Oscar Villegas, Yolo County Supervisor By President David Kamminga

This past meeting's speaker was our Illustrious County Supervisor, Oscar Villegas. Oscar shared some news about Yolo County. Sort of a State of the County update. Some of the things Oscar shared with us. The County is going to be receiving 42 Million dollars of Covid relief money. They will be deciding on how best to spend the money (subliminal message to Oscar Villegas: rural broadband infrastructure for Clarksburg). On Saturday September 18th a community cleanup day is happening in West Sacramento. If you would like to participate please come to the Broderick Boat Launch. Oscar also demonstrated the usage of the picker uppers that would be handed out. Oscar demonstrated with some discarded item that is known to be causing the hole in the ocean's ozone. Work continues on the River road between West Sacramento and Clarksburg, they are basically making a brand new road. The road is closed to through traffic until the project is complete. The old road was quite deteriorated. Also The DWR is doing levee vegetation and tree cleanup/mitigation from Clarksburg to West Sacramento. This is impacting traffic both northbound and southbound on the river road. The redistricting committee has been meeting and working on the redistricting. Homelessness continues to be an issue in Yolo County. The county is currently holding meetings to discuss solutions, and find housing for those who were helped in the previous temporary housing help. The County is also looking at regulating land use for the cultivation of cannabis. The county will have a land use ordinance in place to mitigate any potential issues that go along with this crop.

1963 – The Shangri-Las teen angst standard "Remember" charted en route to #5. It was their first of eleven hits in 2 years

1965 – The Beatles performed I Feel Fine, I'm Down, Act Naturally, Ticket to Ride, Yesterday, and Help! On The Ed Sullivan Show in New York. John was so nervous he forgot some of the words to Help!

1966 – The Beatles performed at Candlestick park in San Francisco in what would be the last Beatles concert ever, there were 25,000 fans in attendance and the last song they performed was Little Richards, Long Tall Sally

1968 – Topping off his birthday party, Keith Moon, Drummer for The Who drove a Lincoln Continental into the holiday inn swimming pool in Flint Michigan

1970 – Elton John made his American Performance Debut at The Troubadour in Los Angeles. He was the opening act for David Ackles

1970 – Jimi Hendrix held his last performance at the Isle of Wight Pop Festival off the coast of England

1977 – At Age 42 The King of Rock N Roll Elvis Presley died at his Graceland mansion in Memphis of Heart Failure Shortly before he passed on, he sat at the piano and one of the last songs he played was Willie Nelson's Blue Eyes Cryin' in the rain.
