter who framed the house and put on the roof. He charged an exorbitant sum of money to complete the house which she did not have.

Rotarians have pledged material and financial support to have the house completed. Rotarian Trevor Whitehall is awaiting that support. Another carpenter has quoted a reasonable price to provide the labour to complete the house. YIR, Pres. Jedder.


