Summary of RCOB Weekly Meeting held on June 16th, 2022

- The meeting was called to order at 12:30 p.m. by Ag President, PP Algie Leacock who invited Rtn Nikita Gibson to deliver the prayer.
- SAA Randy introduced the guests and visiting Rotarians who are listed elsewhere in this periodical.
- Ag Pres Algie made the customary Birthday and Anniversary announcements which are listed elsewhere in this periodical.
- Ag Pres Algie announced the resignation of Rtn Dr. Albert Best, effective Jun 30, 2022, due to his inability to regularly attend meetings. He also announced that Rtn Anthony Shaw will be transferring to the Rotary Club of St Andrew North, Jamaica, effective Jun 30, 2022 due to business relocation.

- Members were reminded to register for the Jun 23, 2022 in-person meeting by end of day on Jun 20, 2022.
- Rtn. Dr. Adrian Sealy delivered the Rotary Minute which was centered on the history of The Rotary Foundation (TRF) and how its funds were used for the many programs including Polio Plus which Rotary sponsors. Ag Pres Algie emphasized that most of the RI goals have been achieved which highlights the power of the Rotary brand.
- Ag Pres Algie announced that the guest speaker was unable to attend the meeting today but instead a number of the club members who attended the recent Rotary Convention in Houston would give their impressions of the conference. Those commenting were: Rtns Davina, Heather, Winston, PPs David and Denise, Rtn Steve and PP Paul.
- The comments were all positive and highlighted the enthusiasm and camaraderie that was exhibited by Rotarians whom we may not have met before; the engagement that the conference encouraged in our younger members and interest in attending future conferences; the quality of the presentations and worldwide impact that Rotary had through its projects; the importance and value of friendship; the unique event of this conference in celebrating the election of Jennifer Jones as the first female President of Rotary International.
- SAA Randy disciplined the club through sharing some pictures of members in various stages of enjoyment of the conference experience and imposing appropriate fines
- Today's attendance was 69 pct.

ROTARY MINUTE

The Rotary Foundation was instrumental in the initial program to what became one of rotary's success achievements. As Foundation funds were used to finance the 3-H grants.

1978

Health, Hunger and Humanity (3-H) grants expand service efforts

What is the 3-H program?

The program was developed to improve health, alleviate hunger, and enhance human and social development. Rotary members use the grants to create access to clean drinking water, support literacy programs, provide medical care, and more — setting the stage for today's global grants.

1979

Rotary begins immunizing 6 million children in the Philippines against polio

Why polio?

Rotary approves the first 3-H grant project after receiving a request to purchase polio vaccine for children in the Philippines. At about the same time, Rotary President Clem Renouf, inspired by the worldwide eradication of smallpox, reaches out to Rotary member and microbiologist John Sever at the U.S. National Institutes of Health, asking whether he thinks Rotary could target another disease. Sever recommends polio.

1980

Rotary commits to "eliminate polio through immunization".

1985

The PolioPlus program is launched

What's the plus in PolioPlus?

The "plus" initially refers to the additional vaccines administered along with the polio vaccine. Today, it also reflects the fact that the infrastructure, fundraising, and advocacy methods developed for the polio eradication campaign also support efforts to fight other infectious diseases.

1988

Spurred by Rotary's success, the World Health Assembly launches the Global Polio Eradication Initiative (GPEI) with Rotary International as a founding member, and over the decades thanks to the committed efforts of Rotary and its partners over 3 billion children in 122 countries have been immunized.

The end polio campaign has been 99.9% effective and today Polio remains endemic in only Afghanistan and Pakistan.

2013

Simplified grant model went into effect

This model introduces two new grant types, global and district,
