

#### District Governor's Monthly Message



Fellow Rotarians, in Rotary, November is celebrated as Foundation Month. During this month focus is placed on The Rotary Foundation (TRF): what it is; what it does; its impact; how it works; how it is funded; and why it is important that we continue to contribute to it. As Rotarians, we all undoubtedly know the amazing work that TRF is engaged in. We know the six areas of focus, and we should all be well acquainted with its signature project - the eradication of polio, globally. However, as I travel through the District - and I have already visited over 50% of the 72 clubs - talking to Rotarians, I sense a certain vagueness of the workings of TRF. Even some seasoned Rotary leaders, who now Chair the foundation Committees at the club level, are unsure of how they could promote TRF to their fellow club members. To address this, I am asking the District Foundation Chair to collaborate with the District Training Chair and the Grants Chair on holding seminars/webinars for Rotarians in the District on TRF, generally. I am also asking for training events focused on grants application, management and reporting.

During this month, Rotary International also celebrates Rotary Day at the United Nations, which brings into focus the long and enduring relationship shared by the two bodies, with their common interest in promoting world peace and addressing humanitarian issues. As Rotarians, we should all be proud of the role that our esteemed organization played in influencing the formation of this august international institution, and the enviable consultative position it continues to hold at UNESCO, the highest offered to NGOs. This special relationship was marked by our senior leadership at the UN Headquarters, at which time RI President Mark honoured six volunteer people of action - connectors beyond borders - for their tireless and impactful work with displaced peoples.

Finally, I draw your attention to the highlights of the decisions of the last meeting of the RI Board, that are provided elsewhere in this newsletter. The Board has adopted and approved recommendations of the Elevate Rotaract Task Force that was headed by our Zone Director David Stovall, some of which may have implications for the relationships between Rotary and Rotaract clubs. These changes will take effect on 1 July 2020, but Rotary clubs that now sponsor Rotaract clubs, and Rotaractors should take note, and prepare for this eventuality. We are, indeed, in a transformative time in Rotary, as we connect the World!

#### **BIO Dr. Peter Laurie**



Peter Laurie was educated at the universities of Oxford, West Indies and Toronto.

He served for thirty years in the Barbados diplomatic service. His last posting overseas was as ambassador in Washington D.C., and he ended his career serving as Permanent Secretary in the Ministry of Foreign Affairs from 1989 until he retired in 1999.

In 1999 he was elected to serve as a Member of the Inter-American Commission on Human Rights until 2003.

Since retiring, he has published three books of children's fiction, a book on the Barbadian rum shop, a book on West Indies cricket (with Tony King), a book on Barbados (with photographer Mike Toy), a book on the street food of Barbados, a Caribbean One-pot cook book (with his son Chris), a Caribbean edition of *A Midsummer Night's Dream*, and a novel. He has also written four plays which have been produced locally as well as in St Kitts, St Lucia and Trinidad.

He was awarded the Gold Crown of Merit in 2001 and the Companion of Honour in 2018.

He is married to Pamela Laurie. They have a son, Christopher.

#### **ROTARIAN BERKELEY BLADES TRIBUTE BY PP. SHAWN FRANKLIN**

Past Director Berkeley Blades joined the Rotary Club of Barbados on February 24, 1994 and even though we knew he was not well and had been hospitalised the club was devastated on the morning of November 6th at the news of his passing.

As we all comforted each other on our social media it was rather striking the similarity with which all the Rotarians viewed Berkeley aka Bee:

"Very sincere person. A gentleman."

"Genuine and friendly person"

"He was a very kind soul and always helpful"

"A very fine gentleman."

"A smart quiet gentleman. He always offered assistance and graciously received when offered." "He will be missed for his quiet unassuming contributions."

"He was a gentleman and always gracious towards me"

"He was a kind and respectful person"

I got to visit him on the day of his passing and let him know the club was praying for him and sent our best wishes. Even though he was very weak and in discomfort in his usual gentleman style Berkley forced a smile and sent his sincere thanks for the prayers.

Berkeley will be remembered in our Club as humble, respectful of all and willing to lend a helping hand with an infectious smile on his face. In all the time I have known Berkeley I have never known him to speak ill of anyone. Always ready with a positive and encouraging word.

He served as Director Community Service and twice as Chairman Children's Homes. Berkeley made sure he personally visited every government children's home during his tenure as chairman of that committee. Berkeley has always taken a keen interest in the environment and was a member of the Barbados Environmental Association prior to joining Rotary. He had been instrumental in securing Flags and Banners for the Club. Berkeley also served faithfully as a floor member the Children's Homes, Environment, Guest Speaker, Drug Awareness, CPR & Safety, Archives & Classification Talks Committees.

In 2015 at the request of then President Jedder, Berkeley presented for his Community Challenge the refurbishment of a bathroom on Ward of the Geriatric Hospital, fittingly the Rotary's Theme that year was – Be A Gift to the World.

Berkeley was one of the clubs two faithful members that were famous for being consistently late at every Thursday meeting and was frequent member of the scooters table. This <u>In</u> Itself was most paradoxical as the scooters table Is known to be the home of the most mischievous members of the club and there was Berkeley, a renown good boy, always In the midst of mischief makers. Either he was failing miserably at keeping them out of trouble or Berkeley had a well-hidden mischievous side. He will be especially missed the next two Sundays at the Senior Citizens Christmas Party at Government House, as he was a faithful attendee and as one of Rotary's frontline at the gate of Carols by Candlelight.

May he rest in peace and rise in glory.
