Take Me Out... Zooming?

On July 24, 2020, our Mighty Rotary Club welcomed and heard from Greg Coletti, Vice President of Partner Services for the Sacramento River Cats. Greg has been overseeing partnerships that the River Cats have had with various business in the local community for the past twelve ball seasons. He gave us an update of what has been going on with the organization because of this year's canceled season. He also answered questions from various members. One thing he might not have wanted to admit, but that our club got out of him, that he is a Mets fan.

Assuming there is baseball next April, Greg remarked that the organization will have seen no revenue for approximately 18 months. It has been a learning experience on what expenses they can live and live without. Currently, the team is still working out, exercising, and waiting for their turn to be called up to the big leagues. Sutter Health Park is being used for practice but there are plans in the works for fan events in the last few months of the year.

Greg started answering questions by letting us know that COVID-19 compliance requires that each player walk the length of the entire park as they come in and then get a temperature check before they can keep going. Apparently, River Cats president, Jeff Savage, is not allowed onto the concourse or on the field to mingle with the players because of social distancing guidelines. Below is a summary of some of the questions asked and answered during the meeting.


Dave Kamminga: Do the players wear a mask?

Greg: It is preferred to be worn in the dugouts but optional while playing. Pitchers in the bullpen will be sat apart from each other, but it is hard to keep them separated. Players are no longer touching coaches when they are

running bases. They are also being told they can no longer chew seeds or spit. Pitchers can no longer use spit to get a better grip on the ball. The Giants organization is who directs protocols for the River Cats and the Front Office is doing it's best to stay out of the players' way.

Peter Anderson: What about other minor league players not in Sacramento? Are they still under contract? Are they coming back next year?

Greg: This is more like spring training 2.0. Players might just come out for batting practice on some days. Other days they get a schedule where the

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

As to contracts, players are sticking to their teams. We can expect all those who are signed on this year to still be on the same teams next year.

Tim Kwong: What is the status of the regional bobble-head?

Greg: This would have been the 20th year for bobble-heads in Sacramento. The organization will recognize them next year and are doing refunds for







Dick Marshall: Where does the River Cats find players if High School and College baseballs are cancelled because of the pandemic?

Greg: The Giants Organization is generally who controls player acquisition, so the River Cats don't have to worry about drafting them. Baseball did cut down the draft this season. What used to be a draft spanning a few days only had 5 rounds this year. There is a chance the ballpark will look very different when/if the season starts next April. There may be different messaging and more cleaning stations, and we may also be required to wear masks.

Dave K.: Do the River Cats plan to maintain the event where they allow High School Seniors to play a game at the ball park?

Greg: The event where high school seniors are invited to play at the park actually kicks off the River Cats' season. The last real game played was Davis High School in late February. Right now there are too many things out of control and they are looking at how the NFL progresses with its season. If the NFL can finish its season and have a Super Bowl in February at 100%, that's a good sign for April. The River Cats are doing their best to keep ticket season holders in the loop.



Denice Domke: Will this year bring changes to baseball overall?



Greg: A 162 game season brings the most bang for the buck so we will most likely return to that many games as soon as possible. Some changes in effect now are that the league is moving from 10 teams to 16 teams in the post season. This means that half of the teams will be going to the post season. A Designated Hitter is also now part of the National League. A pitcher also now has to face at least 3 batters before being relieved by another pitcher.

Denice D.: How do you keep players in a bubble?

Greg: The Giants Organization ultimately and monitors what can and can't be done. It's the not same kind of bubble as seen in the NFL. River Cats get their direction from the Giants.

John Raney: To what degree can people playing for the River Cats hope to get pulled up because of what's going on? Will this result in more call ups?

Greg: The organization saw the most call ups last year with Farhan Zaidi at the helm as President of Baseball Operations for the Giants. What Farhan has been known to do is carry a lot of experienced pitchers and stash them in the minor leagues. We'll more than likely see a lot of pick ups regardless of what else is going on in the world, because of who is sitting at the helm.

Bio for Dr. Wen Chen

Wen was born in China at the end of the Great Cultural Revolution. Being victims of the horrific atrocity that killed two million intellectuals and destroyed traditional Chinese culture, Wen's parents had mixed feelings about her education. Despite their discouragement, Wen eventually won a national prize at a science competition when she was 16. Hence, she was accepted into a top university for undergraduate study. In 1994, Wen came to the U.S. for graduate school and received a doctorate in Biology at the California Institute of Technology in 2000. Because of her personal experience of being brainwashed in China, she decided to be a voice for the voiceless. Since 2012, she has given over 200 presentations to community organizations about Chinese culture, history, and human rights.

Dr. Wen Chen has been working for Caltech since 2000 as a biologist and information scientist on genomics and biological research. Part of her everyday work is to speak at scientific conferences and seminars in universities like UC San Diego and Harvard Medical School. In her personal life, she is an active member of the Amnesty International Chapter at Pasadena, a board member for Caltech Women in Biology and Biological Engineering, and a special event host for the Caltech Alumni Association. She lives in Pasadena with her husband and two teenage daughters.

Human Rights Movement in China

Millions of Chinese people have been arrested for their spiritual beliefs or political views. They have not only been tortured and forced to do slave labor, but also killed for their organs. While it takes two-to-three years in the U.S. to wait for matching organs, it takes two-to-four weeks in China. The state-sanctioned organ harvesting towards prisoners of conscience has been operated by the Chinese police, legal and military system. Evidence and international responses about forced organ harvesting in China will be presented, as well as the following: how the Chinese Communist Party penetrates U.S. society to influence decision-makers; the human rights movement in China which began in 2004; innovation that allows people to bypass China's Internet blockade; human rights lawyers in China; and the movement of quitting the Chinese Communist Party.


