**RECAP OF THURSDAY MAY 17, 2018 FELLOWSHIP MEETING  
WITH A GUEST SPEAKER, MS. CONNIE SMITH**

**RI THEME: ROTARY MAKING A DIFFERENCE  
MAY IS YOUTH SERVICE MONTH**

Our guest speaker was introduced by PP Vic Fernandes. The presenter, Connie Smith-Young, is Managing Director of Tricor Group's operation in Barbados and a Governance, Compliance and Risk professional. She is a Fellow of the Institute of Chartered Secretaries and Administrators (ICSA), The Governance Institute in the United Kingdom, Chairman of the Barbados Branch of ICSA, and a member of the Society of Trust and Estate Practitioners.

Mrs Smith Young however, addressed the club in her capacity as a Trustee of Plastic Oceans Trust (Barbados).

Plastic Oceans Trust Barbados is part of the Plastic Oceans global movement which is aimed at reducing the plastic pollution which is destroying the water, marine life and human food chain. Mrs. Smith Young presented some startling statistics such as the 300 million tonnes of plastic produced every year, half of which being single use plastic and more than 8 million tonnes of which is dumped into our oceans.

According to Mrs Smith Young, locally, in 2016 Barbados imported over 140,000 lbs of plastic containers, 150,000 lbs of plastic cups and 100 million individual plastic bags. To drive the point home she pointed out that the plastic imported into Barbados in 2016 was enough to wrap around the island 368 times and that it was indeed wrapping around the island. Many species including turtles, fish, and seabirds consume or get trapped in plastic which sometimes results in their deaths. Plastic debris affects human health, wildlife and the environment. The millions of tons of plastic bottles, bags and garbage in the world's oceans are breaking down and leaching toxins. Plastic materials in landfills sink harmful chemicals into groundwater and the chemicals added to plastics are absorbed by humans which among other things, can dangerously alter hormones.

Mrs Smith Young gave practical examples of how each of us could do our part by refusing to use plastic straws, taking along reusable grocery bags to do our shopping and walking with our non plastic coffee containers and water bottles. She urged the club to "think reusable not disposable" by refusing single use plastic.

This is an issue which is very near to the heart of our Club.

**Question for the presenter.**

*Why is there a difficulty in embracing the reduction in the use of plastic?*

*Comment—We seem to better respond after Legislation.*

In 2016 then Rotary president-elect Sam F. Owori attended an event organized by the American Refugee Committee (ARC) for the young people of Nakivale which challenged them to propose innovations that could improve lives. The winners received a small amount of seed money. Owori believed the 13 winners could become leaders in their community, so he proposed a Rotaract club. The first project, in 2017, helped new arrivals, many of whom had endured harrowing journeys to escape violence. They sleep in rows of tents, which are periodically overrun with bedbugs and cockroaches. The Rotaractors pooled their modest savings and, with assistance from ARC, purchased chemicals and sprayers to fumigate infested areas. "We don't want to have to call someone every time, asking for support," says Uwizeye, a computer scientist who fled his native Burundi in 2015 to avoid being forced into a youth militia.

Rotarians are requested to come out in their numbers from 8:30 a.m. to help set up. The actual party begins at 10:00 a.m. and of course you are encouraged to participate and enjoy the day with the children as they play games and simply enjoy nature's gift of the outdoors.
