- A number of short updates were then given.
- Assistance and support for abandoned newborn babies at QEH: PP Denise provided a brief update:
 - Heartfelt thanks to all Rotarians who had generously volunteered financial and other support.
 - While supportive of the assistance, PP Andrew suggested there was need for authorities and society to examine the underlying issue(s) leading to the current unfortunate circumstances.
 - PP Brenda alluded to another possible factor beyond Rotary's control. The inability or prohibition of youngish mothers (<30-35) already with multiple children (>5 or 6) desirous of tubal ligation, but unable to obtain the service due to reluctance on the part of Family Planning/medical personnel due to current policies.
- Children's Fun Day: PP David provided final update and requested the usual RCOB support and assistance
 - Monday, January 22 at Sandalwood Estates 70 children and 15 aunties are expected
 - 9:00 am: set-up (tables/chairs, games, etc)
 - 9:30 am: children arrive


