April 12, 2022 will forever be known as the day that the Frozen Tundra descended on the Viticultural Region of Clarksburg and attacked the baby grapes as they began their lives on the vines. This week our speaker was David Ogilvie of Silt Wines in Clarksburg. David is a familiar face at our club as he came to speak with us when he worked with Anheuser Bush. The forecast for the area was to have temperatures in the upper 30s. Knowing that 36-37 degrees at the executive airport might mean below freezing in Clarksburg. They took precautions to protect the baby grapes. They flood irrigated as much as they could. The standing water will help absorb some of the cold air to protect the baby grapes. From 3am to 6am the temperature got down to 27.7 degrees F. David used Ceres Imaging technology to determine the extent of the damage. They had some blocks that were completely un-harvestable, and some where they may get a partial harvest. They are still determining the extent of the damage. Different varieties of grapes were affected differently. This next winter they will have to prune back some of the chutes grown and damaged so that next year they can recover.

They Farm 1,200 acres and 30% were of those acres were undamaged, 20-30% are completely un-harvestable. The remaining 40-50% are being analyzed to determine if they will be able to be harvested. The Sugar content will need to be tested and studied to determine if wine can even be made from them.

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
