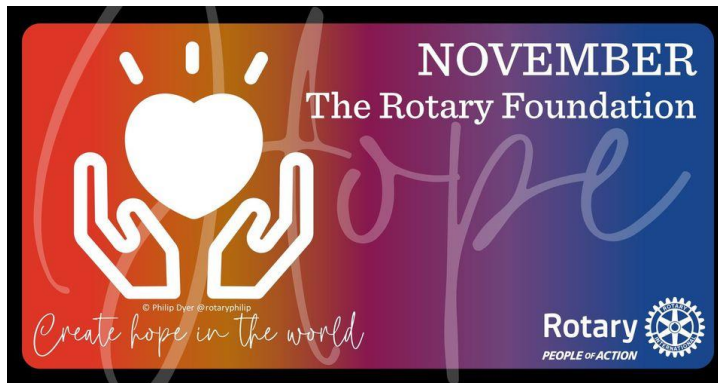

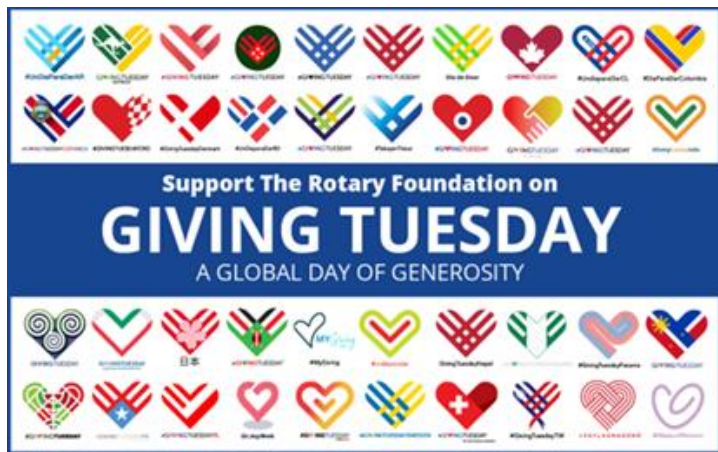

Summary Minutes of the RCOB Meeting Held on November 21st, 2024

President Arlene called to order the meeting of with the singing of the National Anthem and a toast to the President of Barbados. Special Guest Speaker, Sergeant Kim Harris of the Barbados Police Service and Alumnus of the Programme, Jadan Walcott, were introduced by Rotarian Roger Blackman. Lunch was served buffet style as usual.

In a very moving and soul-searching address Sergeant Harris informed that the YES (Youth Elevation Scheme) is a programme in a collaboration between the Police Service and the RCOB. It was started in 1983 with the objective of preventing young persons from experiencing the rigorous Criminal Justice System. In an emotional, moving “tour de force” PowerPoint assisted presentation of shared experience, Sergeant Harris complemented the RCOB for its work with the Juvenile Liaison Scheme whose brainchild was attributed to PP Orville Durant former Commissioner of Police. Kudos were extended to Rtns. Heather Tull, Arlene Ross and Sergeant Hallam Jemmott of the Police Service for their initiative in starting the Yes Programme and to Rotarians Roger and Davina for their commitment and leadership. She complimented the RCOB for maintaining the integrity of the Juvenil Liaison Scheme. Her Vision is to secure funding to move the YES Programme to another level and urged the RCOB not to give up on it. She wanted Rotarians to feel appreciated. The Children know that people care about them. Young Jadan Walcott shared his experience and the transformational effect the YES Programme has had on his personal development and repeated the encouragement of Rotary’s support.

The Vote of Thanks was given by Rtn. Reuben. PP Jedder Robinson, former boss of Sergeant Harris, won the raffle and presented the bottle of wine to her with shared excitement. President Arlene closed the meeting with a toast to RI.

Project Amai

Friday was the 7th session of Project Amai, and the theme was Psychology and Self Esteem. Participants participated in a group session on Psychology and Self- Esteem which was led by PIS Dr. Deanne Ford. Dr. Ford then conducted private individual counseling sessions. Quizzes on Nutrition for Mothers and Babies were done to reinforce what was done by Dr. King and Nutritionist Kathyann at the last session.



Youth Elevation Scheme

The YES program on Saturday once again show cased “yes Saturday teens” - indeed on Saturday in their interaction with Rotarians, and with each other they enjoyed and engaged with laughter and chatter in the way that teens do - the true meaning of a safe space is “- a space where people can feel confident that they will not be exposed to discrimination, criticism, harassment, or any other emotional or physical harm “ today in our YES program the RCOB again provided that space - kudos to all
