# **TODAY'S PROGRAM:**

Bob Rogers, District 5130 Polio+Champion, Rotary District 27
"End Polio Now" Coordinator
gave the Club an update on the
state of both wild and vaccinerelated polio in several critical
areas of the world, including
Pakistan, Afghanistan, Malawi and
Mozambique. All of the wild
cases have been genetically
mapped to the same source in
Pakistan. The work continues to
eradicate the last cases despite the



great personal danger experienced by the vaccine workers, who are almost entirely women.

Bob also described the development (funded by the Gates Foundation) of a new Novel Oral Polio Vaccine, that reduces the risk of a vaccine dose returning to full strength by an order of

magnitude over the Sabin vaccine. In Nigeria, the new vaccine reduced the number of vaccination-derived polio from 415 to 39 in one year!

Bob also discussed the discovery of vaccine-derived polio in New York and the efforts to both track it and to increase the vaccination rates, especially among children under age five.

Bob presented several Club members with pins, certificates and wrist bands in commemoration of their joining the PolioPlus Society. Members of the Society pledge to donate at least \$100 per year until wild polio is eradicated from the planet. Honorees today were **Mike Potmesil**, **Don Mitchell**, **Norm Fujita** and **Ric Helthal**. **Grady Wann** also joined the Society, but he was not present today.
