These program have been proven to be extremely beneficial to the employer as well as the employee. Benefits

include; reduced absenteeism, higher productivity, reduced use of health benefits and injuries, increased morale, loyalty, and retention, and lower heath care. 

knowledge of college admission as well. If the club is going to do this event next year, more clubs should be involved so they are also informed about college information about admissions


