Summary

President Peter welcomed all and highlighted the local housekeeping matters. These included the update of the "Masks" issued to the Essential Services team. A request was made to include the Prison Service. The upcoming orientation meeting of Proposed Member Job Laboyrie

Presentation

RIPE stressed the importance of using the pandemic as an opportunity "Not to get Back to Normal" in Rotary. He encouraged us to "test" what we are now doing - look at our internal methodologies and make them better. Since January 2020, no club has remained the same. He invited us to maintain our integrity and to see service as our common calue. value. He challenged us to remember the Four Way Test as we planned and executed our projects. Projects should be used as an opportunity to attract new members. However, we must surpass the expectations of new members. That is key to retention.

We were admonished to protect Rotary for the generations to come.

In the Q & A session, some of the areas covered included the following:

Growing Rotary - Notwithstanding the need for diversity - we need good Rotarians. We must look for the right rersons.

Rotary Funding - We must continue to maintain our contributions

to the Foundation, which allows for our international interventions. Polio vs COVID-19—It was recognized that Polio Plus will suffer a reduction in funding as COVID-19 takes center stage. He challenged us to stay with Polio Plus as there were still countries such as Afghanistan and India where the disease was still evident. Disaster Fund For COVID-19 - This fund has quickly been over sub-

Disaster Fund For COVID-19 - This fund has quickly been over subscribed with requests. It is expected as in 2008/09 with the world financial crisis, areas such as employment and funding will be impacted.

Rotaract as "Part of Rotary" - an excellent opportunity awaits the partnership. He was part of the New Generations Committee for four years.

Keeping Rotarians engaged through COVID-19 -

District Governor thanked President Peter for the opportunity to be engaged in the meeting.

Discussion continues on the procurement of Tablets for needy children in our primary schools. This will be coordinated between the three clubs and the Ministry of Education.



Rotary Composting Project

Making a difference within our own communities is a part of the fabric of Rotary. Barbados faces significant challenges with waste management.

In order to demonstrate that Rotarians are people of action, we are inviting members to play their part in our *Composting Project by starting a composter at their own homes.*

Why Compost?

Composting protects our environment by:

- Reducing the waste that we send to the landfill.
- Helping our soils without the use of chemical fertilizers.
- Reducing methane greenhouse gas emissions.
- Reducing the frequency of garbage collection and extending the life of the landfill.

What to Compost?

- Browns (Carbon) such as dead leaves, branches, and twigs, shredded paper, peanut shells.
 - **Greens (Nitrogen)** such as grass clippings, fruit scraps, coffee grounds, and vegetable waste.
- Water Keeping the mixture damp is important for compost development.

To produce compost in the fastest way, you should maintain a ratio of about 25 to 30 parts of Carbon to one part of Nitrogen. Always have some carbon material to start composter and then add kitchen waste. Do not put meat scraps in the composter and avoid adding citrus skins and scraps.

How do you get started?

Place a compost unit conveniently near to your kitchen door. The unit should be enclosed with small air holes and a closeable lid to prevent rodents from entering, but allowing air to enter. A drum composter is shown in the photo.

Rotate the drum daily or as often as possible and keep adding both carbon and nitrogen. Fill to ¾ and stop. Do not empty



immediately, but keep rotating the drum for a month until material has broken down.
