

Dr. Charyl Silva, Falconry

We had two special visitors this week when Dr. Charyl brought her feathered friends. It is said that the sport of Falconry is the only currently practiced hunting sport in which man cooperates with a trained wild animal to hunt wild quarry.

Humans have a long history with falconry for the past 4500 years. It is shown on cave drawings, Horus and Nimrod were falconers It is predominant in Siberia, China, and Japan and especially in the Middle East

There are Three levels of Falconry, Apprentice, General, and Master. Dr. Charyl is a General at this time and working closer to becoming a Master. To be a Falconer it takes Determination, passing a 100 question Test, Finding a Sponser, building a Mews/ weathering yard which pass an inspection, Trap a RTH (Red Tail Hawk) or kestrel, successfully train to kill game, release trained bird back to the wild. It is a 2 plus year process

The Falcons are able to hunt many species including Cottontails, Pheasant, and Jack Rabbits. They use the warm air currents to raise themselves up high and with their superior vision spot prey on the ground then pull their wings back aerodynamically and reach speeds up to 250mph on their descent and they attack the prey's head.

They also face many obstacles which can kill or make them become ill such as, poison, electrocution from power grid wires and transformer, other predators, trains, cars, gunshots. Birds can be Chamber raised and they will have a band on their leg, these birds cannot be released into the wild, and they can be used for commercial abatement purposes. Some areas which they are useful at abatement are Airports, Lanfills, Vineyards and other farmlands.

OPENING REMARKS: "This Week in History April 16th — April 22nd"

1954 – Elvis Presley started working at Crown Electric, where he earned \$1 an hour driving a truck, delivering supplies to building sites. He aspired to become an electrician. 1956 – Elvis Presley performed at the Memorial Coliseum in Corpus Christi Texas. Immediately after the show, the building manager outlawed rock 'n' roll shows at the Coliseum, when numerous fans and their parents complained that the performance was "vulgar." 1969 – The Carpenters signed with A&M Records. Two years earlier they were part of a group called Spectrum that recorded eleven sides for RCA, though the album was never released.

1971 – Carly Simon's mesmerizing "That's the Way I've Always Heard It

Should Be" charted, eventually reaching #10. It became the first of twentythree hits through 1989 for the daughter of the Simon & Schuster publishing empire.

1975 Captain & Tennille charted with "Love Will Keep Us Together" (#1). It

became the first of fourteen hits- six were Top 5- over the next five years.

1976 – Ann and Nancy Wilson of Heart charted, on their way to #35 and their first of thirty hits through 1993, when "Crazy on You" jumped on the Hot 100 today.

1990 – Bonnie Raitt, Anita Baker, Natalie Cole, and Mica Paris sang "Blowin' in the Wind" at Nelson Mandela--An International Tribute to a Free South Africa Concert at Wembley Stadium in England.

1993 – Elton John's single "A Simple Life" reached #30 in America, making him the only artist with at least one Top 40 hit in twenty-four straight years, surpassing Elvis Presley who had twenty-three.

2000 – Worldwide music sales hit a record \$38.5 billion dollars on over 3.8 billion units. Thanks to record piracy and illegal Internet downloading, it's been downhill ever since. And the number one song in 1977 – Don't Give Up On Us Baby by David Soul



OPENING REMARKS: "This Week in History April 2nd — April 8th"

1958 – Johnny Mathis Greatest Hits album hit the charts, it remained there for what was then a record 490 weeks (almost 10 years)

1959 – England's BBC radio banned The Coasters' "Charlie Brown" because of its inclusion of the word "spitball". Two weeks after massive listener protests, it rescinded the ban.

1962 – The Rolling Stones were formed when Mick Jagger, Keith Richards, and Brian Jones met at the Ealing Blues Club in London. Before forming the group, Jagger had been an ice cream vendor and Richards was a ball boy on a tennis court.

1967 – Disc Jockey Tom "Big Daddy" Donahue began programming what would become known as FM progressive rock radion on San Francisco's KMPX

1984 – Cyndi Lauper's "Girls Just Want to Have Fun" won the second annual best female video at the American Video Awards.

1994 – Rod Stewart donated his income from a concert at Arrowhead Pond in Anaheim to the Red Cross Earthquake relief fund

1998 – Rob Pilatus was a member of pop music's biggest fraud, Milli Vanilli, along with his friend Fabrice Morvan. The teen runaway and dancer-model found his way to Germany from L.A. where the duo were unearthed by Boney M producer Frank Farian. Their 7 million -selling album, including four hit singles, mad them instant stars until it was discovered they didn't actually sing on their recordings and had to give back the Grammy they had won. The disgraced pseudo singer died in a German hotel of a drug and alcohol overdose, he was only






