Students of the Month, RYLA, and Comfort Cases-Foster Youth Across America

Joanie Kapell and JoAnn Moffett introduced Laura McDonald from Our Lady of Grace School in West Sacramento who then introduced two students Emma and Britain as Students of the Month. Both are on the Student Council, outstanding students, play sports, and are very involved with other activities. Emma will be attending River City High School and Britain will attend Christian Brothers High School next year.

Lee Harris introduced five of our Rotaract students from River City High School who attend RYLA this past year, Lauren, Rotaract President and Sommer, Addison, Jose and She-Shen. They all spoke of their experiences: being able to open up to others regarding person issues, learning to trust others, the ability to meet new friends and feel comfortable doing it. They realized there are others out there who have the same personal issues, problems, and life obstacles. They also learned that the friends they made at RYLA are still in their lives today, not just for the week they spent with them at RYLA.

Ross Rushton followed the RYLA presentation on Comfort Cases – Foster Youth Across America. Ross is the current President of the Sacramento Active 20/30 Club, married and family man, wife Kellie and son, Riley. He attended Pepperdine, is a Marine Veteran and is currently making headway in the mortgage industry. As president of 20/30, Ross wanted to find another project for their club to be involved with. 20/30 has a number of other projects they currently work on, just ready to do more. Ross presented a video presentation of Rob Scheer, a former foster youth who started this program. It was a very moving and inspiring. A Comfort Case is provided to foster youth to carry their personal belongings. Presently they use black garbage bags. There are an estimated 2,400 foster youth in Sacramento County. 23/30 complied 200 cases last year and their goal is 400 for this year. Each case costs \$41.00 to assemble. Monetary contributions and volunteer help is always in need and always appreciated.

OPENING REMARKS FROM THE MEETING

October 25th in Rotary Polio Awareness Day

The Disease

Poliomyelitis is a highly infectious disease that most commonly affects children under the age of 5.

Most know it as poliovirus. The virus is spread person to person, typically through contaminated water. It can attack the nervous system, and in some instances, lead to paralysis. Although there is no cure, there is a safe and effective vaccine — one which Rotary and our partners use to immunize 2.5 billion children worldwide.

The Facts

Polio mainly affects children under age 5.

There is no cure, but polio is preventable with a vaccine.

Only three countries remain endemic — **Pakistan, Afghanistan, and Nigeria** — otherwise known by the acronym of "PAN". We've reduced cases by 99.9% since 1988.

Until we end polio forever, every child is at risk.

1894: The first major documented polio outbreak in the United States occurs in Vermont, 18 deaths and 132 cases or permanent paralysis reported.

1979: Rotary International begins its fight against polio with a multi-year project to immunize 6 million children in the Philippines.

1985: Rotary International launches PolioPlus, the first and largest internationally coordinated private-sector support of a public health initiative, with an initial fundraising target of US \$120 million.

1988: Rotary International and the World Health Organization launch the Global Polio Eradication Initiative. There was an estimated 350,000 cases of polio in 125 countries.

2011: In India, the last case of polio was reported in January 2011.

2012: India was struck off the list of polio endemic countries and later in 2014. India, along with other countries like Bangladesh, Indonesia, Maldives, Nepal, etc. was announced polio-free. Polio is one of the two major diseases which are subject to global eradication. The other disease is the Guinea worm disease.

In the history of mankind, we have been able to eradicate two diseases — small pox and rinderpest

The Disease

January 22, 2014: Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation Annual Letter cited the following:

Failing to achieve global eradication will cost far more than our annual efforts for eradication. Mathematical models suggest that abandoning the program before eradication is achieved would result in a resurgence of polio — within a decade as many as 200,000 cases of paralysis each year.

On the other hand, ending polio will free up resources that can be invested in other global efforts to reduce child mortality and end extreme poverty. Estimates show that eradicating global polio now could generate net benefits of \$40-50 billion globally by 2035, with most of the savings in the poorest countries. These numbers have also been cited in the medical journal Vaccine.

Another piece of background information for each of you. Because of our efforts Rotary International holds a seat on the U.N. World Health Organization board.

I am proud to be your Guest President today while President Troy is M.I.A. visiting his daughter, and your previous Club President in 2007.






