SUMMARY OF THE PRESENTATION BY DR. RAM



"The impact of COVID-19 on Caribbean Economies." Dr. Ram was thorough and comprehensive in his presentation which was enhanced by a number pertinent questions.

The full presentation is available on our website. Following are specific highlights and the Question/Answer session Background

- 1. The Caribbean region was in a poor financial and economic state before the COVID-19
- 2. Low economic growth, high debt and poor sovereign debt rating
- 3. Low ranking in the ease of doing business along with high electricity and energy costs
- 4. High poverty and unemployment. Very high youth employment
- 5. Decline in Population Growth (Barbados by 10% by 2100)
- 6. Poor climate change adaptation tools. Insufficient building codes
- 7. High losses and damage from natural events
- 8. Very dependent on Tourism main contributor to the GDP
- 9. Impact of the possibility of lower oil prices

Treasurer Meryl: If the economies are facing such high levels of Dept to GDP and have such poor ratings, what response will they get from the Capital Markets? A. They will have to rely on the funding

through the multilateral agencies. The have SDR from the IMF and they will be engaged by the CBD, IDB and the World Bank.



AG Lisa: Looking at the Supply Side, we have to buy regionally and reduce our exposure to external markets. There is a focus on Food Security

A. There is the need through Food security to stimulate the Economic and fiscal

Multiplier. We need to get back to basics. We need to move away from the US \$ as our currency and look to a Multilateral Clearing House to address settlements.



Rotaractor, Ramon Grant: If by 2100 Barbados is projected to loose 10% its population, how do we promote sustainability? Currently we are impacting negatively on our resources and environment

A. We can manage growth. We need to focus on the circular economy where all

that we produce will have a residual value which can be built upon. Unfortunately there is a rise in populism which does not allow for Equal Opportunity (USA) and a Competitive Economy (France). There is a need or both systems. Here is where Digital Transformation



comes to the fore

PP Andrew: if we are speaking of Equal Opportunity & Economic Solutions for the well being of people, why are we seeking to patch up a system which is decaying?

A. In Economics we see the conditions in which people live. We have constrainsts. What is the best way to utilize our resources? In what Timeframe? What is the mechanism for achieving g this? As indicated before—Equal Opportunity & A Competitive Economy. How do we transform the Economy? Transport, Health care, Education. These form part of Government policy. How do we transform our economies to provide tangible rewards in a competent well regulated economy. What are we



looking for in sustainable supply chains?

PP Alex: CARICOM needs to have a reset button. We must make use of the Single Market. We have land yet we import foods that can be produced
