Summary of the Address by Ms Dianne Skeete, Featured Speaker, on *THE IMPORTANCE OF THE AIR TRAFFIC CONTROL-LER TO TOURISM*

I would like to take this opportunity as the Chief Air Traffic Control Officer, acting, to thank the Rotary Club of Barbados for the invitation to deliver the feature address and for recognizing, in a tangible way, the contribution of the Air Traffic Controllers in Barbados.

This recognition is timely because International Air Traffic Controllers day is celebrated worldwide on October the 20th every year and on that day the important role which controllers play in aviation safety is highlighted and lauded.

Wearing my other hat as a Kiwan-

ian I wish to congratulate the Rotary Club for the yeoman service which it continues to render to the less fortunate in the community.

Let me begin by asking the audience What is the function of an Air Traffic Controller?

What does he or she really do? This question has been posed on many occasions and a variety of responses have been forthcoming, including the following. An Air Traffic Controller is an air policeman; he is the person who tells the pilot when to put down the wheels and the most popular, he is the person who stands on the ramp with the two red lights in his hand and directs the aircraft to the parking gate.

An Air Traffic Controller is none of these. In spite of the internet and many ways of gathering information, this profession remains somewhat shrouded in mystery mainly because Air Traffic Controllers do not interact with the general public during the execution of their duties.

Air Traffic Controllers are a group of dedicated professionals who provide safe, orderly, expeditious and economical flow of air traffic by separating and preventing collisions between aircraft in the air, between aircraft on the ground and between aircraft and vehicles on the ground.

These tasks are accomplished by the application of stipulated procedures, rules and regulations in accordance with International Civil Aviation Organization standards and recommended practices and the Barbados Civil Aviation Act and Regulations and through the use of radio communication, radar and other electronic means.

Potential Air Traffic Controllers must undergo rigorous training attaining a pass mark of 70% in both theory and practical assessments. The margin for error must be minimal. It takes at least 2½ years to become a fully trained controller and having successfully attained your ratings, the journey then starts.

Those basic skills which were learnt must be honed and fine tuned. Controllers must have a good knowledge of the procedures and be capable of applying them well. Their traffic analysis and planning, judgment and control techniques and situational awareness must be of a high standard.

Coordination, team work and the ability to remain composed even under extreme pressure are of paramount importance. Controllers must also pass their medicals which they must undergo every 1 to 4 years depending on their age and are subject to yearly refresher training and proficiency checks. Aviation is very dynamic and Air

Traffic Controllers must be on top of the game. Deferring work to the next day, the next hour or even the next 5 minutes is not part of this exercise.

But what does all this rigorous training, strict adherence to procedures, medical fitness or even a passing grade of 70% have to do with tourism? Tourism is still Barbados' main money earner. The tourist industry impacts practically everyone directly or indirectly. 80% of visitors travelling to and from Barbados do so by air. International Transport and in particular Civil Aviation is the driving force

behind tourism.

The link between air safety and tourism is vitally important and therein lies your answer. One of the main reasons why visitors continue to travel to our shores is not only because of our beautiful beaches, great entertainment and fabulous dining experience, but because the airspace is safe. Barbados has a very good record of safety in the airspace.

The last serious accident which Barbados recorded was in 1996 when an aircraft ditched and unfortunately one passenger lost their life.

Some of you may recall a disastrous aviation accident which occurred when two B747 Jumbo jets collided on the runway in Tenerife. Tenerife is one of the Spanish Canary islands located off the Western coast of Morocco in North Africa. It was an extremely popular tourist destination and visitors flocked there in huge numbers.

However on March 27th 1977 a KLM, B747 aircraft which was attempting to take off without departure clearance collided with a Pan Am B747 which was taxiing on the runway. Everyone on board the KLM perished and 61 people on board the Pan Am survived the accident but 9 of them subsequently succumbed to their injuries. 583 people in total were killed making this the world's worst aircraft disaster in aviation history. This accident had a lasting influence on the aviation industry particularly in the area of communication since the investigation found that due to a communication misunderstanding, the KLM captain thought he had clearance for take off.

The fallout from this accident literally destroyed the tourism industry in Tenerife. It took Tenerife over 20 years to rebuild the once thriving tourism industry. This example has been used to demonstrate the devastating consequences which a serious accident could have on the tourist industry in Barbados and obviously the economy. If an accident of half this magnitude were to occur in Barbados' airspace or on the ground at the airport, it would be reported worldwide in an instant. It would be on CNN, BBC, NBC not to mention Facebook, Twitter and Instagram.

It is imperative therefore that the Civil Aviation Department ensures that the airspace and the airport maintain a high standard of safety and security through continuous training, maintenance of our Quality Management System and the implementation and maintenance of a Safety Management System.

The Air Traffic Controllers will continue to play a major role in ensuring a safe, orderly, expeditious and economical flow of air traffic. The future for the controller will be challenging as aviation moves from Air Traffic Control to Air Traffic Management, where the role of the controller will one of managing aircraft as opposed to strictly controlling.

With the advent of satellite based navigation equipment replacing ground based facilities, and aircraft equipped with cutting edge technology, the face of air traffic will change and is expected to be even more efficient. The reduction of separation minima will facilitate more aircraft flying in the airspace simultaneously. The challenge will be that whilst the volume of traffic increases, the airspace worldwide remains fixed.

As was mentioned previously, Barbados has a very good air safety track record, and as a member state of the International Civil Aviation Organization, Barbados is expected to keep abreast of worldwide trends and new technology even with very limited resources.

WORLD POLIO DAY: HEALTH OFFICIALS LAUD POLIO **ERADICATION ACHIEVEMENTS, POINT TO DISEASE'S** ENDGAME

After a year of shrinking polio cases worldwide, the crippling disease is now on the cusp of being eradicated, said top health officials at Rotary's second annual World Polio Day event on 24 October.

At a special Livestream program -- World Polio Day: Make History Today -- Rotary leaders joined global health experts and celebrity singers to hail the progress of the Global Polio Eradication Initiative. After nearly 30 years, the GPEI, which includes Rotary, the World Health Organization, UNICEF, U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, and the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, is on the brink of ending polio by 2018, making it the second infectious disease to be eradicated.

"A world without polio is within our grasp more than at any point in the past," said Tom Frieden, director of the CDC, during a video message to the audience. "The poliovirus continues to lose ground. Next month we will mark two years since the last case of wild poliovirus type 3, giving every appearance of eradication, and leaving only type 1 in the world."

The total number of global cases to date is 247, compared with 298 for the same period last year. Outside Pakistan, which saw its polio cases spike this year, the number of cases has been 35, a dramatic decrease from 187 a year ago. Pakistan accounts for 85 percent of global cases of polio this year, Frieden noted. Pakistan, along with Afghanistan and Nigeria, are three remaining polio endemic countries.

The GPEI is on the verge of a major polio achievement in Nigeria. The country has registered only six cases to date this year. "Nigeria is in excellent position to stop circulation of polio this year," said Frieden. "It has gotten 'this close' to eradicating polio by a remarkable turnaround of the program, implementing an emergency operations center, developing a proactive approach to eradication, finding innovative ways to reach children in insecure areas."

Frieden talked about how Nigeria's Polio Emergency Operations Center aided in the quick and effective response to the country's Ebola outbreak. Senior officials from the center were sent to Lagos to lead the effort. They opened an Ebola treatment unit and conducted contact tracing with up to 500 people per day.

"In spite of these efforts, polio activities did not suffer," said Frieden. "This is the legacy of polio eradication in action, and it saved lives by successfully stopping the outbreak."

Most of the polio cases in Afghanistan in 2014 are the result of reintroduction from Pakistan, said James Alexander, senior medical epidemiologist for the CDC. But the country has made significant progress the last two years because of the implementation of its emergency action plan, he said.

"To ensure progress in 2015, there needs to be engagement with new national leadership, intensified focus on 'missed' children, and continued dialogue with other countries," Alexander told attendees.

In March a key milestone was met when the World Health Organization certified its 11-country Southeast Asia region had eradicated polio. Now, 80 percent of the world's population live in areas that are certified polio-free.

Co-sponsored by Rotary and <u>Sanofi Pasteur</u>, the program took place before a live audience in Chicago and streamed online for viewers worldwide. Time magazine science and technology editor <u>Jeffery Kluger</u> moderated the event.

Olivier Charmeil, president and CEO of Sanofi Pasteur, the largest manufacturer of polio vaccine, said in a video address that this year's World Polio Day is significant "because we are beginning the last chapter on polio."

Led by Nepal, a group of 120 countries will introduce the inactivated polio vaccine in the next few months. Charmeil said IPV, an injectable polio vaccine, will be part of all routine immunization programs in every country around the world.

"I look forward to the day we can stand together, alongside Rotary and the other international partners, the day we declare the world polio free," Charmeil told the audience.

WORLD POLIO DAY - OCTOBER 24TH

Rotary General Secretary John Hewko praised the work of the GPEI, calling the organization "perhaps the most ambitious and effective public-private partnership ever assembled." More than 2.5 billion children have been vaccinated since its launch.

The annual number of polio cases has fallen from 350,000 in 1988 to 416 in 2013, and 222 so far this year, a remarkable decrease of more than 99 percent. UNICEF estimates that 10 million people would have otherwise been infected, while 1.5 million lives have been saved.

Rotary has contributed more than \$1.2 billion to polio eradication since taking on the disease in 1979. That amount got a significant boost earlier this week after Rotary announced it will provide <u>an additional \$44.7 million</u> toward the polio fight.

"Once we wipe polio from the face of the planet, we will not only have ensured no child will ever again be paralyzed by this terrible disease, we will have set the stage for the next major global health initiative, whatever it may be," said Hewko.

Celebrities sing Rotary's praise

Reggae star Ziggy Marley, a celebrity End Polio Now ambassador, opened the event via video welcoming participants and performing a song.

<u>Minda Dentler</u>, a polio survivor and Ironman competitor, took the stage and shared her personal story of the disease. Dentler, who contracted polio as a child in India, earned the title of the first official female hand cyclist to compete and finish the grueling Ironman World Championship.

"After crossing the finish line I realized that the journey itself was so much bigger than me," said Dentler. "This journey also represents my opportunity to share with the world that it is time to make polio a thing of the past. That same determination I had for sports has driven me to become an advocate for polio eradication."

<u>Tessanne Chin</u>, 2013 winner of the TV show "The Voice" and an End Polio Now ambassador, sang "Always Tomorrow" during the program, and performed by a benefit concert after the event.
