

Rotary Opens Opportunities



Land of Many Opportunities

The Mighty Rotary Club of West Sacramento got a sneak peek into some exciting developments in Yolo County during its August 21, 2020 meeting. Guest speaker, Matt Taylor, spoke about the Davis Innovation and Sustainability Campus (DISC), which is a project many years in the making. DISC is an idea borne from years of economic development in the City of Davis and its surrounding areas. Hundreds of acres of land near Mace Road amd I-80 has been developed over the last 25 years, and has attracted many research and development companies. The City has been working to capitalize on this growth, and on the talent that consistently comes out of UC Davis.

Matt's slideshow presentation was met with awe from our club members. He described that the DISC Campus itself was being designed to include general office space, research and development labs, advanced manufacturing facilities, housing, and other amenities. By allowing all of these sectors to work more closely together, companies will be able to make improvements to products more quickly. They will also be able to invent, prototype, research, test, manufacture, and



accelerate the process from idea to market. Allowing an integrated mixed use campus with housing will also help reduce city traffic and foster working communities.

Positioned for Economic Recovery

- DISC is estimated to create more than 6,000 jobs in Davis (more than 5,400 on site) and more than 9,000 jobs in Yolo County.
- Produce \$500 million in annual direct employee wages and compensation within
 Davis and approximately \$610 million annually within Yolo County.
- Generate more than \$22 million in annual taxable sales from new households and employees within Yolo County, which will substantially stimulate the local economy

One of the proposed uses for DISC is in the field of Agricultural Technology, particularly in the areas of Bioscience or Ag Science. UC Davis is currently 7th on the national list of recipients for research dollars in the country and DISC is positioned to entice and attract investors who want to be close to UC Davis regionally. Because of this focus, there has also been discussion about making crop testing available next to the Campus.

DISC is also expected to bring in an increase in jobs and tax dollars that will be spilled back into the City and the surrounding areas. There will be a huge boost to the economy during the buildout and afterwards. With a project of this size, the economic impact to the area is expected to be significant and noticeable. Matt presented several figures as part of his presentation to show the scale . After a very informative presentation, the floor was opened for questions and **Dan Ramos** chimed in to help give answers and say some closing words. Dan announced that they have successfully obtained all approvals from the City of Davis for the project and they have met all of the entitlements. However, the project will need to be put up to a vote in the upcoming

November ballot. Once approved by the voters, they will be ready to lure in tenants and keep moving forward.

Kumaraswamy Sivakumaran: How is the pandemic going to affect the project since work styles have changed? **Dan Ramos:** We are seeing the pandemic changing the general office setting with social distancing. The Campus consists more of labs where the work can't be done from home. They have to be designed with COVID in mind. Currently we are trying to lure companies with the idea of cheaper cost of living but with the same high technology, University-innovation feel. We will have to see how it plays out.

Steve Heringer: Do you have any large anchor tenants that have committed to the project down the road? **Dan Ramos:** Yes. We have been in discussions with one in particular and a couple of others from the Bay Area have expressed interest. Until you have your entitlements and everything, it is very difficult to encourage them to move forward. The Boards of Directors for these companies want certainty, so the focus had been to get the entitlements done. A major anchor tenant currently is in a "Letter of Intent" stage which is very exciting, but there is still a long way to go, and a vote in November, too.

John Raney: With the City of Davis and the County of Yolo having issues with the elevated rail crossing at County Road 102 and the discussion of closing that access, is there a future plan to run further east to Sacramento have another elevated rail crossing on I-80?

Dan Ramos: Your timing is fantastic. They are starting a series of project developments next week by the County. Studies are being done with engineering companies and one of them is a flyover. There is a desire within all of the County to keep that pathway open as an alternative route to the freeway and also to the regional sanitation place. The hope is that the County will go through the process and pick from several alternative projects and put it into the bigger freeway expansion project that is coming down the road, which includes the expansion of the causeway.

Shaun Morrow: What kind of consideration has been given to affordable housing with this project, in light of employment projects of a project this scale and the housing shortage in the State?

Dan Ramos: We tried to get this on the ballot in 2016 but fell short. We didn't have a residential component and advocated for it because we had to show mixed use, and it came out to be the environmentally superior option. After 2016, we did more research about adding residential components and were able to come back to the City and insist that it be added. The City came around after initial resistance. The 850 residential units being built through DISC will not be enough but there are residential developments in other areas and demand for housing will increase in the surrounding areas. We really worked on great transit links to the project, including transit through West Sacramento. We look good for Bay Area companies in terms of housing prices.

Dave Kamminga: Do you know realistically when you would be able to get all things in place to start putting a shovel into the ground?

Dan Ramos: The process after November 3 will be the annexation process with Yolo County, and that can be anywhere from 4-6 months. After that, it's up to us to do the mapping. We are currently looking at around 2022 before a building gets started,

but hopefully sooner. We are also looking at around a 25 year buildout, keeping in mind certain pharmaceutical companies who may be ready to come back into the U.S. because of the proximity to research.

Troy Bird: What is your feel about where the Nov. 3 ballot will go, and how is this project different than "Aggie Square" the UCD Project? **Denice Domke** chimed in to ask what threshold is needed for the vote.)

Dan Ramos: Threshold is a majority (50+1) vote in the general election. They have done a tremendous amount of outreach in the community in the last few years and received a lot of input which has been very helpful especially in (continued at page 7)

Rotary and its GPEI partners celebrate a monumental achievement, say global eradication of wild polio is possible with the continued dedication and persistence of Rotarians

The World Health Organization (WHO) on 25 August announced that transmission of the wild poliovirus has officially been stopped in all 47 countries of its African region. This is a historic and vital step toward global eradication of polio, which is Rotary's top priority.

After decades of hard won gains in the region, Rotary and its partners in the **Global Polio Eradication Initiative** (GPEI) — WHO, U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, UNICEF, the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, and Gavi, the vaccine alliance — are proclaiming the milestone an achievement in public health. They offer it as proof that strong commitment, coordination, and perseverance can rid the world of polio.

The certification that the African region is free of wild poliovirus comes after the independent Africa Regional Certification Commission (ARCC) conducted thorough field verifications that confirmed no new cases and analyzed documentation of polio surveillance, immunization, and laboratory capacity by Cameroon, Central African Republic, Nigeria, and South Sudan. The commission had already accepted the documentation of the other 43 countries in the region.

bringing the project along and helping the community understand what it could mean for them in terms of economics and their qualify of life. There was a unanimous vote from the City Council and the Planning Commission. The polling is very favorable (65%), but we are still "running like we're behind" and trying to make sure voters know the answer to the question." what's in it for me?" We are looking forward to getting it on the ballot.

Matt Taylor: We felt good about an election but COVID-19 has thrown a curveball into that process. We can't just knock on people's doors so we have had to shift what the campaign looks like, including what voting is going to look like when UC Davis has no students on campus. Despite this, we are optimistic. The numbers look good.

Dan Ramos: Regarding Aggie Square, that is more medical and bioscience driven and we are very supportive of that project. It should have happened a long time ago. DISC is more broad based, including life sciences and agricultural, veterinary.

Matt Taylor: We also see our project as being a great way to continue the momentum of Aggie Square, which we understand to be mostly occupied. That project hit the project with more demand than space.

Prior to the presentation, Chris White also talked briefly about the West Sacramento Foundation, in that it was formed to meet services in the community that the City was not able to meet. This is an all volunteer organization that gives our annual grants and conducts an all-charities raffle. She reminded us that the community's needs have not diminished even though the opportunity to fundraise through carwashes and other social events have been challenging. She encouraged those able to donate to this worthy non-profit.



Katie Baker Villegas also thanked Peter Anderson for delivering a club check to support Project Roomkey. Quirina Orozco shared her gratitude reminding us that our efforts go a long way for the neediest in our community.
